A Very Plastic Free Morning Tea

With the aim of inspiring locals to reduce their single-use plastic consumption for the month of July, a successful Plastic Free Morning Tea was hosted by the Boyup Brook Community Resource Centre on June 19 2021.

The local town hall provided a familiar setting for the event's keynote speaker Rebecca Prince-Ruiz (pictured right), who was born in Boyup Brook and remembers performing in ballet concerts as a young girl, at the same venue.

Rebecca is the founder of the global movement 'Plastic Free July' and was also named this year's WA Local Hero at the Australia Day Awards.

She spoke about the importance of choosing plastic free alternatives, supporting companies that are providing recycled plastic products and touched on the effects that microplastics are having on health.

Ashleigh Dilley of A2 Bulk Foods in Kirup, a store that is providing sustainable homewares and plastic free pantry products, also spoke about how shopping for items in bulk and using your own containers can radically reduce single-use plastic consumption.

The morning tea was well received by more than fifty patrons who avidly listened and asked the speakers important questions in their search for solutions to the plastic problem.

The day also featured a delicious morning tea, with all of the ingredients sourced plastic free. There was not a single piece of cling wrap in sight, the milk came in cartons, the butter wrapped in paper and a very eclectic array of teapots provided a warming cuppa, without tea bags.

The event was also completely waste-free by using ceramic plates, metal cutlery, cloth napkins and all food waste and tea leaves were composted. Much of the



tableware was borrowed, including a collection of tablecloths provided by Deb Chambers, and teapots and food platters on loan from the local RFDS Charity Shop.

Guests at the morning tea were invited to make a plastic free pledge, for an item they will choose to refuse in July and helping them to do this, were two pop up shops, Youanme and A2 Bulk Foods, providing a variety of sustainable and reusable items.

The lucky winner of the sustainable door prize hamper was Sue Fairbrass. Sue took home handmade products donated by Rosey Wright and Lynn Tooke, donations from the pop up shops, and other eco products collected by the CRC.

If you are taking on the Plastic Free July challenge this year, the CRC invites you to add to the Community Pledge Board started on the day. Simply drop in to make a pledge or send in a photo to boyupbrook@crc.net.au.

So far, community members have pledged to refuse single-use coffee cups, plastic water and milk bottles, cling wrap, plastic cutlery and straws.

An additional highlight of the morning was the attendance of three awardees of the WA Local Hero of the Year (pictured below), Adrian Price (2004), Rebecca (2021) and Rhonda Parker (2010), all who have called Boyup Brook home.

Change of Address/Rural Number

It is the responsibility of the ratepayer to inform the Shire, in writing or by email of any change of address or preferred postal address. All owners must sign the request.

Pensioner Rebate Concession Changes

Revenue WA (formerly Office of State Revenue) introduced a cross-check.

- Ensure the address on the pension card is correct with the rural number (if applicable)
- Ratepayer may be requested to provide current Pensioner Card/Senior Card.
- Pensioner may be requested to provide 'Proof of owner occupancy'- example is Utility bill with the address, Home insurance.
- Shire rates officer will contact the pensioner ratepayer if the claim is rejected by Revenue WA.
- Ratepayer portion of the rates, including waste fees must be paid by 30th June each year to be eligible for the Pensioner Concession Rebate.

BPAY Unique Reference

Each assessment has a unique Biller reference, therefore if making payment by BPAY please ensure a separate BPAY payment is made for each assessment.

POLICE NEWS

Howdy Boyup Brook, we have some exciting news for you this month.

July 14 not only marks the day that Louis VIII became the King of France (in 1223), it's also the first day on duty for our new Sergeant Phil HUGGINS. Let us rejoice! I know Sarah and I are very excited to have our third member in blue gracing these cold halls again.

I will leave Sergeant HUGGINS to 'Phil' you in on the details of his life, past, present and future, but I will say that he is coming over from Wickepin Police Station with his wife Danni and two dogs in tow. Please help us give him a warm welcome and we will be sure to host a 'Cuppa with a Cop' or similar event in the near future so you can have a nice palaver with him...and us too, of course.

Onto some business matters. If you hold a current Firearm Licence, please be sure to check your renewal dates. We have received a lot of infringements lately for the non-payment of Firearms Licences. These fines are \$421 which is definitely better off in your own pocket.

