Australia Day in Boyup Brook

The morning commenced with a flag raising ceremony followed by the Citizenship Ceremony of Carolyn Mader who proudly made her pledge to become an Australian Citizen in front of her family, friends and the community.

The Australia Day Council funding also went towards individual fruit salads provided by BP, muffins from the Bluestone Café and a traditional cooked breakfast prepared by our Councillors. To make breakfast complete, the Treehouse Coffee Van kept up a steady supply of fresh coffee and tea.

Ron Evans provided entertainment of fabulous bush poetry, with onlookers either seated at tables around the park, under the new Shire marquee or on picnic rugs. Community members were later invited to take the picnic rugs home to enjoy them for many years to come.

This year two awards were presented, the first being the Kevin Henderson Memorial Award which went to Angela Hales. Shire President Richard Walker said Angela "is a highly respected and active volunteer of the Boyup Brook Community.

[Her] passions lie with St John Ambulance, Australian Army Cadets, the RSL and the Country Music Club of Boyup Brook."

The award was presented by Kevin's sisters, Margaret and Helen. With the health of the community at her heart, Boyup Brook is very lucky to have a civic minded member such as Angela.

The 2021 Citizen of the Year was presented to Lyn Willett. Lyn was instrumental in the planning of the Blooming Wild weekend in 2020, especially with securing artist Sobrane to paint a beautiful mural on the Railway Goods Shed and a smaller one on a silo. She was also recognised for her many years at the Boyup Brook Golf Club, Tourism Association and the Community Resource Centre.

"[Lyn's] enthusiasm knows no bounds for everything she lends a hand to, as well as centring her focus on family and friends." said President Richard Walker. The award was presented by the Shire CEO Dale Putland.

The day finished with free pool entry for all community members which had the fantastic inflatable volleyball net. Over 100 people enjoyed the afternoon.

The day of celebrations was assisted by the Australian Government through the National Australia Day Council.

Ute and Truck Muster Postponed

The Committee behind the Boyup Brook Ute and Truck Muster has made the brave decision to shelve the February event along with the inaugural Country Rock concert, due to ongoing COVID-19 concerns.

While it was planned as a break away event from the annual Country Music Festival to provide more social engagement and entertainment for the regional community, they will again be presented together in new dates held across Saturday 20 and Sunday 21 November 2021. The 36th annual WA Country Music Awards will also be carried over to Friday 19 November 2021.

Major events like this continue to be a risk to organisers with health restrictions changing at a moment's notice, and state government event approvals delayed due to new advice amidst a new strain of Coronavirus.

President Daly Winter said, "The community takes great pride in welcoming thousands of visitors to our town during the Festival and we're all hopeful that large gatherings at music events can still happen in the near future."

But the local community won't be without its beloved country music as the Country Music Club of Boyup Brook hosts the 'Tom Curtain in the West Tour' at Music Park on Friday 12 February. The multiple Golden Guitar winner is currently a finalist for Heritage Song of the Year featuring Lee Kernaghan and Sara Storer at the Tamworth Country Music Awards. His national award winning Katherine Outback Experience show also includes horse training and working dog demonstrations in a family friendly one-of-a-kind event. Makers Wanted in May



From the Country Music Club President

In recent weeks there has been numerous items in social media regarding the Country Music Club's decision to postpone the annual Boyup Brook Country Music Festival until November. Let us take some time to outline the reasons behind this decision.

At the time of planning the 2021 Festival, the COVID-19 pandemic was in full swing with many festivals/events being cancelled and continue being cancelled, due to the nature of the virus and the potential risk of community spread. The Club's number one priority throughout this whole process has been the safety, health and wellbeing of our community and our patrons.

The decisions we have made have not been taken lightly, in fact they have been quite heartbreaking at times. The Club has had to take into consideration the age demographics of our patrons and the evolving event guidelines from the Health Department in running a music festival.

The Club's decision to postpone the event and the reasons behind the postponement to November wasn't a stab in the dark. We considered postponing until February 2022, however, some of our funding bodies advised us that unless a festival proceeded this calendar year, we would lose a significant amount of promised and committed funding.

