# **Rhonda Parker OAM**

Rhonda Parker was aboard a cruise ship at the Port of Adelaide when she first received news that she was a recipient of the Order of Australia (OAM) for her extensive service to the community of Boyup Brook.

Although a call from Parliament House gave her an early headsup, the rest of the country learned of her recognition during the King's Birthday Honours announcement in June. Since then, Rhonda has been overwhelmed by an outpouring of congratulatory messages from near and far, often moved to tears as a result.

Rhonda has been deeply involved in various facets of community life across four decades, and when she learnt of the reason why she was to receive the honour, it was particularly meaningful to her.

"The citation for services to the community of Boyup Brook was really great, because this is where we live and it's what we love. So it was very exciting," she remarked.

Her journey in Boyup Brook began 43 years ago when she met her husband, farmer Neville Parker, in Geelong. Moving to Boyup Brook shortly after, Rhonda quickly immersed herself in volunteering, considering it a natural calling. Reflecting on her contributions, she feels privileged to have been able to respond effectively when called upon to help.

One of her earliest notable contributions was organising a fundraising event through the Country Women's Association, which helped send donations to the Eastern States for the Nyngan flood disaster in 1990.

However, it is her role as the Music Director of the Boyup Brook Country Music Festival that stands out as one of her proudest achievements. Her ability to attract top artists for the event, included the notable John Williamson, and she recalled, "I was so passionate about keeping that festival in our town."

More recently, as President of the Boyup Brook Golf Club, Rhonda took pride in the role she played in the refurbishment of the club's kitchen facilities. "It brings a tear to my eye just about every time I go to the Golf Club now, because I look at it and think, this is amazing."

Throughout her involvement in various clubs, committees and events over the years, Rhonda has acquired many valuable skills. She reflects on how volunteering has enriched her life, stating "It really has given more back to me, than what I feel I have contributed."

"When I first joined the CWA in 1983 or 4, I just swallowed up everything they were teaching. CWA are much, much more than tea and scones," she emphasised. From this association, Rhonda learnt how to run a meeting, what a constitution was, all the different roles, and the importance of meeting protocols to help members achieve their goals.

Rhonda has demonstrated a longstanding commitment to service and leadership across multiple organisations. Some of these have included President of the District High School Parents and Citizens' Association, Chairperson of the Boyup Brook Telecentre, and various positions in local sports clubs such as the tennis, junior hockey, golf and bowling clubs.

# SHIRE NEWS



## Project Update

Cemetery: The Shire of Boyup Brook has revised the plans for the cemetery project to fit within budget limitations. While the scope has been adjusted, essential upgrades such as drainage improvements, carpark construction and restroom facilities will be included. We expect to receive new quotes for the revised project in early July and aim to begin work by the end of the year.

Kulikup Hall Project: The Shire supported the Kulikup Hall Committee with the purchase of bricks to fit out the verandah and complete renovations.

Footpaths: We are excited to update residents on the upcoming footpath improvement project. We have secured a contractor and anticipate the project will begin in the next couple of months. The upgrades will address several footpaths and will include a new pram ramp at IGA, renewal of the Bridge Street footpath between the post office and medical centre and improvements to the northern end of Inglis Street. Detailed information on specific repair locations will be available closer to works commencing.

SHERP: The Shire previously secured funding through the Department of Communities Social Housing Economic Recovery Package (SHERP) program. Renovations on Shire owned social housing will begin in early August, upgrading two units to modern standards and enhancing safety for residents.

Sandakan Playground: The Shire has applied for a grant to secure funds for the playground redevelopment at Sandakan Park and are currently waiting on the outcome.

Sandakan Park: The first meeting of the Sandakan Park Reference Group was held on the 20th June. The group includes representation from the Boyup Brook Playgroup, students from Boyup Brook District High School, Boyup Brook RSL, Council and Shire staff. The group are working with Landscape Planners Pty Ltd on the overall masterplan for Sandakan Park.

### Independent Living Units

Over the past year, the Shire of Boyup Brook has been actively exploring the potential development of Independent Living Units (ILUs) to better serve our senior community members. This initiative aims to offer older residents the option to remain in Boyup Brook, close to family and friends, while maintaining their independence and benefiting from proximity to medical and community services.

The Shire, in collaboration with the Community Resource Centre (CRC), will soon be calling for expressions of interest from the local community. This process is designed to gauge public support for the proposed development. The call for expressions of interest will include draft floor plans for two and three-bedroom units, giving community members the opportunity to choose their preferred design.

The feedback collected from this exercise is crucial for the Shire. It will inform the next phase of the project, which involves developing a comprehensive business case to assess the feasibility and benefits of the ILUs. The proposed units are envisioned as a way to enhance the quality of life for Boyup Brook's seniors, ensuring they have access to suitable living arrangements within the community they cherish.

