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

Makers in May Draws a Crowd



Makers in May

Makers in May, coordinated by the Boyup Brook Community Resource Centre as part of Neighbourhood Centre Week, was the first for the town, but was based on the concept of a very successful event from days gone by, the Autumn Art Affair.

Makers included sewing, knitting, candle making, needle felting, jewellery making, spinning and upcycled items with other stalls featuring glass etching, resin art and ceramics. Renowned local artist and sculptor, Sandy Chambers spent the day crafting a work in clay and reflected on the days of the Autumn Art Affair which he organised, along with his wife Jacquie.

Various workshops and demonstrations were scheduled throughout the day for community members of all ages to learn how to play the guitar, make bath bombs, dismantle e-waste and weave a basket.

Makers in May attracted more than 200 locals and visitors who took the opportunity to wander through the stalls, learn new skills, do a spot of shopping and importantly, connect with friends and other community members.

The event also received an overwhelming 70% five star rating, from guests that were asked to rate their experience at the event by placing a button into the appropriate jar.

Neighbourhood Centre Week, marked during the week of May 8-14, celebrated community centres across Australia that have an ongoing role in helping to combat loneliness and providing the human connection that is so vital to health and wellbeing. Makers in May certainly created the opportunity for this to occur.

The event was supported by Linkwest, Lotterywest and the Boyup Brook Lions Club.

Annual General Meeting of Electors

A date for the Annual Electors Meeting will be announced once the Shire has received the audit results.

Medical Centre

As the community will be aware, the Shire run Medical Centre currently has one doctor and is very busy. Council has been instrumental in not only ensuring that Boyup Brook continued to have a doctor but also strived to recruit and retain doctors and this has been no easy task for a small Shire. The Shire is actively looking to secure another Doctor however this does not come without a substantial cost involved. The annual cost of the Medical Centre to ratepayers is currently equal to 10% of all rates collected by the Shire. We ask for your patience during this busy time as we endeavour to provide the best possible medical care for our community.

Rylington Park

Council have been managing Rylington Park for the past year after the lease expired with the Rylington Park Management Inc. The farm has continued to operate and produce a profit for the community and has continued to host community events such as Women's Field Day - Storm in a Teacup along with shearing schools, workshops, and field days.

The Shire thanks the members of the Rylington Park Transitional Management Committee who have contributed their thoughts and advice through this process. Council will soon be requesting broader community input to help make a decision regarding future management of the farm.

Roads

Most of the money that the Shire receives comes from Commonwealth and State road grants, and these works must be finalised and acquitted for the Shire to receive these funds in the future. Unfortunately, during the last financial year the Shire was unable to complete its funded road works projects and has carried over funding.

However, the Shire has been advised that if these works are not completed by the designated deadline, funding must be returned to the governing body. This also risks the Shire not being granted funding in future years. Grant funding works are currently being undertaken by a majority of the works depot crew and will be completed by 30 June 2021 in line with funding requirements. To get our maintenance grading program back on track the Manager of Works and Services has arranged for an extra grader and operator to be added to the team.

Works currently being undertaken on the Kulikup Road South will mean the road will remain closed until construction is complete which is scheduled for the end of June 2021.

Grant Funding Update

The Shire has received approval to proceed with the \$351,364 Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Round 2 projects that will be completed by December 2021.

The Flax Mill Community Facilities Improvements project includes building and safety improvements, public viewing area lighting, exterior cladding on the scrunching shed (to prepare for a future mural) and camp kitchen upgrade.

The Boyup Brook Swimming Pool upgrade will deliver inclusive access, improved safety with a new chlorine delivery system, improved toddler pool access, increased visual amenity with new floor coverings and reticulation, additional shade, and a new publicly accessible gym.

The funds will also deliver improvements and repairs to the Lesser Hall flooring.

The Shire of Boyup Brook received \$457,531 in funding for Round 1 projects. These projects are on track and will be completed by 30 June 2021 including the Boyup Brook Cranbrook Shoulder upgrades, additional street parking on Forrest Street, Stage 1 of the football lights (Stage 2 is pending the CSRFF grant outcome), Flax Mill and Tourist Centre upgrades. Announcements have been made and it is likely a third round of LRCI funding will be available in January 2022.

