Farmers Helping Farmers

In February, Mat Fairbrass and Aimee Court of Mayanup, generously donated 32 rolls of hay to those affected by the Perth Hills bushfire.

The young beef cattle producers of Fairbrass Park Charolais & Shorthorna, joined in the hay run convoy, consisting of 14 trucks travelling from Mayanup, Kojonup, Wagin, Narrogin, Pingelly, Newdegate and Williams.

Farmers Across Borders committee member Peter Warburton, of Warby's Transport, organised the special delivery that saw 621 bales of hay delivered to the disaster zone.

As well as the fodder, all of the drivers donated their time, trucks and the fuel.

The convoy formed at the Pingelly CBH site on Sunday February 7, and travelled to a private property in Wooroloo via York and The Lakes.

The hay arrived at 12pm and was already being distributed to farmers in need that very afternoon.

"It was important for Mat and myself to help with a donation as we personally knew cattle farmers in the fire affected area who had lost their property. It was seeing images and videos from these farmers that showed the desperate need for any sort of feed for the cattle, as the land had been burnt and the cattle were exhausted.

"The donation was well received by those affected in the


Wooroloo area. The 621 bales are only a short term solution to keep the cattle alive, but seeing the grateful farmers and their family collect their allocated feed and appreciate our effort was totally worth it and we would do it again," said Aimee.



Behind the Scenes C4C

If you have been down to the local Containers for Change (C4C) Refund Point at the Waste Transfer Station, you might have seen some fellow community members volunteering their time to count your containers.

The Lions Club of Boyup Brook have done a great job of transforming the old tip shop into the C4C headquarters, and they are on hand three times a week to count your eligible drink containers for a 10cent refund.

I have been volunteering when I have some spare time on the weekends and have been pleasantly surprised by how much enjoyment I get out of it. Not only are the people nice, but the counting can be therapeutic and there is the added bonus of getting in a light workout, all whilst volunteering your time towards a great cause.

The job itself includes counting the containers that come through, carting them to their separate collection bins, recording the number of items and a bit of banter with the locals coming through. Sundays also come with a special treat for volunteers-a Sundae on a Sunday!

All PPE is provided including gloves, a fluoro vest and ear plugs in case it gets a little loud. All you need to do is wear a comfortable pair of enclosed shoes or boots on the day.

The opening hours are Thursday and Saturday from 10am-2pm and on Sunday 11am-2pm.

If you would like to start volunteering, you can either drop in one day to meet the crew, or call Glenda on 9765 2958 for details.

Boyup Brook is lucky to have had a local community group take on the big task of providing a local C4C refund point. There are towns that did not have any one step up and they would have to travel elsewhere to take part in the fundraising scheme.

As with so many services in Boyup Brook, it relies on the generosity of community members giving their precious time to keep it afloat. If you can spare some time, I highly recommend giving it a go!

Annual General Meeting of Electors

The audit is scheduled for the beginning of March, a date for the Annual Electors Meeting will be announced once the Shire has received the audit results.

Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Round 1

The Shire of Boyup Brook is excited to announce it has received \$457,531 in funding to deliver 5 projects for the community, as part of the Australian Government's 'Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program' (LRCI Program).

The purpose of the LRCI Program is to support jobs and help local economies bounce back from the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Round 1 projects that you will see commencing soon include:

- Boyup Brook Cranbrook Shoulder upgrades
- Additional street parking on Forrest Street
- Stage 1 Football Oval lights (2 x 30m light poles to enable training)
- Flax Mill Park upgrades to ablution block, automatic reticulation system for the Caravan Park and upgraded lighting
- Tourism Centre upgrades to toilet septic system, addressing the rising damp.

Community Grants open in March

Animal Establishment - (Dog Kennel)

The local government has received an application to use and/or develop land for the following purpose and public comments are invited.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Re. Autumn burning of bush.

I believe we need to change our culture of burning bush in summer and autumn while the soil is dry rather than waiting until after the opening rains when the soil is wet before burning.