The responsibility remains solely with the Firearms Licence holder to ensure their licence remains current at all times. Unfortunately stating you haven't received your mail or it's your partners job to pay the bills won't work.

Renewal Notices are sent out as a courtesy, not a right. Put a reminder in your calendar or in your phone. Make sure you have updated your postal address and if you have not received a renewal notice and you want to make a payment, you can contact Licensing Services (Firearms) on 1300 171 011.

Some important History.

Did you know that the WA Police Force was established in 1853 and the first female officer started in 1917. Woman weren't allowed to wear a police uniform until 1976. This was also the first year that married women could be employed as police officers, previously they were forced to resign once they got married. Although initially Woman Police Constables had full constabulary powers, their official role was to look after drunken women and get assistance for neglected children.

Today, WA Police Force has over 1400 woman in their ranks making up more than 22% on the front line. It's still very rare for a police station to have a majority of female staff. Boyup Brook is one of those exceptions. Lucky you! Stay tuned for some background on us gals' in the coming issues.

The use of a Yarning Circle is an important process within Aboriginal culture and Torres Strait Islander culture and has been used by Indigenous peoples from around the world for centuries. The circle is place to learn from a collective group, build respectful relationships, and to preserve and pass on cultural knowledge.

St Mary's Primary School

Every student at St Mary's has the opportunity to explore their inner brilliance through the school's unique Genius Hour program.

The initiative is part of the school's challenge and support program and involves each year group completing a 5-week Genius Hour project. Genius Hour, run by support and challenge teacher Gemma Hester, allows the students the freedom to explore and extend their knowledge on any topic that is of particular interest to each individual student.

They must create a researchable question to guide their learning and then present their learning to other classes at the end of the 5-week timeframe.

The Year 4 students have just finished their Genius Hour learning. It was wonderful to see the huge range of research

happening on topics ranging from learning boxing techniques and phrases in Auslan sign language, developing drawing and singing skills, to creating board games and 3D structures.

The Year 4 students were buzzing with excitement every week.





"It was great to see how selfmotivated and enthusiastic every student was to challenge themselves in new and interesting ways each week," said Mrs Hester.

Year 5s are now following the same format for Genius Hour as the Year 4s. They each needed to create a 'nongoogle-able' research question on a topic that interests them.



The answer must be complex enough that it cannot be found with just one search on Google.

Year 5 topics that are being covered include scientific experiments, fundraising ideas and planning to help those in need, constructing 3D objects (horse sculpture and toy crane), designing a motor-cross track, researching topics of interest and presenting learned facts using PowerPoint presentations and picture books.

They are combining research from websites, YouTube, peer questionnaires and other sources to find the information which they will then present to their peers at the end of term.


The students have all been busy, engaged and on-task throughout the sessions. The limited time frame has challenged the students to create a specific/refined research question that extends their knowledge yet can be achieved in the 5 sessions.

The Year 6 students kicked off the program last term, participating in the Synergy Solar Car Challenge, finishing third in their division in WA. Teams of students had to construct and race solar cars as part of the competition which attracted schools from across the state.

In other news at St Mary's, Learn and Grow for all children of pre-school aged and their families will be held on Fridays next term, from 9-10:30am. All are welcome.



Rylington Park Committee of Management

Acting Chairman's Report 2021

Sixteen months ago the Rylington Park Committee of Management was asked to attend a meeting with the Boyup Brook Shire, where we were informed by the CEO that our lease of the farm would not be renewed and the Shire would run the farm themselves.

Although the Shire owned the property, the Committee of Management had built up a large asset over the 36 years, that volunteering committee members had run the farm. This included an outstanding sheep flock, upgraded farm machinery and a healthy bank balance which overall totalled around \$1.5 million.

In good faith, as we no longer had a farm, it was decided to donate our assets to the community of Boyup Brook through the Shire.

Peter Reid, Matthew Chambers and myself were appointed to a transition committee with two Shire councillors, to help with the change-over. After six months of regular meetings with the Shire, it became apparent to me that Rylington Park being run from the Shire office was not in the best interests of Rylington. So I moved a motion for the Shire to have another look at their decision to run the farm. This was carried.

Following meetings of the transition committee, I gained the impression from the Shire representatives that the farm would go back to being run by a committee of volunteers as in the past, but with some profits from the farm directed to the community.