The Shire is also pleased to announce that with grant funding from the Australian Government through the support of the Stronger Communities Programme Round 6, we will be installing an automatic sliding door for the community swimming pool to improve access for all users including disability access.

This project supports the Shire's Disability Access and Inclusion Plan and aims to ensure people with a disability have the same opportunities to access buildings and other facilities. The installation of the automatic sliding door will allow for wide, safe access and continuity of paths of travel to allow people to move through to the pool safely.

The design focus is about not having to manually open the door to make it easier for all community members, including seniors, families with prams and young children to enter the building. This will allow greater maneuverability and assist to prevent falls for seniors who frequently access this vital community facility.

These sessions were followed by resume writing and job interviews where the students heard a number of tips from CRC Centre Manager, Jodi Nield.






Aboriginal Basket Weaving

It is imperative, A carefully prepared Will is a good start, however this will not be enough to ensure the proper transfer of farming assets and control of your entities such as trusts and companies to your chosen beneficiaries, or to take care of you in your retirement or if you suffer incapacity. A well thought out estate and succession plan will ensure a smoother transition of the farm assets and entities to your chosen successor/s.

Your plan should take into account how your assets and the control of entities are transferred during your lifetime, as well as on your death and include:

- Review of existing or preparation of your Estate/ Business Succession Plan;
- Review and update of the business structure, trust deeds and company constitutions;
- Review and update of partnership, shareholder and other agreements with family members regarding the running of the business and use of the farm land, stock and equipment;
- Preparation of Will, Enduring Power of Attorney, Enduring Power

of Guardianship and other estate planning documents as required.

The plan should also include a strategy for your retirement, whether this is off farm or with you remaining on the land. The funding for your retirement should be carefully considered, including planning for a sufficient superannuation fund or other source of retirement income.

Often there are factors that make this planning process difficult:

- The ability to have meaningful succession planning discussions with your family;
- Only some of the next generation may be involved in the running of the farm, putting pressure on to provide for the non-farming family members;
- Your needs may be different, or in conflict with, the needs of the next generation of farmers

Given all this, it is not surprising that farming estate and succession planning is often pushed to the bottom of the priority list or only dealt with when a major life event occurs. However, preparing for the future can be a relatively straightforward and inexpensive process if done in a timely manner, with the right advisors.

Juggling the needs and expectations of family members when engaging in



estate and succession planning can be difficult, however, it is a process that needs to be undertaken to safeguard the future of your loved ones. This is particularly important

if you are a farming family as not only do have to think about your family, you also need to consider how your farmland and other farming assets will be transferred and maintained to ensure the longevity and future success of your farm.

Family members usually appreciate open communication and clarity about how your farm business and assets are to pass, rather than facing a surprise later. If you avoid having these frank conversations before your death or incapacity, it could result in additional costs, uncertainty and the breakdown of the relationship between your family members.

If your Will or estate is contested, this legal action may put strain on the ability of your farm to operate smoothly and profitably. The lack of clear control of the farming business and entities may restrict the day to day farming operations. This may be avoided if an appropriate plan is in place,

Having these discussions can:

- Address any previously unforeseen legal or taxation issues;
- Allow frank discussion on the expectations of retiring farmers and the next generation;
- Provide certainty to family members on the plan for the next generation;

While it is not always an easy discussion to have, in doing so, a family farming business is given the best opportunity to continue successfully into the future as it passes from one generation of farmer to the next.

Estate and succession planning is not a task that should be put off but is one that should be given as much attention and time as any other essential farming task.

From the Lions Den

Since October 1, 2020 when Containers for Change was introduced to WA, Boyup Brook Lions volunteers have handled 529,049 bottles and cans, handing out almost \$53,000 to individuals and community groups who have taken the appropriate cans and bottles to the Boyup Brook Lions – Containers for Change.