Residents can expect further details on how to submit their expressions of interest in the coming weeks. The Shire and CRC will provide clear instructions and information on where to view the draft plans and how to share their opinions.

This initiative underscores the Shire's commitment to fostering a supportive and inclusive community for all age groups, ensuring that Boyup Brook remains a desirable place to live for everyone.











## **Fence Line Clearing**

If you are the owner of the property, with Shire approval, you may clear a strip along a fence line within your property to the width necessary to provide access to construct or maintain a fence. This is provided that the clearing, combined with other limited exempt clearing (under the Regulations) on the property, does not exceed five hectares in the financial year in which the clearing takes place.

Written approval from the Shire of Boyup Brook must be obtained prior to undertaking the clearing. For more information visit the Shire website

### Firewise Gardening

The Bushfire Centre of Excellence have released the first Firewise Gardening Guide for Western Australia. It is aimed at informing and empowering homeowners and residents in bushfire-prone areas and is designed to be a helpful resource for planning and designing gardens that reduce the risk of house loss and property damage. It is also a great resource for landscape designers, plant nurseries and natural resource groups and has been developed in consultation with industry experts. ### Smoke Alarms

During June, the Western Australian community are urged to test and clean their smoke alarms, check their smoke alarms are less than 10 years old and replace batteries if needed.

There are a lot of different smoke alarms on the hardware store shelf, so it is important to understand which option is best for your property, and why. The two types of smoke alarms used in Western Australia use either ionisation or photoelectric smoke sensors. The difference is in the smoke sensing technology used, which affects how the device reacts to a fire.

Department of Fire and Emergency Services recommend you use photoelectric smoke alarms that are mains powered to keep your household safe. IMPORTANT: Mains powered smoke alarms must be installed by a certified electrician only.



# **Emergency Services Combine Training**

The Boyup Brook Volunteer Fire and Rescue Service (VFRS) has held some combined training this year, involving the Boyup Brook St John Ambulance volunteers and representatives from Boyup Brook Police.

Earlier in January we came together at the fire station with a presentation shown by the VFRS Captain on lithium-ion response and emerging risks. Lithium-ion products are becoming more and more popular, seen in phones, tools, cars, laptops, etc. and as the world is evolving, so is our training.

It was a great insight for our first responders, having that extra bit of information when it comes to the potential hazards involving lithium-ion products and EV vehicles. Hopefully we don't come across too many, but it's safe to say that we are slightly more prepared to assess and deal with them. For a few general consumer tips on these products, look to the end of this article for points from the ACCC.

In May, we came together again to train some more. The night started off with a look inside a later model Tesla. This gave us all an opportunity to see how they are designed and brush up on some of those potential hazards that we may come across.

Many thanks to Deputy Shire President, Councillor Helen O'Connell, for bringing her vehicle to display. Of course I'm sure Helen was happy to go home after learning some information on the vehicle, but particularly before some of the firies got carried away and brought out the Halligan too early!





The remainder of the night ended with a joint exercise on road crash rescue simulation, involving two vehicles and a few casualties. It allowed the services to train together giving them better opportunities to understand how we operate, without the stresses of a real time incident.



### Few consumer tips on Lithium-Ion from the ACCC:

- Monitor charging times of lithium-ion products and disconnect products from chargers once they are fully charged. Consider setting timers as a reminder to unplug products.
- Keep lithium-ion batteries out of household garbage or recycling bins and kerbside hard waste collections.
- Charge lithium-ion batteries and products away from combustible materials such as beds, sofas or carpet.
- Store batteries and lithium-ion products in cool, dry places and out of direct sunlight, including while charging.
- Do not use batteries, products or chargers that are overheating or showing signs of failure such as swelling, leaking or venting gas.
- Check the charger you are using is suitable for the product being charged.
- Allow time for batteries to cool after use and before charging.
- In the event of a fire, consumers should contact 000 immediately. For more information on what to do in case of fire or explosion contact your state or territory fire department.


# **CWA Update**





# In Touch Farming

Welcome to the June 'In Touch Farming Newsletter'.

Given the difficult start to the season, we have had a few enquiries regarding optimising pasture growth. Assuming nutrition has been taken care of (and we actually have some moisture!), one option that works well - especially on grassy pastures (rye grass) - is ProGibb + Nitrogen.

ProGibb (or generic alternatives such as Lancer or Gala) are concentrated Gibberellic acid, a naturally occurring plant hormone that controls cell expansion and elongation.

An application of 20g of ProGibb mimics the natural cycle of hormones that occur during the spring flush, allowing extra biomass production. The feed quality is the same as normal and there is no "crash" in production after application - although the boosted effect wears off after about four weeks. Grasses are more responsive than legumes.