There is a layer of decomposing vegetable matter in the top layer of the soil. This is the most valuable part of the soil profile because it is where carbon is being sequestered into the soil, and it contains seeds of native vegetation, waiting for fire above them to smoke them which makes them germinate. Burning this layer leaves the soil barren and allows grasses to get in, and these are much more flammable than the native plants.

As well as this, a lot of red gum nuts from trees above germinate, and the young red gum trees grow quickly and produce a lot of dead leaves which are slower than other species to break down, tempting us to burn too often.

There are several examples of what not to do close to Boyup Brook, such as the hospital hill and the corner opposite the lodge, which used to have beautiful wildflowers. Now the bush on the west of the town is under threat.

I therefore believe we should change our practice by not burning bush, including roadsides, until after the opening rains.

I would like the Boyup Brook Shire to lead the way by influencing other organisations not to burn bush on dry soil in the autumn. We could even change our reputation of having some of the worst roadsides in WA.



Do you need some support, but don't know where to start? The Community Connector may be your first point of call.

The Boyup Brook Community Resource Centre has secured funding through the Department of Communities Age-friendly Communities Social Connectivity Grants Program, to establish the Community Connector project, that will foster relationships and facilitate connections between seniors and local community groups, service providers and like-minded individuals.

The Community Connector was launched on February 23 at the CRC in the presence of a number of community members, health professionals and support agencies, who were all excited to see the initiative come into being.

The idea for the project came about through the health and aged care meetings and discussions which have been occurring in the community over the past six months. It was identified that having someone locally, who could help seniors navigate the myriad of systems and connect with support networks, was a priority for Boyup Brook.

The project will create a directory of community groups and support services, and develop a network of volunteers to assist community members in forming connections. Once the initial connection with a service, group or activity has been formed, the Community Connector will follow up and check in with the client to monitor their level of connectedness.

Mr Don Railton – Design & Technology Teacher High School

For the last 37 years of my working life I have worked at the Orbital Engine Company. Orbital as it is known now started off as a Research & Development (R&D) company working on a new design of engine and eventually a fuel system. I started as a machinist and was soon encouraged to return to study where I completed a Diploma in Mechanical Engineering.

Orbital was (and still is) a very interesting place to work and I had a diverse range of projects given to me during my time there. Things like measuring the reaction rates of catalytic converters, setting up a Hard chrome plating bath and learning how to finish metal surfaces so they are light tight, engine thermodynamics, mechanics etc.

Orbitals main work now is building drone engines for military and civilian use. My biggest achievement was investigating and eventually understanding why some of these engines were failing randomly in flight. Real Estate Matters

What a year we have all experienced! For some people COVID 19 has been devastating and we certainly feel for them, but for others it has been hugely beneficial. Water Refill Station For Hire

The Boyup Brook CRC Water Refill Station was purchased in late 2020 with funding made available through a Keep Australia Beautiful, Community Litter Grant.

Refill, Not Landfill is the message that the water refill station aims to promote when it is hired out to both community and private events within the area.

"When conducting our community clean ups, we have found that one of the most littered items picked up in the Boyup Brook recreation grounds is single use plastic bottles," said CRC Project Officer Sharon Lampard.

"With the water refill station available for hire at all local events, we aim to turn this statistic around."

When it is not hired out, the refill station is positioned semi permanently on the CRC verandah. This means the whole community, as well as those travelling through town, can use the facility to fill up their bottles with free filtered water.

It is a hygienic, contact free system that works by activating a sensor on the side of the unit. It is simple to set up, only requiring a tap to connect to, making it the perfect addition for any event.

It was given its first work out at the recent Community Clean Up on February 15, where a water refill came in very handy for participants on the 36 degree day!


The Water Refill Station was designed and made in Australia through a company called meetPAT.



For the second year in a row the winning team of the day was "Get Foxed" with 993 points. Between Justin Corker, Brett Kinsman, Buchanan Gibbs, Mitch Corker, Hayden Bock, Tom Burkett and Mackenzie Nix they managed to cull 91 foxes, 5 cats and 4 rabbits. Well done guys.