During the last 36 years, many local volunteers have served on the Committee of Management carrying out Mr Farleigh's wishes to carry out research trials and training in agriculture. The house, buildings and farm infrastructure in general has been continually upgraded. In my view, the Boyup Brook Shire Council has never shown any public acknowledgement or appreciation, of their contribution and donation to the Boyup Brook community.

At this stage the Shire is yet to make a decision on the future management of Rylington Park. It is my hope that a committee of local volunteers can again run the farm, with a renewed focus and determination to benefit the whole community.

After 13 years involvement with Rylington Park, many as Chairman, I won't be seeking re-election to the committee. I am proud of my achievements which include getting Eric Farleigh inducted into the WA Agricultural Hall of Fame. I thank all those who have been involved with the success of Rylington Park and wish it every success in the future regardless of who is in control.





Local Drug Action Team

The Australian Government and the Alcohol and Drug Foundation have announced a Local Drug Action Team for Boyup Brook, to be facilitated through the Community Mental Health Action Team (CoMHAT), to prevent and minimise alcohol and other drug-related harm in the community.

It brings the total number of Local Drug Action Teams across Western Australia to 37, and 280 Teams nationally.

The Local Drug Action Team Program supports organisations to build or extend partnerships in their neighbourhoods and use local knowledge to deliver evidence-informed alcohol and other drug harm prevention activities that are tailored to individual community needs.

The new Boyup Brook LDAT will provide ongoing support for the community related to alcohol and other drugs, particularly preventative programs for youth.

The LDAT will work closely with stakeholders, including local health professionals, police, local Government and mental health services.

The next steps for the LDAT is to work with the Alcohol and Drug Foundation to develop a Community Action Plan, which will confirm its evidence-based harm prevention activities, who they will reach and exactly where they will be delivered.

Local Drug Action Teams receive an initial \$10,000 to develop Community Action Plans and can apply for further funding to deliver activities within their Community Action Plan.

Once arriving at the first shed (and the other three) a world of vintage tractors of a host of models and makes, in different stages of repair, from the basic to the fully functioning and freshly painted were on display.

Darryl started collecting these several dozen machines from 2003. He was able to describe each exhibit in detail and answer any questions with ease. The tour lasted more than an hour which was time well spent.

Meanwhile, the ladies enjoyed perusing the garden and its many plants and interesting ornaments which included iron bedheads and enamel sinks - a great idea to repurpose old items from the house.

Robin was generous in offering some of her iris plants and other plant cuttings were taken too.



Getting to Know ... Bev Prideaux

After being lucky enough to hear this reluctant lady speak at the 2021 Rylington Park Women's Day, I knew it might be a challenge to get her in to the CRC for a chat about herself. But I am so glad she took the time, because Getting to Know Bev Prideaux has been such a delight.

Beverley, most widely known as Bev, was born in Perth in 1942 and grew up in the Mt Hawthorn area. Although enjoying many benefits of city life, her family

spent most of their weekends and holidays with family in regional areas starting in the Swan Valley, and stretching as far east as Ravensthorpe and as far south as Albany.

Her father Ossie, was a very successful diesel engineer who owned his own motor engineering business. Bev loved to go down and help him as his apprentice motor mechanic, but this didn't go too far as her mother Beatrice, was quite mortified that her first born daughter was defying gender norms of the time.

Her father was also a professional cray fisherman and Bev spent a lot of time outdoors and on the water, "I swam in anything that looked wet enough to swim in," she recalled.

Bev was often put into school classes with students from other countries, as Mt Hawthorn was a very multicultural place at the time. She quite enjoyed sharing conversations with them, and where able, sharing their delicious school lunches. She had a feeling their cuisine might be quite a lot better than some of her other Australian peers!

Upon entry to high school, all students were required to sit an IQ test and when the results came back, Bev sat in the top two. This meant she was placed in the top school stream, however, over the next three years, her unique learning style subsequently saw her slip to the lowest.

Nevertheless, at age 15, when high school was coming to a close, an opportunity arose to sit a test for an internship. Astonishing her mathematics teacher, Bev answered all the maths questions very well, and ended up in the top ten. This saw her being offered a job at the Commonwealth Department of Census and Statistics.

As was common in those days, Bev went from work to getting married and over the next few years she said her time was spent between having her three children and then "horses, pony clubs and racing cars."