In New Zealand it is guite common practice to repeat ProGibb + N cycles up to four times in a season to maximise growth.

Normal applications would use 50L Flexi N (21 Units of N) to assist this plant growth. Combined, the N and the ProGibb can help offset the "Winter Drought" that often occurs where cool growing conditions reduce plant growth rates.

Consider Omethoate in the same application for RLEM control, it can even be applied when SprayGrazing pastures with MCPA Amine to control capeweed.

# **Backyard Buddies**

### Larvae in Firewood

During the winter period where firewood is often collected and split, our service receives a common enquiry: "I've chopped some wood and found these grubs! Are these borers? Is this the European house borer? Is my house at risk?" The first question we ask to split European house borer (EHB) from many other wood borers is: "What wood are you cutting? Is it pine?". If the answer is no, it's not going to be EHB.

EHB larvae will only reproduce in seasoned (dry) coniferous timber and wood, including pine, fir and spruce. Of these, pine trees (Pinus species) and pine timbers are abundant in WA.

What if the answer was yes? - If you notice larvae or borer emergence holes in dead pine branches, logs, or untreated pine pallets or timbers, please report this. EHB has the potential to cause major structural damage to buildings constructed with untreated pine timber. Infested wood stored in or around the home is worth investigating.

Most firewood burnt in WA is from native hardwood species and are the larvae of native longicorn beetles (*Phoracantha* species) in jarrah. These beetles attack live or recently dead/felled Eucalypt trees and don't pose a risk to timbers in your home. If you have been chopping firewood for years but are only starting to see these borers, it's likely the trees the firewood has come from, were stressed or recently felled. Trees stressed by drought or disease are particularly susceptible to borer attack.

If something isn't familiar to you, it's best to report it rather than ignore it. When reporting, please include as much information as possible about what's occurring. Collect and hold onto any insect samples, and if taking photos, include things like a ruler or a pen so the dimensions of insects, holes or other symptoms can be gauged.

Throughout the book survival techniques are demonstrated, and how our Australian bush, with all its beauty can sometimes be treacherous and very unpredictable is explained.

This book is a captivating read, aimed for the junior reader making their way in life, but thoroughly enjoyable for all. I will not spoil the ending for you; it certainly gave me a tear. Read and enjoy it's good for the soul.

### Ban of E-Waste to Landfill

The West Australian Government has introduced a ban of e-waste going to landfill as from 1<sup>st</sup> July 2024. It is not permissible to dispose of e-waste in your rubbish or recycling wheelie bin or direct to landfill. Be aware that this is a WA Government ban but left to the Shires/Cities to supervise.


Boyup Brook is one of the few WA rural shires to have its own e-waste dismantling service; Precious Waste, available only to its residents at no charge. This has avoided sending e-waste to Perth for recycling at a cost of transportation and a cost for each item.

The ban applies to all electrical items using mains or battery power; these items can be left at Precious Waste near the entrance to Boyup Brook Waste Transfer Station, for residents of Boyup Brook only. The exceptions are refrigerators, freezers and air conditioners which require the gas to be removed by professional contractors.

Most e-waste contains hazardous and toxic materials which are released into soil, air or water when crushed, as would be the case at the landfill. By dismantling the e-waste the hazardous or toxic materials are kept whole and are available to be recycled again.

If you are not fortunate to live in Boyup Brook, check with your Shire or City regarding e-waste disposal.

# **Plastic Free July**

Have you ever thought, "I am only one person, what difference can I make?" A former resident of Boyup Brook and now Perth, Rebecca Prince-Ruiz, initiated the **Plastic Free July** campaign which now has world wide participation. For her vision, Rebecca was presented with the WA Local Hero-Australian of the Year Award.

In many cases, the environmental problem is how we use and dispose of plastics. Look at some of the 'long life' plastics in our life. I have a Parker 51 fountain pen which is 70 years old, still in good working order and having a plastic barrel still looking as good as when it was manufactured. I can refill this pen from a bottle of ink, the bottle is also recycled. This is so much different from the disposable ballpoint pens.

Much of the emphasis has been on coastal plastic pollution, some having drifted from overseas and therefore not ours, **but becomes ours.** Less emphasis is on our pollution in our 'space', especially in areas away from the coast. In the Manjimup-Bridgetown Times recently, there was an article about Michael Filby, an 80 year old who regularly voluntarily patrols the main roads both sides of Walpole WA, picking up litter. Michael is frustrated that he no longer finishes his patrol, than other litter appears. A large portion of this litter is single use plastic ranging from plastic 'wipes' used instead of toilet paper, through to beverage containers.

I am also in my latter 80's and still pick up roadside litter when I am appropriately dressed with gloves and tongs. Should picking up other people's litter be left to us 'oldies'?