The second team was the "McAlinden Death Squad" who culled 40 foxes and 11 rabbits. Third was "Fresh Foxes" with 32 foxes, 1 cat and 5 rabbits. Well done to all.

As the lockdown meant the city-based teams could not attend the fox shoot, we decided to run the fox shoot over 2 weekends to accommodate them. Thank you very much to the farmers who were willing to allow these shooters on their properties. It is a privilege to be able to give city folk the opportunity to join in with the fox shoot and give them a piece of the lovely rural lifestyle we take for granted. They very much appreciate the opportunity.

We were again fortunate to have the Boyup Brook Shire providing a loader and a truck to put all the critters in and for the disposal of it all. Thank you very much for making it a lot easier for us – special thank you to Calvin Brown for giving up part of your Sunday to help us.

Getting to Know.... Anne Ritson

In the February Lockdown, thankfully phone calls were not out of the question and Anne Ritson was available to have a chat. She shared stories of her childhood and family, community service, politics, travel and farm life. It was a pleasure getting to know more about what has kept her so busy over the years.

Anne Ritson was the oldest child born to John and Jean Hearman, during World War II in Perth. Upon her father's return from the war in 1946, the Hearman family moved back to their farm in Donnybrook, which had unfortunately been neglected for a few years by then.

Reflecting on her upbringing, Anne said she realises now that her family had very few possessions early on and very little money. But she said her mother was frugal and they definitely made do. Both of her parents were disciplinarians but they were also very kind, "We lived in the family with lots of love," she said.

She had two younger brothers and one sister and all of the Hearman children had chores, "I used to milk cows before I went to school. We had a dairy farm, the boys had to chop wood".

Despite not living near family, Anne said she had a lot of adopted aunts and uncles, some of which spread to Boyup Brook. She said there was a lot of social connection between the two towns back then.

Anne attended school in Donnybrook until year ten, before undertaking two years at Perth Ladies College. Her favourite subject was English and she loved to read books, which she could be found doing even when she was meant to be studying.

After high school, she trained to be a nurse for three years at Royal Perth Hospital, and thrived in the hands on approach to learning. She did another six months at Princess Margaret and a year in Bunbury after this.

Anne first met her future husband Roland at a cabaret, most likely in Boyup Brook. After some time went by, with Anne in Bunbury nursing and Roland travelling for work to Papua New Guinea, the two reunited at a mutual friends wedding and started dating from there.

Anne first moved to Boyup Brook after they married in 1967. At first they were living in a caravan amongst the bushland on Grindon Farm. "The aim was to clear 100 acres a year and crop it in the same year." They set about doing this in an environmentally conservative fashion, work they continued when they moved to the old farmhouse after Roland's parents retired

Over the years Grindon Farm produced Olive Oil, Olives, Wool and Sheep, but in more recent years it has been more about the Superfine Wool.

The farm was just one part of Anne's very busy life upon moving to Boyup Brook, she also did a stint nursing at the local hospital, started a family and she threw herself into community service.

Since 1967, Anne said in one way or another she's held office for the Liberal Party in the region. "It's been kind of my life really," she said. Politics was in the family, with her father serving as Blackwood MLA in the fifties and sixties for the Liberal Party.

Whilst he did not push his political agenda onto his family, Anne said going along with him to events in different towns, she got to meet very interesting people and this more than anything inspired her to keep moving in this direction.

Her service in this area has seen her take on many roles, including President of the Women's Committee. She loved this organisation as they were always out and about doing things.

Highlights of her involvement include the re-establishing of the shop at the Kind Edward Memorial Hospital, initiating the Breast Cancer Van service for regional communities and also many City to Surf events helping to raise money for breast cancer.

Anne was only the second female in WA to receive a Distinguished Service Award for the Liberal Party, and also met a Prime Minister whilst representing WA interstate.