Lions also receive a handling charge which enables them to return money back to the community. Lions have so far shared the money they receive with the following projects:

- Boyup Brook CRC \$500 Makers in May
- NSW floods \$2,000
- Kalbarri cyclone \$1,000
- BlazeAid re-fencing properties after the Wooroloo fire \$1,000
- Manjimup transporters taking hay to burnt properties just north of Perth after the Wooroloo fire - \$1,000
- Boston Walker, an ill local boy \$1,000
- Upper Blackwood Show Society, new toilet block \$5,000

It took the first few months for Lions to pay for the changes required to create the Containers for Change facility but from now on, most of the bottles and cans taken to Lions C4C point will benefit local community projects and also to help emergencies.

All the persons at the Lions Containers for Change are volunteers, but we do not have enough volunteers to enable some to take a break. We urgently need more volunteers from teenagers to those in their 90s, so that we can continue to help fund local and emergency projects. You don't have to be a member of Lions, although we always welcome new members.

Real Estate Matters

It is no secret that the Bridgetown and Greater Region real estate market is performing strongly. Bridgetown has been identified as the second most sought after "city escape" town in WA. York being number one!

Bridgetown's popularity is due to its scenic beauty, its character and its relative proximity to major centre's such as Bunbury/Busselton (1hour) and Perth (3hours). Most importantly it still offers well priced, value for money real estate. Whilst we are seeing a steady rise in prices due to increased demand it is still only single figure rises hence opportunities for buyers.

We have seen an enormous turnaround in demand since April 2020 with all sectors of the market showing signs of growth. All agents have sold listings they have had on their books, in many cases for over two years. The past twelve months have seen more than twice the volume of sales from the previous twelve months. Consequently, pressure is being put on agents having sufficient desirable listings to offer buyers. Why are we suddenly in a "hot" market? People are not travelling overseas; Retirees are getting no return from banks due to low interest rates, so mum & dad investors are buying real estate.

The oversupply of vacant residential lots has prevailed in Bridgetown for the past 15 years with prices in all the Estates plummeting after the GFC. The past twelve months has seen many of the lots sold with a steady price increase.

The buyer demographic is vast from first home buyers to permanent lifestyle retirees to part time weekend/ holiday residents and investors.

If there is a negative to all that has occurred in the real estate market it is the rental crisis. Because the sales market is hot, part time landlords are selling their homes that they have been holding for the past 2 to 3 years. Ex pats have been coming back to WA from overseas and Eastern states putting huge pressure on rental availability. We are already seeing former tenants living in the bush or in cars in the Margaret River area. We have not seen signs yet in our area but it may be likely. Let's hope tenants can find suitable accommodation options in the near future.

*Dependant on needs and eligibility


How to access CHSP

Must be aged 65+ (50+ if Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander) and experiencing difficulty with daily living activities at home.

- Call My Aged Care 1800 200 422
 - to understand needs and care arrangements
 - personalised client record created
- Have a home support assessment
 - a regional assessment service (RAS) assessor will come to your home to discuss your activities, needs, abilities
- Once approved, agree on a home support plan
 - if eligible, the RAS assessor will work with you to develop a personalised home support plan
- Select services providers and work out fees
 - RAS assessor can help identify service providers in the area that are able to provide services. You may be placed on a waitlist.
 - Fees are agreed between you and service providers
- Manage services
 - work with service providers to ensure needs are being met. Suggest reviewing every 12 months.
 - if needs change, may need another assessment.



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The 'Big Hall' at Dinninup


The Big Dinninup Hall was 100 years old in 2020. After the first show in the Agricultural Hall (brick one) in 1919, the overwhelming opinion was that they needed a much bigger venue to accommodate not just cooking and flowers but also wool, vegetables, dairy produce, apples, knitting and sewing.

It was purposely built to display all the exhibits by Mr A. Whittaker of Kulikup. Mr Whittaker was a Secretary early on, and with the President Mr F.W. Gibbs, both were also involved with the early District Display at the Perth Royal Show.

The first shows were held on Thursdays, then in 1933, they changed to Tuesday of the Melbourne Cup Day. Back then the whole town had a holiday for the show with a Ball afterwards.

A Country Women's branch was formed in 1935 and they were into drama, entering the state C.W.A. competitions and forming a separate drama club in the 1950s.

This established a need for a stage and much debate was had on a lean-to, or purpose built stage hall. The Road Board (now the Shire) at the time deemed it should be full stage with provision for a toilet. This was built in 1958 and depicted by this image by Don Russell.



