Community Gathers to Remember Them

A thick smoke haze did not hinder ANZAC Day in Boyup Brook with strong crowds attending the dawn and mid-morning services, as well as the commemoration at the Boyup Brook Soldier's Memorial Hospital.

At the mid-morning event, the Parade marched along Abel Street to the War Memorial before Boyup Brook RSL Sub-Branch President, Colin Hales began by thanking those who participated in driveway services in 2020. He extended thoughts to those in the Perth and Peel regions, who would again be commemorating in this manner, with ANZAC services and marches cancelled due to the COVID-19 lockdown.

2021 marks 100 years of the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF), and flypast had been organised for the event, however it unfortunately was cancelled due to the metropolitan lockdown situation.


Colin took the opportunity to note the links of Boyup Brook to the Air Force, including four men who died on active service during World War II: Flight Sergeant 467 Squadron Robert Ingersole Gates (presumed dead 1943); Flight Sergeant 467 Squadron George Arthur Shoesmith (died 1944); Flight Sergeant 4 Service Flying Training School, Stanley William Cross (died 1943); Leading Aircraftman Headquarters Pearce, John Warner Benson (died 1942). He also shared his own family's association with the Air Force with Leading Aircraftmen Tom and Keith Hales both discharged in 1946; and Des Hales who is currently based at Pearce Air Base.

Boyup Brook's 2021 Citizen of the Year Lyn Willett addressed the gathering and provided an insight into the lives of those who stayed home, particularly the experiences of her parents, Sydney and Blanche Letchford.

Syd was called up for National Service and undertook the required training, until falling sick. After three weeks in a regimental aid post, he was granted leave and it took a further four weeks to recover from the illness, with the lasting effects including a lifetime of suffering from bronchitis. Upon waiting to return to his second term of training, the Government identified farmers as essential workers to provide for the country and troops overseas, meaning Syd could return to the land. This was not always seen in a positive light, with those remaining at home often ostracised by others who believed they should be serving their country on the battlefront. White feathers in the post were symbolic of this view, with Syd himself a recipient of such an item, finding this very hurtful. "They did their best for their fellow countryman, they did their best for their country" reflected Lyn.

She also spoke of the impacts that the war had on civilian life with men, women and children all required to work hard. Rations of petrol, food and clothing were in place, with coupons allocated to families. Blackouts were a way of life, with no lights to be seen in homes, or on vehicles, after a certain time. A home guard unit was established in Boyup Brook with training occurring every Sunday morning. Italian Prisoners of War (POW) arrived in Australia late in the war to strengthen the local workforce, with the Letchford family providing their allocated POW a room in a separate building, meals with the family, and a visit to the neighbouring farm each week to see another POW.

The service also featured a poem written by WA Bush Poet, Keith 'Cobber' Lethbridge called *Gallipoli*, colourful wreaths were laid at the foot of the memorial by many community representatives, the Ode, prayers, Last Post and Rouse, flag raising and the singing of the Australian National anthem by Haylee Fitzgerald and Caitlyn Imrie, with Rhonda Parker leading the New Zealand anthem.

Set to be announced this month are the ABC Radio Spirit of Volunteering Awards and one of Boyup Brook's very own has made the top ten finalists.

The Awards recognise thousands of unsung heroes who through volunteering, have enhanced the lives of others and the community.

Renee Knapp has been recognised for her work towards developing the Boyup Brook Community Mental Health Action Team (CoMHAT).

As the Founder and Chair of CoMHAT, Renee has been the main driver of the procurement of a local Mental Health Officer in Boyup Brook and the delivery of over \$60,000 worth of mental wellbeing projects in the last twelve months.

Since its inception in 2016, she has been involved in the delivery of three Community Wellbeing Festivals, the development of a Youth Zone and activities, the delivery of school incursions, Women's Gather evenings and Blokes' Night events – all focussing on mental health education and awareness.



Through CoMHAT, partnerships have been established with more than fourteen organisations, ranging from local schools and businesses, Government and Mental Health services and non-profit groups.

"I think what I bring to the role is really coordinating change in Boyup Brook and helping to facilitate that to happen, in a framework that allows our different sectors across Boyup Brook, like our police, our educators, our health professionals and our businesses to work together to achieve a common goal."

Renee is up against nine other volunteers from across the state, with voting now closed. The winner will be announced on May 23. Well done Renee and good luck!

Annual General Meeting of Electors

A date for the Annual Electors Meeting will be announced once the Shire has received the audit results.

Ordinary Council meeting held on 25 March 2021

At the Ordinary Council meeting held on 25th March 2021, Council approved the following:

- ⇒ Subdivision Application Lots 12372 and 12416 Cootayerup Road Chowerup.
- ⇒ Development Application (Chalet Short Stay Holiday Accommodation) - Lot 105 Donnybrook - Boyup Brook Road.

Special Rural Properties - Gross Rental Value (GRV) method as a basis for a rate application

That Council resolved not to introduce the GRV rating method for special rural zone properties due to:

- a.) Widespread opposition to the change in rating expressed by the affected community and
- b.) Financial difficulty that may be afforded to some special rural landholders.

