#### Local Emergency Management Arrangements (LEMA), Recovery Awareness and Local Recovery Plan (LRP) Workshop Update

On 2nd May 2024 the Shire Chambers was filled with enthusiasm from facilitators and a large group of stakeholders in our local emergency management and recovery process following an emergency event.

The aim of the day was to workshop and practice the use of the draft LEMA and LRP through an emergency related discussion exercise and collection of feedback.

These documents are developed to assist to minimise the effects of, ensure a coordinated response to, and provide an effective recovery from an emergency affecting Boyup Brook.

The workshop was very successful and it was amazing to see a diverse group of volunteers and organisations working collaboratively on these documents, with the purpose of the LEMA and LRP being to maximise safety and ensure sound recovery of Boyup Brook's community, preserving lives, livelihoods, and environment in the event of an emergency.

A very big thank you to the stakeholders who attended, for your valuable time and input. Attendees included many community volunteers (Recovery Awareness and Local Recovery Group), Shire Staff, representatives from the Local Emergency Management Committee including Shire President (Chair), Deputy Shire President (Deputy Chair), Local Recovery Coordinator and Deputy, Ranger & Emergency Services, State Emergency Services, Boyup Brook Police, Department of Fire & Emergency Services – Lower SW Region-District Officer, District Emergency Management Advisor, Department of Communities, St John WA – Boyup Brook Sub Centre, Volunteer Fire & Rescue, Volunteer Bushfire Brigade, Boyup Brook Community Resource Centre, DPIRD, Main Roads WA.



The Disability Access & Inclusion Plan (DAIP) 2018-2023 is currently under review and the Shire is seeking comments and feedback from community members, family, visitors and any organisation that has concepts, ideas or suggestions to improve access to services and facilities for people with disability. Under the *Disability Services Act 1993*, as amended, every local and state government agency must develop a DAIP.

The Shire is currently working through the tender process with contractors to secure pricing and a commencement date for the drainage upgrade works required at the cemetery.

In rural areas, it is important to give the full address and distances from landmarks and roads, not just the name of the property. Please don't hang up until the operator has all the information they need. This will help all emergency services attend to the emergency safely and quickly.

#### In Touch Farming

Welcome to this month's In-Touch Farming newsletter. Firstly, I would like to draw everyone's attention to the rapid build-up of RLEM (Red Legged Earth Mite) and lucerne flea in pastures and crops in the last week (time of writing 20th May 2024).

I have noticed massive numbers of lucerne flea in newly sown and established pastures on heavy soil types in the last three days.

Also, the RLEM population is well under way in new sown pasture and in canola where there has been now bare earth treatment. RLEM generally hatch when we have had seven days of daytime temperatures of 20C or below with adequate rainfall (5mm).

Please keep an eye on your crops and pastures and give the numbers below a call to discuss inspections and chemicals/ rates.

#### **Correct Chemical Mixing Order**

- Water Conditions and/or acidifiers Ammonium Sulphate, Wilt 700.
- 2. Wettable Powders (WP) Metribuzin 750WG, Copper, Zinc, Mang.
- Granulated Products (WDG) and Dry Flowables (DF) Diuron, Atrazine, Simazine, Sakura, Rustler, Ultro, Achieve, Factor, Terrad'or, Broadside, Sharpen. High volume granules ahead of low volume granules.
- 4. Suspension Concentrates (SC) (Flowable Products) Diuron Flowable (SC), Overwatch, Priority, Prosaro, Amistar Extra, Mateno, Tenet, Ecopar.
- Emulsifiable Concentrates (EC's) Trifluralin, Hammer, Oxyfluofen (Goal), Alpha Cypermethrin, Dimethoate, Quizalofop (Targa), Tigrex, Tilt, Bifenthrin, Chlorpyrifos, Flight, MCPA LVE 570, MCPA 750, Quadrant, Triathlon, Ester, Haloxyfop (Verdict), Boxer Gold, Prosulfocarb, Dual Gold, Clethodim, Maxentis, Aviator.
- Water Based Soluble Concentrates (SL) Spray Seed, Glyphosate, Amicide, Omethoate (Omen, Le-Mat), Reflex, Intervix.



#### **Empowering Farmers: Early Intervention Against Drought**

### Early intervention key to minimising impact of drought on farmers

Farmers accessing rural financial counselling is key to ensuring greater community resilience in the face of increased drought events – according to farmer and small business proprietor of 35 years turned rural financial counsellor Dean Bavich.

However, Mr Bavich said greater awareness of the financial support services available, combined with a more proactive approach to farm business planning were needed.

