## **Lest We Forget**

A sea of umbrellas were scattered amongst the respectful crowd at Boyup Brook's chilly mid-morning ANZAC Day service, held at the local War Memorial on Tuesday, April 25.

Despite putting in an order for dry weather, Boyup Brook RSL Sub-branch President. Colin Hales said the farmers need for rain, had won that battle for the day.

The service Parade was led in by riding member of the Australian Light Horse Association, Shelley Chick on horse and registered Waler Blaze.

Cindy Armstrong took the attendees through Acknowledgement of Country, followed by an opening address by Shire President Richard Walker who spoke of the enormity of the sacrifices made by those who have served for their country.

All then stood for the soulful hymn Lest We Forget, performed live by musical duo Donna and Jason Forsyth.

Colin's main address commemorated those who have served our country during conflict and crisis, he spoke of the importance of the aid provided on the home fronts during war, and paid a special tribute to the many war horses shipped overseas from Australia, with only one ever known to be returned - Sandy the Waler.

He also acknowledged those who return home from war to face new battles with their mental health and wellbeing. He asked attendees, "If you know a veteran, then take the time to welcome them back into Australian community life, within the spirit of mateship and charity that we all share."

Roger Cracknell read out a thought provoking rendition of an ANZAC Day poem called An Old Man's Memories, which he wrote after attending a dawn service in a previous year. Afterwards, Richard Creek took the crowd through a prayer.

Local RSL Secretary Lizz Rear oversaw a wreath laying service with local high school student leaders Naomi Clark and Jessica Bennett. Then it was time for the Ode read out by Veteran Richard Nield, the last Post and Rouse, flag raising and both the Australian and New Zealand National Anthems.

#### ANZAC Day in Sandakan

Brooke, Jodi and Craig Nield spent ANZAC Day in Sandakan, Borneo as part of a tour retracing the footsteps of the Australian and British Prisoners of War at Sandakan and the death marches to Ranau during World War II.

The trip has been three years in the making as Brooke won the Lions Sandakan scholarship in 2019 at BBDHS, with her planned trip cancelled in 2020 due to COVID-19.

#### How Safe is your Ride?

Its National Road Safety Week 14-21 May this year and the Shire of Boyup Brook and the Boyup Brook District High School have collaborated to host a dedicated event to promote and create awareness about road safety for our kids riding their bikes, scooters and skateboards around town.

# Vaccine Update 328 - Free influenza vaccines for all Western Australians in May 2023

The Minister for Health (Hon Amber-Jade Sanderson BA MLA) announced on 21 Apr 2023 that free influenza vaccines will be available for all persons in Western Australia including those who are not otherwise eligible for government-funded influenza vaccines. This program will run from 1 May to 31 May 2023. This is a great opportunity for people to protect themselves and others against influenza.

The Free Influenza Vaccine in May 2023 Program will be delivered through participating General Practices (GP), community pharmacies, and Aboriginal Medical Services (AMSs) who will provide free influenza vaccines.

This years Harvey Dickson Easter Rodeo and Shindig was attended by approximately 4,000 spectators channelling their inner Jillaroo and Jackaroo spirit. Being a family event, the atmosphere was fun and friendly with police attending only a few minor anti-social incidents.

With the influx of people into town, the roads were certainly busier than normal. With the assistance of our neighbouring police stations, we patrolled the streets throughout the day and night, conducting random breath and drug tests, vehicle compliance and deterring 'hoon' behaviour.

It was a great result and we're pleased to report that after hundreds of traffic stops, we had ZERO positive breath/drug results. No crime was reported in the town over this weekend. The only notable offences being some dubious cowboy outfits and bad whip cracking efforts!

Sadly, there has been a spike in Road Traffic Collisions in Boyup Brook Shire, as such below is some information regarding crashes.

#### What do I do if there is a crash?

For anyone involved in a crash it can be a stressful and dangerous event. Many people do not know what to do or who to call.



Below is a small guide and some good knowledge to have if you have been involved in or witnessed a motor vehicle accident.

**Serious Crash:** In the case of any life-threatening or serious crashes call 000 straight away. Serious crashes are usually a Multi-agency event involving Police, DFES and St Johns Ambulance. It is critical to get help as soon as possible. If you witness a serious crash or are first on scene to one please remember that crashes can be hazardous. It is important to assess a scene for immediate danger before taking any action.

**Minor Crash:** Not all crashes are life threatening, however it is important for policing and insurance purposes to report crashes to police if they occur. You *must* report a crash to police if the incident resulted in bodily harm to any person, the total value of property damaged exceeds \$3,000 or the owner or representative of any damaged property is not present.

The best way to report a crash to police is online, just type in google something like 'Report Crash Online WA'. This will take you to the WA police website with an online form you can fill out. If you struggle with technology (like me) you can also report the crash at your local police station.