The Club looked at the events in the regional area and the timing of the year for best weather conditions before deciding on the new date. The Winter and Spring months were out and that left November and December, and obviously December was out with the lead up to Christmas.

We did consider the potential impact on other events and the timing of those activities and although not ideal, we only had a couple of available dates to select from. Some may say selecting a date a week away from the Blues was a poor decision, however, the Nannup Music Festival is scheduled to begin on 26th February 2021, which was less than a week after our original Festival dates. The Club has a good rapport with the other regional festivals and we have worked together to promote each other's events.

The Club considered the various potential financial aspects of the next festival combined with results of recent past festivals over the last couple of years only generating sufficient income to break even. The Club relies on grant funding and sponsorship to support and sustain the event. A loss could potentially have long term impacts on the ability of the Club to host future events.

The fiscal aspects were also the concern that resulted in the decision to postpone the Ute and Truck Muster.

We had looked to run this as a separate stand-alone event in February but ticket sales prior to the event fell well short of what the Club needed to proceed. Also, the Health Department approval to stage an event could be altered or withdrawn at a moment's notice, leaving the Club in a position where we could not recoup all of our event costs and we couldn't take that risk!

Over the last sixteen years, local community groups have received approximately \$240,000 in community camping and in 2020 alone \$19,500 was paid to community groups for camping. Without the Club and the annual festival, this would not have been possible. Other community fundraising has also been undertaken at the festival and the Club has donated funds to worthwhile causes in the past, e.g., Crawford Lodge in Perth for country residents undergoing cancer treatment.

The Music Park and its wonderful facilities are Shire owned and are available for everyone to use, so let's work together and plan for more events in the future.

If you feel you want to have a say, have you considered joining the Club and being on the committee or helping as a volunteer?



Students Set Sail on Leeuwin

Six former Boyup Brook District High School students experienced a journey of a lifetime when they spent a week on Australia's largest sail-training tall ship, the STS Leeuwin II in January.

Leith Charteris, Mathew Dalton, Atari Maeva, Josh Miller, Brooke Nield and Francois Smook were originally supposed to set sail in May 2020, but COVID-19 put the voyage on hold. Instead, they departed from Bunbury harbour on January 20 and sailed up the west coast into Fremantle on January 26.

STS Leeuwin II is used to run programs aiming to develop core skills and providing a life-changing impact on young people.

The trainees were required to be 'on watch' for up to four hours during the day and night, undertaking tasks such as line handling, setting sails, furling sails, climbing the masts (one being 33 metres above deck) and cleaning the ship.

A key component of the voyage involved learning sailing terminology, parts of the ship, how sails work, how to tie knots and the roles of the crew.

"It was a challenging experience, but a rewarding one," said Brooke. "I learned to have a go at everything and to never give up, even when it was hard." She said that meeting new people and climbing to the top of the main mast were just two of the highlights.

The students were provided with the opportunity to participate through Boyup Brook District High School, with each student successfully applying for a scholarship from Woodside, which contributed significantly to the cost of the voyage.

Cultural Corner



Bunuru - Season of adolescence Second summer: February-March Coast living and fishing time.

The lifestyle for the Nyoongar communities during Bunuru:

Bunuru is the hottest time of the year with little to no rain. Hot easterly winds continue with a cooling sea breeze most afternoons if you're close to the coast. Therefore, traditionally this was, and still is, a great time for living and fishing by the coast, rivers and estuaries. Because of this, freshwater foods and seafood made up major parts of the diet during this time of year.

Bunuru is also a time of the white flowers with lots of white flowering gums in full bloom, including Jarrah, Marri and Ghost Gums.

Another striking flower that is hard to go past is the female Zamia (*Macrozamia riedlei*). Being much larger than that of its male counterpart, the huge cones emerge from the centre of the plant with masses of a cotton wool like substance.

As the hot, dry weather continues the seed upon the cones change from green to bright red, indicating they're ripening and becoming more attractive to animals, particularly the emu, that will eat the toxic fleshy outer.