Many groups/ organisations have been catered for in the Dinninup Hall, including the Red Cross, Agricultural Society, Country Women's Association, the annual C.W.A. Christmas Trees, card and games days, Dinninup Cricket Club, Voluntary Defence Corp during WWII, Junior Farmers, Drama Club, church services, badminton, Clinic Sister (infant health), film



nights, W.A. Farmers Union/Federation, Dinninup Fire Brigade and as a Polling place for the Shire, State and Federal Government elections.

Whenever the larger hall is used for functions such as dances, balls, cabarets, birthday parties, weddings, church services etc. the brick hall is used as the catering area and supper hall.

Inside the hall, there is an Honour Board for those who enlisted for World War II.

Two years ago a beautiful new Jarrah floor was put in and now the stage curtains have been replaced. Many thanks must go to Lyn Chambers her efforts in sourcing the fabric from several stores and then ending up and having to sew them together herself. The rich, velvety, dark blue curtains were ready for another stage production and the 100 year celebration.

More memories of the Hall, taken from 'Memory Lane, DINNINUP 6245' by Liz Blechynden

Red Cross: The Dinninup Red Cross was formed prior to the First World War and held 'patriotic' days to raise funds for the war effort. It was at the end of WWII that they decided to hold a special community day with wool and sheep being 'shown'. A committee was formed and resulted in the first Show Day.

Movies were shown between 1936 and 1938. Two enterprising men travelled the Southwest showing pictures in the smaller towns once a fortnight. Bruce Blechynden and Bill Clark built the film projection box onto the northern end of the wooden hall. On hot summer evenings, they would hang the screen on the western outside wall and seat the patrons in comfortable deck chairs. Later, the Shell Picture Co sometimes came to Dinninup, showing such pictures as "The Birdsville Track" and "We of the Never-Never".

The Drama Club came into being in the 1950s with Betty Hamersley and Mollie King producing many plays for Dinninup audiences. Keith Smith operated the stage lighting and sound effects and his wife Mildred did the makeup. Betty, Mollie and Mildred attended drama schools in Perth. The Club had a stage built at the northern end of the large hall and joined the South West Festival Group to compete against Bridgetown, Tonebridge, Manjimup and Boyup Brook. Adjudicators came from Perth to judge the best play on the night.



Angel Flight

Angel Flight have pilots on standby ready to fly into rural and regional towns Australia wide to help get sick and injured Australians to their city medical appointments.

The well-known Australian charity co-ordinates non-emergency flights to assist country people to access specialist medical treatment that would otherwise be unavailable to them because of vast distances and high travel costs.

Angel Flight CEO Marjorie Pagani said the charity have completed almost 50,000 flights since 2003 flying almost 2 million kilometres Australia wide.

"All flights are free and are provided by pilots who volunteer their planes and their time to help get their country friends to their

specialist city medical appointments," Mrs Pagani said. "Once in the city a volunteer driver will provide transport between the airport and their appointment or accommodation," she said.

Anybody can apply for a free Angel Flight who is medically or financially disadvantaged from getting to their city specialist appointment.

A referral can be sent to Angel Flight by a patient's health professional such as a doctor, nurse or social worker, who is familiar with the patient's medical condition. Flight Coordinators can then organise a flight within 5-10 working days and if the referrer is not registered with Angel Flight they can register quickly and easily on the Angel Flight website.

Once a referral has been approved a volunteer pilot and driver is organised and Angel Flight will notify the passengers of all arrangements. "Passengers can fly multiple times if their condition requires them to attend a city medical facility for ongoing treatment. Flights can be organised from most regional airports closest to the passenger's homes.

Angel Flight is an exceptional charity that is funded by donations from individuals, community groups and organisations with 85% of donations going directly into the Angel Flights with only 15% being spent on administration and overheads.

Getting to Know Lance Hester

with Sharon Lampard



After a lot of hard work developing his farm, huge house renovations and community contributions, Lance Hester joked when he said he likes to do as little as possible now that he is retired! Thankfully though, he didn't say no to dropping into the CRC along with wife Margaret last month, to share his story.