If in a crash try to take note of:

- time, date and precise location of crash
- your personal details (taken from your driver's licence)
- your driver's licence number and expiry details
- your vehicle licence plate and expiry details
- details of other involved drivers/passengers/owners/vehicles/ witnesses
- details of your injuries and other person's injuries
- crash features (traffic control, road features, road alignment, other conditions)
- total estimated cost of damage to all vehicles and property
- description of how the crash happened

#### **Changes for PATS**

The Patient Assisted Travel Scheme (PATS) process and forms have been changed and made easier. If you live in the South West region you no longer need to have your PATS forms signed by your GP/referring practitioner.

PATS can provide financial reimbursement for travel and accommodation for eligible patients needing to travel to access specialist medical services. PATS is funded by the State Government's Royalties for Regions program and is administered by the WA Country Health Service (WACHS).

It aims to support WA country patients' access to specialist medical services wherever they live in the State. The recent changes to the service has removed the requirement for patients to have their GP/referring practitioner endorse PATS applications. All PATS applications will now be assessed by WACHS.

#### Staying in Place Expo Supported

Seven Boyup Brook community members travelled to Pingelly on March 30 for the 'Staying in Place' Expo which showcased their community-based aged care and virtual village projects.

Working in partnership, the Pingelly Somerset Alliance and Pingelly Community Resource Centre are making positive impacts to the lives of their community members through the provision of services, care, connection and employment. There are further reaching economic benefits, with local businesses reporting increased activity through the local service provision.

The 120 strong audience from over thirty communities heard from Pingelly change-makers Helen Morton and Lee Steel, as well as from Lesley Bryce who initiated community-based care in the small town of Bell, Queensland and was featured on the ABC's Landline television program. Peter Kenyon from the Bank of I.D.E.A.S. explained the concept of creating a virtual village where seniors are sharing their skills and making connections through their interests and activities. Aged Care provider, InCasa, and employment support agency, Mable were also represented and provided valuable information about how the local care model works. Another topic of interest was aged care accommodation.

The energy in the room was palpable with communities recognising the positive impact that place-based care can provide.

#### What's next?

Boyup Brook is on the cusp of this model coming to fruition, with the CRC about to take on the community care coordination role.

Anyone who is aged Over 65 can sign up to My Aged Care and register for an Aged Care assessment. When a Home Care Package is approved, seniors choose a provider to deliver the services that have been approved.

Anyone who would like to be employed as a support worker can sign up with Mable (www.mable.com.au) to choose the hours you work, the services you offer and how much you charge. Mable arranges the insurance, required checks and verification of each worker and handles the administration and payments.



#### **Tonebridge News**

On Sunday, April 2 instead of tennis, twenty members and visitors went on a plaque tour. We welcomed Leon and Mary B from Manjimup, Fred and Nancy R from Kojonup, Melanie H from Albany and Kevin C, Doris C and Lorraine R from Boyup Brook.

We headed south into Cranbrook shire, veered west into Manjimup shire, along a bush track to the school site of Mordallup - Seaton Ross that operated between 1909-1912 for five Mordallup Muirs and three Seaton Ross Muirs, plus Smith and William's children. Three teachers taught at this school.

Back to Tonebridge gazebo for a picnic lunch, see picture top right. We viewed the plaque and reminisced on the life of Cliff Brooks, who was a great working brother to Leon and volunteer to all busy bees at and around Tonebridge.

Next plaque was the original Tennis Club and court site on the west corner of Tuckett Road along the Mayanup – Cranbrook Road. Two dirt courts were levelled and opened in 1947. We heard there were 29 players in 1950 and 51 players in 1955. Four new courts were put down in 1980 and tennis kept going until 1988. We saw five more plaques, that we shall save for next month's news.

Most returned to Tonebridge for our usual community barbecue tea. However, before tea another plaque was unveiled – at the start of the golf course fairway. Erected on another section of the old Tonebridge Bridge to commemorate the Golf Club, which was formed in 1960 and opened in 1962 by Mr John Tuckett.

It was said 17 members and seven women played for the club championships. On Men's Open days, up to 96 golfers played over the nine holes twice, but from different teas. It was also thought they came for the good spread of food too! Golf eventually stopped through lack on numbers in 2009.

Leon Brooks and Ronald Tuckett unveiled this plaque on Sunday, April 2, pictured bottom right. Many thanks to the Tonebridge Progress Association and the Tuckett and Turner families.

Please keep in mind our fire wood raffle on Friday, May 5 at the IGA in Boyup. The money raised goes into our upkeep and towards our new shed.



#### Garden Club

In April, we visited a very sweet and productive garden belonging to Don and Ingrid Barker of Bridgetown. Their property fronts onto Dairy Lane and its name Dairy Lane Cottage is in an area previously used as a milk depot in years gone by.