Book Release for Former Local

A new book has hit the shelves of book shops across Australia. Short listed for the 2018 City of Fremantle Hungerford Award, *Small Steps – a Physio in Ethiopia*, author is ex-local, Julie Sprigg.

Julie grew up on her parents, Jean and Ken Sprigg's, farm at Kulikup. She attended primary school at St Mary's and was joint Dux in year 10 at the BBDHS.

Julie went on to finish her education in Perth, attend university and become a Physiotherapist. She worked as a physiotherapist for ten years before switching her career to foreign aid with programs improving human rights for people with disabilities.

Julie's book *Small Steps: A Physio in Ethiopia* is a travel memoir of hope and joy, friendship and love in Ethiopian physiotherapy clinics, university classrooms, and convents.

As a child Julie dreamed of being somewhere else, of making a difference. These dreams led her to Ethiopia where she lived in a convent with nuns and worked in their clinic. Her story tells of children who could not walk simply because the treatment they needed wasn't available, and how those kids overcame huge odds to walk again. Julie had to jump the culture and poverty barriers, draw on her experience and initiative and had very few resources and equipment to use.

When Julie took on a teaching role at a university, she finally felt closer to fulfilling her dreams – training Ethiopia's first physiotherapists and treating paediatric patients. When civil unrest reached the university, it forced Julie's students to choose between their safety and their future.

Small Steps is an armchair journey into the landscapes, flavours and language of Ethiopia with a peek inside convent and university life. It's about looking for meaning in our work and searching for our place in the world. It's a unique journey but readers may recognise themselves.

Julie writes about her experiences at St Mary's Boyup Brook and the influence of growing up on a farm. Julie says, 'I'm so proud of my home town and I wouldn't be the person I am today if I hadn't grown up in such a tight-knit community.'

Among the many acknowledgements Julie says, "thank you to my family, Nigel and Renee Sprigg, Michelle Sprigg, Anita and Andrew Skelton for holding me afloat. And to Mum and Dad for making us watch *Four Corners* while everyone else at school was watching *A Country Practice*; and encouraging us to dream up a lifetime of adventures."







Biosecurity Petition Pending

The petition No.160 was tabled during the 40th Parliament sittings on the 18th August 2020 in relation to a Biosecurity levy imposed on the residents of Boyup Brook and has been noted by the Legislative Council. However the standing committee on Environment and Public Affairs looking into the matter has adjourned and "the committee is therefore unable to progress the petition further at this time".

In order for the committee to continue its consideration the petition will be re-tabled in the new Parliamentary year, with further signatories. If you agree with what is outlines in its content and have not signed please do so at the Shire Administration, Post Office or Co-op in Boyup Brook.

Some key points to note when considering your position:

- Boyup Brook was never afforded the same level of consultation by the Blackwood Biosecurity Inc (BBI) prior to its endorsement as a Recognised Biosecurity Group (RBG) by the Minister for the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) during February 2017 and the subsequent formation of the Declared Pest Rate (DPR) was done with a low level of community input or understanding, as a pose to what has recently occurred in Manjimup where the consultation by a new RBG was thorough, resulting in a more considered outcome.
- Funds administered by the BBI (to which we are expected to contribute) on collection of the DPR have financed illegal activity concerned with feral pig eradications last year resulting in little or no accountability within the BBI, a major flaw of this RBG model as part of the inadequate guidelines within the Biosecurity and Ag Management (BAM) Act 2007 with the responsibility resting solely on the DPIRD Minister concerned whom continues to widely tout this broken piece of legislation and sign off on RBG programmes state-wide.
- The European Red Fox is, in my opinion, the number one enemy to the natural environment with less than 1000 native Numbats now existing in the wild as a reminder of this introduced species incurred damage. The Federal & State Government's and indeed the BBI does not highly prioritise the eradication of this pest species, funds spent are minimal and claimed numbers of foxes extinguished

locally by this RBG are falsely being linked, I believe, to our annual Boyup Brook fox shoot, which has operated independently for some 20 years. Indeed, we ourselves the Boyup Brook Community do as much as any shire in the state to try and combat this problem without having to pay a new Land tax, for next to no expense, whilst raising substantial funds for men's health issues as a spinoff.

