The Boyup Brook Community Resource Centre (BBCRC) is a not for profit, community managed organisation servicing the rural community of Boyup Brook since 2005. The Boyup Brook CRC is part of a network of over 100 Community Resource Centres located in small rural communities in Western Australia.

The Boyup Brook CRC aims to provide quality and professional services that continually build on existing programs and partnerships to increase the capacity of the CRC to remain proactive in meeting the needs of the Boyup Brook community and catering for many different target markets.

We are continually searching for alternative services and programs to provide to the community to grow the organisation and provide financial stability.

Boyup Brook is situated on the Blackwood River, in the heart of the South West of WA and consists of a town of some 700 people with a total of approximately 1700 residing in the Shire, with a median age of 49 with almost a 50:50 split of females to males.

Manager's Report: Jodi Nield

The year of 2017-18 was a challenging one for the CRC with

the State Government reducing the term of our contract, followed by the announcement that funding to the statewide Community Resource Network would be cut. This announcement (which was subsequently reversed in August 2018) caused great distress and uncertainty to regional Western Australia and Boyup Brook was not immune to its effects.

With challenge and adversity, there always comes some aspects of positivity. The support that the CRC received from the community during our campaign to fight the funding cut was amazing and highlighted the importance of the services we deliver. It also enabled the CRC to examine and assess our business operations and services to find efficiencies, whilst ensuring our governance remained strong.

An area of strength is the many partnerships that the CRC has with stakeholders, including Government, community sector agencies, business, other not-for-profits, community groups and individuals. These relationships ensure we have access to and are meeting the needs of the Boyup Brook community.

The Boyup Brook Bendigo Bank Agency continues to grow steadily and we were proud to distribute \$10,000 to local community groups in November 2017, thanks to the Collie & Districts Community Bank. We thank the Collie Board and Staff for their continued support of the Agency.

Other important activities, events and services that the CRC has delivered during the year include the Boyup Brook Art Awards, various information and training sessions, workshops, simulcast events, school holiday activities, university exam supervision and support for community events. The Boyup Gazette continues to be a crucial source of information for the community and our administration and

office services are well utilised by a range of people.

We continue to be thankful for the ongoing support of the Shire of Boyup Brook for the provision of our premises and associated services.

Thank you to our volunteer Management Committee for their continued support of the CRC, and to myself as Manager. Personally I would like to express my gratitude to the committee for enabling me to participate in Leadership WA's Signature program this year. The program has developed my leadership skills and style which I bring back to my personal life, the CRC and the community.



USAGE ANALYSIS

The introduction of the Bendigo Bank agency has certainly brought people in to the CRC as indicated by the large portion of the graph.

Internet and computer usage, photocopying and printing, as well as CRC events and clients utilising visiting professionals are the other main services heavily supported.

The other sections of usage illustrated in the chart reflects the diversity in services that the CRC delivers, with the large 'other' segment used to record general enquiries that do not fit into a specific category.

It must be noted that, despite the best efforts and intentions of staff members to capture every customer, there are some events and activities that accurate data is difficult to record.

Economic and business development support

Business Support

From time to time, the CRC receives requests from local businesses to coordinated specific training courses to upskill employees and comply with regulation.

Examples of such training during 2017-18 included a Chainsaw Safety Course for a local timber business, Auschem Training for the Shire and local farming operations and a Forklift Course for local businesses.

Information sessions are also conducted to provide local businesses with additional knowledge to improve their business operations and decision making.

Whenever possible, the CRC advertises local employment opportunities on its website to allow jobseekers a central place to search for a job. There is also a link to the Southern Forest Employment Hub which lists a large number of vacant positions in the region.

The CRC has a number of agencies and other organisations that it refers businesses and job seekers to, enabling them to deal with specific support and areas of expertise that the CRC may not have.

Supporting Those in Need

The CRC is a place where people of all demographics seek assistance and support for a wide range of reasons. We have a range of agencies and organisations that we can direct people to for support whether it is parenting, financial, legal or health related.