Born a premature baby in 1937 at Bridgetown Hospital,

Lance was taken care of mainly by hospital staff for the first six weeks of his life. "The matron there reckoned that I was her baby." He guipped.

His parents were Reg and Dorothy Hester and his family were sixth generation farmers at Bella Vista in Bridgetown. He fondly remembers his childhood, living very close by to the Blackwood River; when he was old enough and could swim, he spent all of his time on the river rowing his boat.

He said both of his parents were very community minded with his mother involved with the Red Cross during War War II and his father had a lot of responsibility in the Volunteer Defence Corp.

Lance remembers going out to the rifle range with his Dad and watching the men learning how to "shoot straight".

His parents also had strong ties with the Church, the Agricultural Society and the golf, tennis and trotting clubs. Lance also remembers hearing his father diligently learning his lines as he got ready to perform in plays for the Bridgetown Repertory Club. Watching his Dad at the performances was when he learnt to appreciate live theatre.

Lance is the second oldest of the five Hester children and describes his eldest sister as the perfect child. Part of the reason for this may have been because she excelled in school whilst Lance hated it! "Any excuse I could think of so I didn't have to go to school, I'd reckon that was great." He remembered.

After his schooling in Bridgetown, at age 13 he half-heartedly started boarding at Hale in Perth, and Lance said he would be very happy when his father needed his help back at the farm. "I remember missing school for a few days to drive the 3 draught horses pulling the super cart while dad tipped the bags into the hopper."

After three years away at school, Lance was very happy to return home and he got straight to work helping his Dad on their property at Emu Downs. "Dad brought the almost all bush farm in 1937 and was only able to clear a few acres a year with a small tractor until the wool boom in 1951, when he had most of the farm bulldozed by a small dozer."

When Lance was 17, he got very sick with Polio and was in the hospital for six weeks. To get him back on his feet this included quarantining and rehabilitation, and when he was feeling a bit better it also included giving the hospital staff some cheek!

When Lance's younger brother decided he also wanted to be a farmer, it meant the Hester's would need more land.


Luckily for them around this time, two of the best farms in Boyup Brook were up for sale, "So that was when we bought Norlup." Lance explained.

Norlup was one of the first farms established in the district, and the house was built in 1874. It was very run down when the Hester's purchased it, but Lance said he loved the old house. When he was 24, whilst his mother was away on a trip, he decided to move himself in and live there independently.

He said it was great for just him; "You'd run the broom over the floors and all the dirt would fall through the boards". And whenever a builder came near the place, he'd ask them what they could do to help, and every one of them said, "You can't do anything, knock it down!"

In 1965, when he met Marg at a nurse's party in Manjimup, she told him that she loved old houses. This news was obviously great for Lance and it helped him decide that she was the one for him! The two married in 1966 and really set about having Norlup house restored.


Around this time, they serendipitously heard of a builder called Sandy Chambers who was just new to Boyup Brook. When Sandy came to look at the house, Lance asked him if he could patch it up so he and Marg could live in it more comfortably for a while, when Sandy replied 'Well why don't you fix it up properly?' This was music to Lance's ears and Sandy was hired for the job immediately!

The main construction by Sandy was completed within two years with the work including patching holes in the walls, fixing the roof, replacing the floors and much more! "We didn't really change the house, we tried to keep it as authentic as possible," explained Lance.

Both Marg and Lance agree they could not have fixed up Norlup house without the help and hard work of Sandy and they are extremely grateful for everything he did. They both had a laugh when they thought about how long it took to restore the house, and joke that it took 30, 40 or perhaps 50 years to get it to completion.

"It was a lot of fun really" recalled Marg, to which Lance chipped in "You've got to be young!" Over the years the Hester's have made the house available for groups to visit and view the great piece of history for Boyup Brook.

Throughout his life, Lance has had many roles in community service but he said his most important one was with St Saviour's Anglican Church. "I have been on the parish council for about 40 years and served on Synod under five bishops. I was also on the board of governors of the Bunbury Cathedral Grammar school for a few years."