Ward Boundary Review

That Council advise the Local Government Advisory Board that Council has considered submissions made during the consultation on its proposed ward review and has resolved to adopt Option 5 as detailed in Council's Review of Ward Boundaries and Representation Discussion Paper, retaining the current number of Wards, being the Benjinup Ward, Dinninup Ward, Scotts Brook Ward and Boyup Brook Ward and retaining the current representation with 9 Councillors based on the following considerations

- Each of the wards is based on a locality within the Shire, are centred around activity centres and nodes that share a common community of interest.
- Each of the wards are centred on localities that share common physical and topographical features.
- Each of the wards share common demographic factors and trends.
- Each of the wards contain communities that share common economic factors.
- The ratio of Councillors to Electors in the various wards will be within the thresholds set by the boards with the lowest deviation ratio of the options considered.

CSRFF Grant Application and Budget Allocation

That Council resolved to approve the submission of the Community Sport and Recreation Facilities Fund (CSRFF) application for the \$120,464 (ex GST) project for the Boyup Brook Recreational Oval Lighting Upgrade, to install two additional light towers to bring the whole oval up to semiprofessional match practice standard 100 lux and make allocation of \$40,155 in the 21/22 Budget as the one third project contribution.

Local Roads and Community Infrastructure

These projects have now been approved and will be completed by 30 December 2021:

- Flax Mill Community Facilities Improvements \$108,900
- Boyup Brook Swimming Pool Upgrade \$227,464 2.
- Lesser Hall Improvements \$15,000

Boyup Natural Areas

I'm writing in response to Roland Ritson's letter in the March Gazette.

I couldn't agree more with Roland's explanation of why burning bushland under-storey should be delayed until after the rain has started in late autumn. It follows that the ground cover layer of humus is damp and therefore retained as it doesn't burn so readily.

Our soils are known for their lack of organic matter, nutrients and water-holding capacity, so we'd do well to use burning techniques that preserve that top layer of composting material which serves those functions.

Hopefully, Boyup Brook Shire heeded your call to lead the way in this important matter!

Indeed, the remnant natural areas throughout this region are excessively threatened, not only by poor burning techniques, but also by vehicle compaction, weed invasion, littering/rubbish dumping, firewood removal, excavation, feral animals, introduced diseases and the numerous knock-on effects of tree removal such as wind damage, soil erosion, salination, acidification and disrupted water tables.

I for one, would be a willing volunteer in assisting Council to restore and maintain the natural areas around Boyup Brook. Thank you Roland for raising this issue to local public awareness.

For the second time, the road signpost for Corker Road in Mayanup has been removed. Within a month of it first being erected, the name plate was removed. A week ago the complete post was removed, which includes both Corker Road and Basford Road name plates.



59 riders attended the school to share personal stories and communicate the importance of positive mental health.

One particular speaker provided his top three tips to always remember in life; find a purpose, speak up and talk to others and lastly, lean on others when you need support.

The cyclists were provided with a legendary morning tea put together by the P&C and the school band entertained everyone with a number of cover songs.

Each student made a gold coin donation and the \$260 raised was presented to the riders on the day.

There were more than 140 cyclists that participated in this year's event, travelling 700 kilometres throughout regional WA. In total they raised \$1.89 million for Youth Focus taking the total fundraising amount to over \$25 million since the Ride's inception in 2003.

Youth Focus is a unique not-for-profit organisation working from Geraldton to Albany and offering a range of mental health services and support for young people aged 12-25 and their families in Western Australia.

The organisation seeks to reduce suicide in young people and help them overcome issues associated with depression, anxiety, self-harm and suicidal thoughts.

All teams competed very well and in an extremely close finish, the winners were the purple team of Kayden Turner and Logan Fisher who received \$30 vouchers, along with Eloise Bagshaw, Henry Simpson, Charlie Clark and Indi Forbes who received special mentions. Both students and staff had a very exciting and enjoyable week.

Year 8 -10 Aspirational Camp

Our Year 8 to 10 students completed a three day Aspirational Camp at the end of Term 1 to explore career pathways and opportunities as well as enjoying some swimming, snorkelling and bush walking around the Yallingup and Dunsborough coast.

On the first day we incorporated visits to the Wellington Forestry Discovery Centre where we had a number of guest speakers who spoke on the career opportunities in the Forestry industry and we were able to look at the diversity of our Jarrah forests.



From there we travelled to the Wellington Dam and checked out the amazing mural while having lunch. Our final day saw a train ride to the end of the jetty and the Underwater Observatory at the end of the jetty.

Getting to Know... Glenda Moroni

With Volunteer Week coming up in May, it was time to get to know one of the Lions Club of Boyup Brook's very own volunteers in Glenda Moroni. It was a pleasure learning about the stories that have shaped her life, all the way from Bendigo to Boyup Brook and many places in between.