Upskilling the Community

The CRC provides a range of workshops and training opportunities for the community such as floral art, learning how to operate smartphones and tablets, art journaling and parenting courses.

Many of these are courses are initiated by the members of the community who express an interest in learning a certain skill. The CRC acts on the request and if viable, organises the activity, often using skills of people that exist within the local community.

On occasions, opportunities are presented to the CRC to host educational programs such as the Food Sensations Program. Delivered via videoconference by Foodbank WA, this program provided information about nutrition and healthy eating, followed by a hands-on cooking session. The program was well received and provided participants with skills to lead a healthier life into the future.

Valuable Information and Learning Opportunities

Information sessions are conducted throughout the year covering various topics catering for a wide target market across the community.

It is through various partnerships between the CRC and other organisations that these sessions are so successful.

For example, an internet safety session was conducted at Boyup Brook District High School, engaging a trained presenter (who also happened to be a police officer) from the 'ThinkUKnow' organisation.

Another presentation was arranged with RoadWise about Road Safety for seniors with the local Home and Community Care service and Boyup Brook Resident's Lodge. This not only provided an opportunity for education, but also for local seniors to ask questions and raise concerns about access and safety on the local roads.

The South West Community Legal Centre conducted a session on Planning for the Future which discussed Wills, Enduring Powers of Attorney and associated topics to enable local community members to be more informed in their decision making into the future.

Key Services for Community

The Boyup Brook CRC has service contracts in place with Federal Government agencies and an Agency agreement with the Bendigo Bank to provide essential services that are not accessible anywhere else in the community as a face to face option.

Around 200 people accessed the Department of Human Services Access Point during 2017-18 with many of these requiring support to set up and access the MyGov platform.

In its second year of operation, the Bendigo Bank Agency experienced steady growth. As the only bank remaining in Boyup Brook, it enables a local solution for community groups, businesses and those who do not want to travel or transact online to conduct banking business. It is also providing a valuable income stream for the CRC and the ability for local groups to access grant funding through the community banking model.

Unfortunately, the Australian Taxation Office withdrew their Rural and Remote Access program at the end of June 2018, spelling the end of free access to ATO information and forms for the community. The CRC will continue to provide access to the ATO website, but on a user pays system.

Information, Administration, Office Services and Products

One-Stop-Shop

The list of administration and office services that are provided by the CRC is lengthy, with individuals, businesses, community groups and agencies accessing these services on a daily basis. The CRC is a one-stop-shop for these types of services without the inconvenience of travel and related expenses.

Computer and internet access, while it has declined over the years, is still a key service for the CRC to reduce the impact of the digital divide and enable citizens who do not have a computer, or reliable internet connection to access technology.

The Boyup Gazette, the monthly newspaper produced by the CRC, is part of the fabric of the Boyup Brook community. It is the source of local news and events and provides a key avenue for businesses to advertise within the community.

A number of local authors have utilised the CRC as a reference to produce and publish their own books, which are then also sold through the CRC on a commission basis.

Along with the formal partnerships that exist with the local Shire, schools and other groups, the CRC also connects informally with the majority of the community organisations and businesses within Boyup Brook, especially through The Boyup Gazette. The CRC is also represented at many activities and events held throughout the year which strengthen these bonds. These include the Upper Blackwood Agricultural Show, ANZAC Day, Remembrance Day, Sandakan Memorial, Australia Day, School events and annual Women's Day to name a few.

The CRC also builds connections with surrounding communities through events such as the Boyup Brook Art Awards, its involvement with the Bendigo Bank, South West Development Commission and other activities.

The Boyup Brook CRC continues to maintain its positive reputation within the statewide CRC Network, attending Network events, workshops and meetings. This link with other CRCs is strengthened with CRC Manager, Jodi Nield a member of the subcommittee of Linkwest, the peak body for CRCs and Neighbourhood Centres.

Jodi's participation in the Leadership WA Signature Program has also been of benefit in raising awareness of the role of CRCs and their importance in regional communities. The connections made through this program have the potential to create future opportunities for not only the Boyup Brook CRC, but the whole CRC Network.