Girl Guides has also been a huge part of Anne's life after she took over the role of leader quite abruptly in 1968, when the previous leader moved to Albany. "There were a heap of girls there that didn't have a leader, so I went in completely blind". However, they had found themselves a brilliantly loyal teacher in Anne, who has been doing the role now for over 50 years.

Whilst the uniforms and the programs may have modernised over this time, Anne said the essentials are all still there and she enjoys teaching leadership, citizenship, teamwork and skills, that she is confident the girls will use for life.

"Guiding wasn't just Boyup Brook," she says. In fact, Anne was also the regional leader in charge of an area south of Bunbury all the way to Albany, and on the state council. These roles saw her travel interstate representing WA at different national meetings.



Travel is something Anne has done much of. Aside from representing the Girl Guides and the Liberal Party interstate, her and Roland have also visited many other countries being a part of the Superfine Wool Growers Association. This organisation took to several countries that they wouldn't have gone to otherwise.



Family ties in the UK, with her father born in England and her mothers parents coming from Scotland, has also meant visits to these places as well. Over the years, other places that have been ticked off include Italy, Hungary, Israel, Africa and Singapore.

A place the Ritson's have previously travelled to regularly is Queensland, to visit their son and his family who live there. Plans like this are on hold due to the pandemic, with travel still being quite risky interstate. Anne and Roland also have a daughter living in Perth.

Despite all of Anne's personal accolades, which also included earning Boyup Brook's 2018 Citizen of the Year, it is her family that she treasures the most. Marrying Roland, being able to have her children and now also having two grand children makes Anne feel very blessed.

In 2005, Anne gave away all of her roles, except those she held in Boyup Brook. She wanted to dedicate more of her time to the farm, and she found the rigorous travelling to and from Perth up to two times a week, was taking away her ability to do this.

Anne still serves locally as a committee member on the Upper Blackwood Agricultural Society. Over her 40 years with them she was previously the Secretary, Vice President and was the first female President.

She also has strong ties with St Saviours and makes regular visits to the local hospital as the Chaplain representing the Anglican Church.

Two things became very clear to me when I was spending time with Anne, firstly it was seeing how much she loved Boyup Brook, "I don't want to live anywhere else, and I think Boyup is just so fortunate. But we've made it that way. We are pretty special."

Secondly it is her passion for serving her community, "It's not what the town can do for you, its what you can do for the town." Anne was very fortunate to learn this lesson very early on from her own community-minded parents, she now passes this wisdom on to all the girls she guides and beyond.

Hawaiian Ride for Youth

More than 140 cyclists are gearing up to put mental health first as training commences for the 2021 Hawaiian Ride for Youth.

The annual event will see some of the state's most prominent businessmen and women tackle the staggering 700km ride across regional Western Australia from March 23 to 27 2021, in an effort to raise critical awareness and funds for Youth Focus to support youth at risk of suicide and those living with mental health challenges.

Over 25 teams will cycle three routes: the Coastal, Inland and Wheatbelt routes from Albany to Perth covering over 2,000km in just 4.5 days.

Riders will visit the Boyup Brook District High School on Thursday, March 25 at 9.30am to share stories of their personal struggles with mental illness, how they have come out the other side, and most importantly encourage open and honest conversations amongst students.

Now in its 19th year, the three-time national award winning ride has raised more than \$24 million since its inception to help Youth Focus continue to provide free mental health services to thousands of young people each year.

Hawaiian Ride for Youth Chair and passionate mental health advocate, Christina Matthews said the event continues to create conversations around the social issues and mental health challenges faced by young people everywhere.




"Not only does the Ride go a long way in raising funds to support young Western Australians, but it also acts as a fundamental platform to allow for incredibly important conversations around mental health and the ongoing challenges our youth are facing today," Ms Matthews said.

Suicide is the biggest killer of young people in the nation, with Australian Bureau of Statistics data showing 49 young people aged between 15 and 24 took their own lives in WA in 2019/20.

For every suicide, another 25 people attempt to take their own lives. Each rider must commit to raise at least \$5,000 to participate in the Ride.