Containers for Change has helped to reduce roadside and public place litter of many beverage containers, but the other litter, mostly single use plastics, continues to despoil our superb environment.

In our rural areas, roadside litter is easily blown into roadside drains, then creeks, then rivers and finally into our oceans. It is understood that plastic bags drifting into agricultural crops have resulted in fires of headers and possibly major fires; just one plastic bag in the wrong place is all it may take to create a major disaster. The WA Government is taking steps to minimise plastic issues and pollution. **The rest is up to us.**



# **DFES - Storm Preparedness**

People who take action to get prepared for a severe storm before it happens are more likely to keep themselves, their households, their pets and their property safe. In a storm your property may be damaged and unsafe. If you need temporary emergency repairs to make your home safe, such as for a badly damaged roof or flooding, call the State Emergency Service on 132 500 to request assistance.

Storms are the most common natural hazard in Australia and can occur at any time of year. It is important that Western Australians aren't complacent about severe weather warnings and take the recommended action to keep themselves and their family safe.

### Prepare your property

- Keep branches and trees trimmed around structures and powerlines to prevent damage.
- If needed, hire a contractor to clear trees from power lines.
- Keep gutters clear so they drain freely.
- Check roofs to reduce leaks and risk of flying debris.
- Check fastenings, joints and bolts on structures including carports and patios to ensure they are secure and not rusted.
- Check home, contents and car insurance cover are in order.
- If flash flooding is a risk for your area, follow the flood property preparation advice.

It has been a painstaking job requiring careful handling and sophisticated equipment. Don even constructed a special stand to support the cases at a specific angle while being photographed.

Each case was individually photographed as a record of the contents and condition of the specimens at this time. The Carnaby Egg Collection will also be recorded. High resolution detail will allow the images to be used for other creative purposes by the Boyup Brook Tourism Association (BBTA).

lain Parker, longstanding curator of the collection, assisted Don with the handling of the cases and shared his extensive knowledge of the care required for them. The BBTA wishes to acknowledge the generous support of lain over the many years of his curatorship, and the enthusiastic response from Don when approached about this project. ### **How to have Peace**

'Great peace have those who love Your law, and nothing can make them stumble.' Psalm 119:165

In order to find real peace, you must do two things:

- 1) Live by the principles of God's Word. 'Great peace have those who love Your law, and nothing can make them stumble.' (Psalm 119:165 NIV) Peace arrives when you live in harmony with God. A new car comes with an owner's manual. It tells you that for your car to perform well, you must do certain things at certain times. Likewise, the Bible is your owner's manual for life. It contains guiding principles for finances, health, marriage, business, relationships, and considerably more. Just as your car drives more smoothly when you use it according to its design, so your life will go more smoothly when you live it according to God's design.
- 2) Accept God's pardon. Guilt is the top destroyer of peace. When we feel guilty, we feel haunted by our past. That's why we read about people who make amends for a wrong they committed thirty years earlier. They say, 'I was living in hell all those years and had to get it off my chest.' The only way to have peace is to possess a clear conscience, and only God is able to give you that. 'Who is a God like you, who pardons sin and forgives the transgression of the remnant of His inheritance? You do not stay angry forever but delight to show mercy' (Micah 7:18 NIV)

It's the enemy who wants to condemn us and keep us drowning in guilt and often not being able to forgive ourselves. Notice, Micah reveals God is eager—ready and waiting—to clean your slate. It's His personality. He enjoys forgiving. 'If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness' (1 John 1:9 NIV).

We can't change our past, if we could we would, but we can stop it from destroying our present and stealing our future.



Judo also provides a level of self-defence training, and the club will focus on participation, sport and self-defence skills, all whilst having a fun time. Most Judoka (judo students) will be participants of judo and not try high level competition, but this is available for those who seek such, and I have coached Judoka who have gone on to represent Australia in international Judo competitions.

Wednesdays will be the day for Judo classes and there will be two separate classes: one for Juniors 6-12 years of age and the other for advanced 10-11 year olds and 12+, teens, young people and adults.

Gareth has had people who have started Judo in their 50s, as it is so good for coordination, body strength and fitness.

The club will be voluntarily coached (as Gareth has always done) and all monies for classes will go back to the club activities.

The first class will be a free 'come along and try' session. You don't need any experience, or a certain level of fitness, or stretching ability, as you will develop a lot of this as you learn. There will be some adults attending this session who have had previous experience with Judo to assist with the classes.

Due to appropriate ratio of participants to coaches, there will be a LIMIT on how many can attend each class and you must RSVP to attend the 'first try out class' so numbers are known.

You just need to wear long comfortable pants and a long sleeve 'tracksuit jacket' (or similar) and/or a long sleeve t-shirt. Eventually you will need a Judogi (special 'uniform' for Judo).