Lance and Marg have three children: James, Susan and Kate and it is easy to see that they are extremely proud parents. James is a Crystallographer in Sydney and Susan undertakes research in biosecurity at the University of New England in Armidale, NSW. Kate lives here in Boyup Brook and is the Clinical Nurse Manager at the local hospital.

They are also grandparents to nine children and in July last year their first Great Grandchild, baby Lydia, was also welcomed to the family.

Other the years Lance and Marg have travelled to many places, a few that they never would have dreamed to go to if it wasn't for their children's own adventures. They loved visiting Jamie whilst he worked in Japan and they also visited their daughter Kate who chose to go away on school exchange to Canada.

Marrying Margaret, raising three amazing children and renovating Norlup House are three of Lance Hester's greatest achievements he says. And when asked what some of his best life advice would be he said to work hard, because you get out of it what you put in, and he also quoted Davy Crockett: 'Be sure you're right- and then go ahead'.

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

Last month the BBTA held an event to unveil the contents of the 2010 time capsule, it was a lovely afternoon that brought together current and former residents of Boyup Brook to reminisce on old (and not so old) times. Below is an excerpt from the welcome speech given by BBTA Chairperson, Shirley Broadhurst.

"Of course this event should have occurred last year but we all know what happened to 2020. In particular we recognise the 110th birthday of the building and the people who have played a part in its development.

In 2010 an event was organised to mimic as close as possible the original celebration on the 27th April 1910. The record for 1910 says 'To mark the occasion, a cricket match between Boyup Brook and Dinninup teams was arranged and played on the afternoon, while in the evening an excellent banquet was set out by the wives of the settlers of the district. It was estimated that two hundred guests participated.'

In 2010 a cricket match was attempted but did not come to fruition. Today we acknowledge the Cricket with the stumps and bat here. A gathering in the afternoon enjoyed a comprehensive display at this site and a banquet dinner was attended by 93 persons in our Town Hall.

Ten years ago when the 100th Anniversary came due a decision was made to lay down a Time Capsule to commemorate the history of the Boyup Brook Tourism Association. This galvanised the members into collecting together a record of significant events and people. It was decided that the Capsule would be opened every 10 years to add an update of progress.

About six weeks ago Sue and I decided to check that we knew how to open it well ahead to save any embarrassment today. Imagine our shock and dismay when we found not a single thing in it. And so began the search for material which provided replacements for the missing records. Fortunately Eric Biddle had kept copies of some of the items he had collected at the time and some others of us are hoarders.


Many hours have been spent trawling through archival boxes and talking to people. The results are displayed on the big table in the Collections Room and the items to recognise this last 10 years are on a table in the Art Room....Promptly at the appointed time (time not recorded) Mrs G F Dickson - wife of the chairman of the Committee, Mr G F Dickson - opened the front door and declared the new Hall ready for use on April 27, 1910.

In 2010 Joy, granddaughter of Mrs G F Dickson was invited to dedicate the Time Capsule. Recently we created an Honour

Board to recognise members of the Boyup Brook Tourism Association who have contributed significantly over time and consulted with Jacquie and Sandy Chambers, who were inaugural members of this body, to try to identify worthy people for the honour.

If you are aware of someone else who may qualify please provide us with written details. Today we have asked Harvey, grandson of Mrs G F Dickson to unveil our Honour Board and open the doors of the Centre welcoming you in.

You are invited to view our efforts for the time capsule as well as taking note of the interesting wall boards and gifts in the merchandise room. Please also partake in a cuppa while you exchange memories with others."

St Saviours Snippets

The good oil:

Throughout most of history, olive trees have provided benefits to humans.

Olive oil was used during biblical times in oil lamps to provide night lighting.

These days olive oil is one of the most healthy cooking oils. Olives are enjoyed as a food when pickled and the leaves are claimed to have medicinal benefits.

I conducted trials of growing olives near Dowerin in a 300mm average annual rainfall and no further watering, with reasonable success. In higher rainfalls olive trees have been known to be invasive such as the riparian areas along the mid to lower Blackwood River.

Mature trees are excellent as shade and if needed to be felled for any reason will make superb craft wood.

Olives in the grounds of St Saviour's Anglican Church are crushed to make olive oil for local consumption.