In 1968 she took up basketball, but after getting injured, she looked for a less physical outlet and this first lead her to pistol shooting. It didn't come easy to start and she remembers, "The first targets I shot, they were all over the place!"

But after a lot of calculating and analysing where she was going wrong, in less than 12 months of taking up the sport. Bev was named the State Champion and made the State team.

As with school, Bev found she had a unique way to learn and practice, "I'd go out to the range and I'd shoot, and if I shot a shot that wasn't where I wanted [and] was less than a nine... I'd go home." This shocked those around her, but Bev was convinced that too much practise in the wrong technique would ingrain all the bad habits.

"That's me - different. Got to find your own way to do it." Said Bev, but it worked!

In 1969 Bev went to her first nationals and in 1975 she won the National Australian Championships .22 pistol gold medal of which she humbly said, "That was a good year".

It was in 1977 that Bev moved with her family to Boyup Brook. But up to 15 years before this she was experiencing some baffling health difficulties and was made to feel as though it was all in her mind.

It wasn't until losing feeling in her right arm whilst driving a car, and nearly getting into a nasty accident that she was finally believed and diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis (MS) in 1978.

"It was a relief to know after 15 years of 'get over it, darling', that it is was actually something real. And then it gives you something that you can put a label on and you can fight it." She said.

At the time there was no treatment available for MS other than to monitor the symptoms, and her doctor had to break the news that she had about 10-15 years until the disease would take her life.

Just as she did with any other problem in life, Bev set about analysing the disease. She found out what she could and tried to come up with a way to overcome or get around it. This lead her to Neuroplasticity, which was not a recognised treatment at the time, but Bev persevered anyway.

With her youngest child seven years old at the time of her diagnosis, Bev put all of her focus on getting her kids selfsufficient. She wanted to be around long enough to make sure she could get them on their feet, so they could face whatever they needed to in their lives.

Bev's shooting accuracy suffered as her symptoms worsened and so she tried to move over to shooting with her left hand. After three months of trying, she went back over to her right insisting that she should have enough muscle memory on the original side to get her back on track.

She must have been on to something because in 1981 she was nominated for the Western Australian Sports Federation's Sportsman of the Year. She received a handmade plaque for this nomination of which she is most proud to display.

In the early eighties, Bev competed in the Commonwealth Games selection and finished first amongst all competitorsmale and female. Although she well and truly qualified, she was not selected as it was decided that the only the top four men would represent Australia in the Brisbane Games.

Bev was extremely disheartened to be treated with such overt misogyny and came home to retire. She felt all of the effort and hard work that went into being at the top level was now not worth the reward.

However, this retirement was short lived as only three months later she received a telegram inviting her to join the Australian World team at the Championships in Santo Above: Bev Prideaux Domingo.



There must have been something in the Boyup Brook air at this time as she was a part of the same team as another local resident. Rod Hack.

With this shooting career highlight taking place during a hurricane, the team did not perform as well as they set out to. A disappointed Bev found solace in placing highest out of all of the Australian competitors, men and women.

From here her life switched lanes from shooting, to her passion for breeding Mohair goats and the business of farm to shop production of mohair-wool mix jumpers. Which saw Bev play an integral role in the importation of improved Mohair genetics all the way from Texas.

In 1991 Bev married her husband Grayden, who she said has been the love of her life. "That's the point where my life turned around... everything was easier; I had support. And I couldn't have done it without his support".

She also has seven grandchildren and ten great grandchildren that she loves dearly and you can tell she is a very proud mum when she speaks about her three children Sue, Lee and Michael.


Over the years, Bev's other roles have included the Coordinator for the South West Games, involvement with a variety of local committees, working in Rural Merchandising, vineyard development (which included putting one in at her own property), freelance journalism for 25 years and she was the founding secretary of the Blackwood Valley Wine Industry Association.

She said she has tried to retire many times from different roles, but keeps getting called back up. After her third retirement she wrote a book called Moodiarrup: an oral history of its Hall & people.

Her hobbies have been art, photography and making soft toys for her grandkids, which then lead her into needle felting.

As for the MS, Bev says she has it under control and is pretty determined that it is not going to come back. She puts her fight over the disease down to being pretty stubborn and not allowing it to overcome her despite that early prognosis.

Bev measures her success in life at trying her hand at new things, as she'd rather be a "has been, than a never was".