The mental health and wellbeing of farmers has received national attention in recent years, particularly following increased recognition of the impacts natural disasters like drought have on producers.

But Mr Bavich said while supporting farmers, it was important to make a distinction between "mental health problems" and "situational distress".

"When someone is under immense stress, their rationality is often clouded," he said. "It's not that they have mental health problems, it's the situation they find themselves in that is the problem."

Mr Bavich said his role was typically to help clients clarify the situation they were dealing with and work through it so the client could see the potential solutions.

"The first step is often accepting there is a situation that needs dealing with," he said. "I've seen people who are right down into the trough, but once we sort out a way forward and they are able to take back control of their finances, they spring back 100 per cent."

Early intervention was critical and could ensure a looming crisis was averted.

"We encourage clients to have a business plan which takes a holistic approach and empowers them to make decisions early rather than procrastinating and potentially suffering the consequences," he said.

Mr Bavich is one of two guest speakers at the fourth in a series of six workshops being held in several locations across the South West between February and September and organised by South West NRM. At the June 14 workshop, the role of financial counselling services will be explored.

The second speaker is Farmanco management consultant Mike Monaghan who will also explore the business planning perspective.

Outcomes of the workshop series will inform development of a Community Resilience Network in preparation for the predicted increase in drought events and evidence of the expected associated social impacts.

South West NRM has partnered with Community Resource Centres throughout the South West to assist with delivery of the meetings.

- Share resources and learnings to develop partnerships across the region;
- Develop plans to further build community resilience.



#### WA Day, World Environment: A Linked Celebration

At the commencement of June, we celebrate WA Day and World Environment Day, and both events may be closely linked.

When we hear of world events, and despite a number of violent incidents locally and worldwide, along with an increasing number of destitute persons in Australia, this country continues to provide an enviable lifestyle. However, we should not be satisfied that we cannot do better.

As with other states, WA engaged in massacres against the original occupiers of these lands. The earliest buildings in Perth had slots built to create fortresses so that firearms could be used against First Nations peoples. I attended night school in the 1950's in such a building in St George's Terrace. While I was judging Tidy Towns Sustainable Communities in Cloncurry, Queensland, the Mayor took me to a cenotaph to the north of town, where more than 400 Original Land Owners/Occupiers had been slaughtered because they had hunted a few cattle **on their own hunting ground.** 

Many missions in WA and other states were established to give children of mixed marriages a "better chance in life". Sadly some of the missions were used by the government of the day, to take children from their families. A mission near Kojonup known as Carrolup and later renamed Marribank had an inspirational art teacher, but not himself an artist. He said to the children, "Here are crayons, paper and pencils, go into the surrounding bush and draw what you see". These became known as the Carrolup Drawings.

Colgate University in USA expressed a desire to have an official public showing of the drawings which were then stored in a cupboard for many years. About 20 years ago, WA Arts Minister Sheila McHale heard that these drawings were no longer displayed and requested their return to Kojonup. Some of those child artists of the late 1940's to early 1950's are still alive. (*Visit www.carrolup.info/ or your own viewing*).

The song of the late Archie Roach comes to my mind: "They took the children away". Archie sang this at what was probably his last public performance, which I attended at the Nannup Music Festival on the eve of COVID in 2019.

On a much brighter note, the unique environment of WA provides a different world of flora and fauna, even though record drought and heat have caused loss of large areas of indigenous trees and shrubs. This year, more than any other, we have become aware of the fragility of our bushland and the effects of extreme weather conditions on our farming communities, predicted to be an indicator of climate change.

Many religious and environmental groups are combining experiences and wisdom to care for our planet and its people. Some groups go beyond Christian organisations to include all of the major religions of the world. This was initiated by a young WA Anglican woman, Grace Forrest, in 2015. She invited and received representation from the heads of the world's religions regarding slavery. This marked the first time in the history for such a gathering of these leaders.

At the time, Grace was too young to vote. This has now expanded to address other world issues. **Just one person can make a world of difference.** I nominated Grace Forrest as Young Australian of the Year in 2022 and as WA Young Australian of the Year, she sat with Grace Tame during the Australian of the Year Awards in Canberra.


#### **Book Review**



#### **Rural Aid - Embrace Wellness Amidst Dry Spell**

Some are experiencing the 'severe dry time' WA is having and the concerns about what the future year holds. Environmental factors do affect our health. This can be both mental and physical health. We need to remain aware that we need to ensure we treat ourselves as a whole person, both physical and mental. There is a real need to look at ourselves in a holistic way, where external factors and how we react, can and does affect our ability to cope.