Our high-tech society is producing stressed-out people; statistically for every hour technology saves you, it consumes two more. Author Keri Wyatt Kent writes: 'Every time you say "yes" to something, you're saying "no" to something else. Prioritise what is most important in your life.

Try these tips:

- 1) Slow down.
- 2) Focus on one thing.
- 3) Simplify your life.
- 4) Take at least 1 day off a week.
- 5) Be content with what you have.





Cricket Report

The Boyup Brook Cricket Club has finished off the home and away season in 3rd spot, and on the 27th of February played a home knockout final against Pemberton.

After a great start to the season, the boys have struggled the last month losing their last three home and away fixtures. On the 30th January the boys travelled to Pemberton.

Losing the toss and fielding first, Pemberton made a solid start to be 0-47, but some great bowling from Tristan Mead (3-15), Jakob Marsh (3-21), Nic Bunnett (2-11) and Jason Raven (1-9 off 9 overs) meant Boyup ripped through the Pemberton batting line-up to bowl them out for 95. In reply, Boyup lost an early wicket before coasting to the target with the loss of only the one wicket.

Jason Raven continued his impressive season with the bat, notching up his first hundred for the club, before he was dismissed for 103. Once Jason was dismissed, Tristan Mead continued from where Jason left off, and notched up very quickly his 17th Boyup century, finishing on 134 not out.

Tim Mead (37), Josh Miller (14) and Scott Tweedie (13) all contributed as Boyup finished with a massive 340 runs from their 45 overs.

The next week saw the top of the table clash between Bridgetown and Boyup. This game was meant to be the past players and 20-year premiership reunion from 2001, however, due to the COVID lockdown that had to all be postponed.

Bridgetown won the toss and chose to send Boyup in. After losing a couple of early wickets Boyup looked to have settled with the score on 2-57, but then disaster struck as Boyup's middle order all played poor shots to lose 4 wickets for 2 runs.

Bridgetown bowled out Boyup for 110, which would have been a whole lot worse if not for a final 30 run partnership between Jakob Marsh (12*) and his brother Cameron (11). Jason Raven (11), Tim Mead (15), Tristan Mead (25) and Steven Hill (13) all made starts but no player went on with their innings.

In reply, Boyup bowled and fielded well to have Bridgetown at 5-77, and it looked like Boyup could steal an unlikely victory, however, Bridgetown batted smartly to pass the score with 3 wickets in hand and finish their innings on 147. Jacob Maw with 3-24 and Jakob Marsh 2-19 bowled well for Boyup.

The following week Boyup hosted Forestry in a decider to see who would finish top 2. Boyup lost the toss again, but this time the opposition decided to bat. A few early wickets had Forestry 2-16, but as we have seen all season, they have depth in their batting, and they managed to bat sensibly to end their innings 9-142 on a tricky pitch.

Veteran Tristan Mead was superb with figures of 1-6 off his 9 overs. Declan Holland (3-29), Jacob Maw (2-23) and Joseph Thompson (2-4) all bowled well.

In the run chase, Boyup started well to have 19 on the board, but then the all-too-common collapse occurred as Boyup lost 6 for 21, to be 6-40.

Tristan Mead and Luke Reilly went about rebuilding the innings and at 6-88 the game was on tender hooks. Unfortunately, Tristan was caught on the boundary for a well-made 54, and when Luke fell two balls later, Boyup lost their last 4 wickets for no runs, handing Forestry a 54-run win.

Boyup had to pick themselves off the canvas and head down to Northcliffe for a game that made no difference on their final ladder position. Again, Boyup lost the toss and the opposition batted first.

A good all-round performance with the ball and in the field ensured Northcliffe were bowled out for 145. Jason Raven and Tristan Mead both took 3 wickets each.

Boyup lost their first two wickets cheaply, before Josh Miller (17) and Scott Tweedie (20) resurrected the innings. After both their dismissals it was left to Steven Hill to steer Boyup to victory. 