- With the formation of 14 plus RBG's across Western Australia, the State Government has effectively "washed its hands" of the responsibility for Biosecurity measures, depleting resources to its own Departments and forcing it back onto volunteers from local communities to deal with, who are ill equipped to handle such large scale problems. Furthermore pest species prevalent on state administered lands are not dealt with effectively and the onus is therefore on the RBG's to seek approval from State Government Agencies to help deal with their problems within these substantial areas of land, in our case engulfing some 45% of the Boyup Brook Shire.
- The ongoing consultation from the RBG has been somewhat lacklustre and sporadic whilst not actively being attended by the majority of Boyup Brook ratepayers questioning its acceptance and effectiveness. Further information provided to the DPIRD from the BBI includes ambiguous consultation figures associated with the Storm in a Teacup ladies day an event that is certainly not convened solely around such issues and draws on a much wider population of the region as well as claiming that the Boyup Brook Community endorsed it with little opposition at a Shire organised forum on the Biosecurity issue back in 2019? This is not my recollection of the communities intent on that day or indeed today.
- The paltry figure of \$40 to \$50 sought in the form of a current levy is the "tip of the massive iceberg" of funding required to combat the ever increasing number of Biosecurity issues facing our community and should not let us "sleep well at night", believing we are fixing the problems that the State Government has inadequately dealt with in the past, present and perhaps more importantly the imminent future.

Letters of concern around this issue should be sent to our local member Terry Redman, keeping pressure on the Standing Committee on Environment and Public Affairs to continue its further consideration more seriously into this matter and please, as a rate payer, sign the petition if you agree and haven't already done so as this matter is currently unresolved. Thank you.

Getting to Know.... Graeme (Freddy) Reid

with Sharon Lampard

Graeme Reid was born right here in Boyup Brook at the Upper Blackwood Memorial Hospital, and has lived in town all his life. He not only has a wealth of knowledge on local history, but as I spent a little time getting to know him, I saw he had a real passion for it too.

Graeme was born in 1945, the first child of Percival and Beryl Reid. His Dad was born in Scotland and when moving to Boyup Brook he first worked in the Flaxmill. His loving mother, is now 95 and living in Perth, close by to his younger sister Janice. Graeme said wryly of his mum, "She's doing better than I am."

The Reid's lost a family member in 1954, Graeme's younger brother Ken. He sadly drowned in the Blackwood River at only four years old. "[It] devastated Mum and Dad, and me too".

Despite this, he has many fond memories of his childhood, making his own fun with his friends. This often included swimming in the Blackwood River in the summertime, making slingshots, playing Cowboys and Indians and watching Pictures at the Town Hall on Friday nights was a must.

When the circus came to town, Graeme said it was a big spectacle for the kids in Boyup Brook. He remembers getting quite a fright hearing an Elephant trumpet, he said he and all the kids were "Off like rockets. We'd never [heard] anything like that before."

Graeme was part of the first group to go through the new district high school, therefore he completed all of his education locally. At the age of 15, two days after he finished up with his Junior Certificate, he had a job in the hardware section of the old Coop.

He then moved on to working with his mates in the timber mills and then on night shift in the Flaxmill, "Worst part about it was starting at midnight on a Sunday night, especially if you'd just be getting home from the Drive-in in Bridgetown. But it was all great fun."

When he was 17, he enrolled in the army and was based in Holsworthy just outside of Sydney. He's always been interested in the military and of his time there he said it helped to pull his rebellious side into line and also taught him to appreciate life more.


His time there was cut short by 13 months, "Unfortunately Dad was starting to ail a little bit, so they recommended that I get discharged and come home and help with the trucking business."

Shortly after he left his Battalion, they were sent to fight in the Vietnam War. This caused Graeme to feel some guilt about leaving early, but his mind was put at ease by an old army friend who once told him "Don't worry about it, you were one of the lucky ones."

When he got back to town, helping with his father's business, this saw him carting sheep, cattle, wool, grain and other goods. He also reconnected with a lady who had first caught his eye jumping off the school bus back in his high school days. He went on to marry her, Moya Meredith, in 1966.