#### Cancer Council - Bowel Cancer



Living a healthy and fulfilling life is important to us all. But ignoring our health and not seeing a doctor if we have unusual symptoms could have a serious impact on our life and wellbeing. It is important to be aware of cancer symptoms and get checked out by a doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker if you notice anything unusual.

#### Did you know?

Bowel cancer is one of the most common cancers affecting both women and men in Western Australia. Unfortunately, in 2019, more than 1,300 Western Australians were diagnosed with bowel cancer, and just over 400 people lost their lives from the disease. So, it is important to be aware of the common bowel cancer symptoms and to visit your doctor if you have any concerns. If it is bowel cancer, the earlier it is found, the greater the chance of successful treatment.

#### Common symptoms of bowel cancer include:

- Blood in your poo (even just one time) for more than four weeks
- o a new pain, lump or swelling in your tummy
- o feeling tired
- o looking pale
- o losing weight without trying
- a change in normal bowel habits such as runny poo, pooing more often or finding it hard to poo.

If you have noticed anything unusual, tell your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker without delay.

It doesn't mean you've got bowel cancer - often these symptoms turn out to be something less serious, but it's important to tell your health professional and get checked out to be safe. An earlier diagnosis can mean a far better health outcome. 
#### **Pensioner Travel Card Increase**

The Cook Labor Government has announced a \$20.3 million funding increase for the Regional Pensioner Travel Card in the 2024-25 State Budget.

This will see the card's value increase by \$100 to \$675 per year from July 1 2024, offering more transport support for eligible pensioners in the regions. Currently known as the Country Age Pension Fuel Card, it is available for use towards the cost of fuel and/or taxi travel from participating providers.

To be eligible you must be receiving a Centrelink Age Pension, Carer Payment, Disability Support Pension, or a Department of Veterans' Affairs Service Pension, Social Security Age Pension or Income Support Supplement and be living in an eligible regional location.

#### **DFES - Planned Burning**

#### **Burn SMART**

If you own or manage land in Western Australia it is your responsibility to reduce the risk of bushfire impacting it. This applies to all landholders and land occupiers, including private homes, businesses and government.

One of the most effective ways you can reduce fuel loads and the risk of bushfire is planned burning. Planned burning describes deliberately burning a predetermined area under appropriate environmental conditions to reduce fuel loads (the vegetation and dead plant material that can burn in a fire). Planned burns are undertaken under mild and stable weather conditions so that the fire burns slowly and is controllable with low flame heights.

It is important to note however that you are responsible for any fire you light and, if it escapes, you may be liable for the damage it causes.

Reducing fuel increases the chances of your property surviving a bushfire. The more fuel available to a bushfire, the hotter the fire can burn and the harder it is to control. Flammable material such as leaf litter, fallen branches, dead grasses and shrubs provide fuel for fire, allowing it to grow quickly and burn at higher temperatures. This increases the likelihood of damage to your property, neighbouring properties and the environment. In comparison, reduced fuel levels assist not only in reducing how quickly a fire can spread, but it also reduces its spotting distance (how far the fire can jump).

Planned burning is a particularly efficient way to remove fuel over larger areas. When used appropriately, it generally results in less environmental disturbance than other methods. Many native plants and animals can also benefit from periodic fire.

The following information is designed to help you Burn SMART:

- Plan smart, Burn SMART.
- Planned burning can reduce the amount of flammable material on your property, potentially reducing the impact and spread of bushfire.
- In the wrong conditions, a planned burn can escape and become an uncontrollable fire. If you plan to burn, plan to Burn SMART.
- YOU are responsible for any burns on your property and must take care to recognise and manage risks.
- Create a burn plan using the Burn SMART Guide and Burn SMART Checklist.
- Watch the Burn SMART Planned Burning How-To Video Series to revisit the key stages of a planned burn and what you must do in order to Burn SMART.
- Register your burn by calling the DFES Communications Centre on 9395 9209.
- Burning under the wrong conditions can put lives and homes at risk. Property owners are responsible for recognising and managing all risks associated with their burn.

Rules and restrictions can vary from day to day. Always check with your local government for burning restrictions and requirements prior to burning.



#### Have You Heard of "Woop Woop"?

On Saturday, May 18 the *West Australian* featured an article on ghost towns in which there was a mention of 'Woop Woop', a timber mill set up by the Adelaide Timber Company in 1925. In the article it was identified as being "near Boyup Brook", but the site is actually in the Donnybrook Shire. Access is via the old railway line from Wilga (another ex-mill town site) which is within the Shire of Boyup Brook.

The track is rough and overgrown and the site is some distance from Wilga. There is very little remaining, a few weathered timber stumps and bits of rusted metal. The name 'Woop Woop' is believed to be based on the call of the frogs in the area.