Glenda was born in Bendigo, Victoria in 1949. She was the oldest of four children, and shares her birthday with her

youngest brother, although they were born 11 years apart.

From an early age her parents instilled in her to work hard and look after what she had. She said they were a pretty typical poor family, and remembers one trick in particular that her mother would use when money was scarce, "Mum used to find the thickest cardboard she could, if our shoes had holes in them. And that would do until we could afford to buy a new pair." she said.

A weekend treat was going to the drive-in, so long as they had all done their chores. This often included helping their father clean the eggs from his 3000 laying hens and washing the carrots.

Her father was born in Australia, although his parents were both Italian and he was an Italian market gardener.


He sadly passed away at only 53, which meant her mother had to take over the business. But Glenda said after having troubles with her widow pension and being forced to pay all of it back, her mother was left bankrupt. This event called all of the Moroni kids in to action, and Glenda said "We were all keen to get working, and do what we could to help".

Her first job was in an ordnance factory in Bendigo, making machine gun ammunition belts. She said it was a grounding experience, working harmoniously amongst a mix of people both male and female.

After this she was encouraged to take care of her Grandmother who had had a stroke. "It was a great privileged to look after her." This experience taught Glenda that she had an affinity for nursing.

So in 1970, she started her three years of general nursing training in Castlemaine, Victoria. On the weekends she was often travelling back to help her mother who had fallen ill with cancer, with Glenda eventually moving back to nurse her at the family home until she passed away.

In 1976, after undergoing midwifery training, Glenda set off on her motorbike with adventure on her agenda, at first heading for Queensland.

For the next few years, she spent a lot of time up in the north of Australia delivering babies in Aboriginal communities. She really enjoyed it and said she'd do it all over again if she was younger.

Working in Warburton was where she met her partner Carol in 1985, who was also a nurse. When things started to get difficult in the town, they decided to head south and originally thought they'd live in Esperance. But when they got to Bridgetown they decided to stay, buying the local fish and chip shop.

After running this labour intensive business for three years, seven days a week, they both decided to go back to nursing and for the next eighteen years Glenda worked part time on shift, at the Boyup Brook hospital.

Whilst working in Boyup Brook, they were living on a farm property in Winnejup where they were also kept busy tending to a hobby farm.

In 2004, they decided it was time for a change and so moved on to Albany for a new chapter. But Glenda does not hold fond memories of their four years there, as when she struggled to get into the workforce, her mental health declined.


So one day, when Carol asked her where she wanted to go next, Glenda said "I want to go back to Winnejup please," so they moved back in 2008.

This is when Glenda started her role as a Practice Nurse at the Boyup Brook Medical Centre. She describes it as a wonderful time and only retired in 2017 when her body kept telling her it was time to slow down.

Over their years together, Glenda and Carol have travelled to many places. A trip to Iceland she describes as one of the most exciting with its beautiful scenery, but visiting a friend in Fort Smith in the US might have topped them all, "Dog sledding, camping in the snow, ice fishing- probably one of the best holidays we've had," recalls Glenda.

They have also been to England a few times visiting Carol's family, they chased history whilst in Shimla, India and saw the ice breaking in the Fjords, to name a few more quests.

Glenda feels it has been quite important to get out and see all of these places and experience the different ways in which people live.



Glenda joined the Lions Club of Boyup Brook in 2015 after meeting Rose Dickson at the Boyup Brook Lodge. Although traditionally you are supposed to be invited to join Lions, Glenda was convinced she had met one of "God's Angels" in Rose, and when she politely asked her if she could join the club, Rose replied "Of course you can."

In her time with the club, Glenda is very proud that they are able to provide the Sandakan

Scholarship, that pays tribute to those that were lost in the 'Death Marches' in North Borneo during World War II, "I believe we need to keep honouring that," she said.

The work they are doing most recently with Containers for Change is a project that must also not be underestimated with its potential to be a boundless source of fundraising. This endeavour will enable the club to keep giving back to the Boyup Brook community and other worthy causes for many years to come.

Since it began in October 2020, with the support of the community carting their containers to the Waste Transfer Station, the Lions have raised more than \$30,000. This has already allowed them to support upgrades to the Dinninup Showgrounds as well as give much needed funds to disaster affected areas in different parts of Australia.

The Lions Club of Boyup Brook understand the huge responsibility that is now on their shoulders in the fair distribution of the funds, with Glenda acknowledging, "There's lots of projects that money can be spent on, we just need to make sure we do it the right way."

Looking forward, the club will be asking for applications for funds in writing so each request can be properly assessed.

Of her hobbies now Glenda laughed when she replied, "Only got one, counting cans!" But in truth, she loves to get away caravanning with Carol and also enjoys days spent at home with their animals that include cats, dogs, chooks and some finches that she breeds.

She also said she loves making money, whether it be for herself or for her community, which seems to be a fitting attribute for a Lions Club member who solely raises money for the betterment of their community.

Her best life advice is to believe in yourself and, "Do what you want to do and if you've got a dream, get on and do it... You think you've got a long time to do things, and you haven't'.