Over the next eleven years they grew their family by having three children, Deanna, Christy and Travis. To support them Graeme had a variety of jobs, across many different skillsets, "You never really stop learning, do you."

Graeme made himself a jack of all trades; he worked as a 'snake charmer' doing maintenance on the railways; built power lines; drove



trucks, loaders and graders and did the rubbish bin pick up during his time at the local shire; later in life he realised a love for painting signs and this went on to him becoming a registered painter.

Whilst on the job he got to know different people, from different walks of life. He had a motto when he was painting, "No music, no start!" His passion for music is still around today; on top of his list back in his painting days, were classics from artists like Creedence Clearwater Revival and Phil Collins.

Graeme is also a big sports fan and to keep himself fit and involved in town over the years, he played cricket, basketball, badminton and football. It was his football mates that first donned him with the nickname Freddy, as he was always singing a song by Right Said Fred.

His favourite sporting memory was in 1976 when he went back playing with his mates in the reserves and they won the championship against the Manjimup Tigers.

In his 75 years, Graeme has seen so many changes in Boyup Brook and he was kind enough to share many of his memories about what the town used to look like.

He said there were three main roads in town, and each was filled with different services. There was the Upper Blackwood Board yard, where the accountants building is now, Graham's Drapery Store, a Butcher, two Bakers, a betting house, Terry's Garage, a fruit packing shed and Miss Fullers Café and Accommodation to name just a few.

He also remembers when the land now occupied by the shire office, Sandakan Park, Tyre Shop, St Johns, Fire Brigade building and the BP, was all just bushland. If you ever want to know more about the towns' history, I would definitely recommend getting in touch with Graeme!

These days, he is happily retired and reflecting over his life he said he shares his greatest achievement with his wife- they are both very proud of their children, who have now had children of their own.

He has never thought to live anywhere but in Boyup Brook as he is very fond of the town. "It's always been a friendly town, knowing most people. If someone we know has fallen on hard times like illness, word gets around and help is just there."

The next State general election will be due on Saturday, 13 March 2021.

Voting is your democratic right and is compulsory for Western Australian residents who are Australian citizens and 18 years of age or older. In the Western Australian State Election, everyone can have an equal say in deciding the state's future.

There are more voting options than just voting at your local polling place on Saturday 13 March. Voting options this State Election include: postal voting, early in person voting, mobile polling, telephone assisted voting and voting on Election day.

Postal Voting: You can easily apply online for a postal vote anytime from 4 February 2021 or an application form can be mailed to you by contacting the Commission's Call Centre on 13 63 06 from this date. Ballot paper packages won't be posted to you until after nominations close on 12 February. If posted on or before polling day, completed postal packages can be accepted via mail until 9:00am on the Thursday following election day (18 March).

Early in person voting: You can vote any time from Wednesday 24 February at one of the numerous Early Voting Centres across WA, or at selected locations interstate and overseas. Locations and opening hours will be available in late January. Most of the centres in WA will also be open on Saturday 6 March. You don't need a reason to apply for an early vote.

Mobile polling: Electors in hospitals, aged care facilities, remote Aboriginal communities or mine sites and some other institutions may be visited by a mobile polling team in the two-week period before election day. This will depend in part on the status of the COVID-19 pandemic. Locations and visit times will be published once finalised in late January.

Telephone assisted voting: Electors with a vision impairment, insufficient literacy or an incapacity that means they can't vote without assistance, are eligible to apply for a telephone assisted vote by calling 136 800 (+61 8 9214 7290 if overseas) from Wednesday 24 February onwards.

Election day voting: On election day, Saturday 13 March, you will still be able to vote between 8.00am and 6.00pm at over 700 polling places through WA. You can cast an ordinary vote at a polling place in your district or an absent vote at polling places located elsewhere.

How to mark your ballot papers:

To make sure your vote will count, it is important that you read the ballot papers instructions and mark both papers correctly. Only use numbers; not ticks or crosses. If you don't mark your ballot papers correctly, they may be rejected as informal votes.