Ingrid told us the history of their gardens which began in Perth, following on to Balingup and now in Bridgetown. They purchased the current quarter acre block in 2005. The block is on quite a slope with a 10 meter drop from the back of the block to the front, so terracing was required and a beautiful practical home built.

Previously, Don was a backyard nurseryman on their property in Eedle Terrace, Bridgetown and he went on to develop a keen interest in bonsai which has become his hobby. Whilst he tells us that he is not an expert but a novice, he has produced some outstanding bonsai specimens spotted throughout the garden.

After meandering around the bird friendly garden which includes 25 year old birch trees, various fruit trees and deciduous trees that allow the winter sun to work its magic, we settled on the back verandah to enjoy our morning cuppa whilst Don gave a demonstration on how to care for bonsai plants.

This included how to present to show the best form of the plant and mistakes to avoid. It was a very interesting display that I am sure left ideas in some of our minds of how we could maybe grow a bonsai which literally means "planted in a container".

We thank Don and Ingrid Barker for being so generous in opening their lovely garden to our garden club.

Garden Club in May is a workshop on how to present cut flowers and floral art in an agricultural show. We will be taught by four judges from Bunbury who judge the Floriculture section at the Dinninup Show. This is a wonderful opportunity for those wanting to enter exhibits in the Show but do not have the confidence or knowledge of what is required.

#### **Recycling Begins at Home**

#### Composting

The greatest volume of household wastes could be composted. Items which can be composted include lawn clippings, leaves, food scraps, most animal manures but avoid cat, human and dog manures.

There are many variations to composting and most of these variations are acceptable by local health authorities. Some say that whatever has lived, can be composted, this could be a fox or feral cat. Others say that meat products should not be used.

If a compost heap is correctly constructed, the heat in the centre of the heap will destroy most harmful pathogens. Household food scraps are best placed into the centre of this heap and covered with other materials to retain heat and detract flies and rodents.

You can make a compost heap from just lawn clippings but the end product could at best described as a soil structure improver. It is much better to include leaves, household food scraps and animal manure such as sheep manure.

Plastic compost bins have been very convenient and most of these are efficient and are easy to use. A trial of these bins has revealed the need to be selective. Interestingly, the cheapest and most simple of designs have the best results. Some bins are designed so that you can lift the bin up, leaving your compost heap intact. You can then fork the top uncomposted portion into the bottom of the new site for your compost bin.

Bins with small doors at the base of the bin are difficult for you to recover your compost if you have less than a good physical ability. There are two or three designs with this feature, some of these are made of very brittle plastic and in no way would permit you to slide the bin off the heap to allow you to turn it.

The more you turn the heap, the better the compost, this also helps to kill any weed seeds which have survived the initial composting.

Another quite different form of composting is to dig a trench of a spade depth and width. Half fill the trench with food scraps and other green waste and backfill with the soil which came out of the trench. Shallow rooted vegetables could be grown in this site and the following year you could plant deeper rooted plants such as potatoes and carrots.

A number of Local Governments now provide a kerbside collection of 'food organics-garden organics (FOGO). Where this service is provided, please use it.



#### **Batteries: Tiny Killers**

They may well look like lollies to young eyes, but both button batteries and small high-powered magnets are capable of causing devastating internal injuries if swallowed.

Small high-powered magnets, which are promoted as shapeshifting toys, are so dangerous they were banned from sale in Australia over a decade ago. If two or more of the magnets are swallowed, they can attract and stick to each other across internal tissue, potentially causing the tissue to die or perforate, before leading to further complications like infection, sepsis and even death.

Likewise, button batteries – which are used to power many devices in our homes – can be deadly if they burn through the oesophagus or stomach due to a chemical reaction that is triggered when they come into contact with saliva.

To protect children from the dangers of button batteries, new rules that became mandatory last year require warnings to be displayed on all products containing them, including advice to seek medical assistance if swallowed. Any toys or other products that are powered by button batteries must have a secure battery cover.

If you decide to allow button batteries into your home, make sure they are kept away from young children. If you spot non-compliant button batteries, devices containing them, or any small high-powered magnet products on shop shelves, report them to Consumer Protection at consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au or call 1300 30 40 54.

#### **Inquiry into Forced Adoptions**

The Government of Western Australia has announced an inquiry into forced adoptions that took place between 1939 and 1980.

The purpose of the committee is to:

- 1. Understand the lived experiences of those affected by historical forced adoption practices,
- 2. Examine the role of the State Government, health services and private institutions in these practices.
- 3. Identify what measures are currently available to assist persons experiencing distress, their effectiveness, and how those persons may be supported further,
- 4. Consider any other matter that arises over the course of the inquiry deemed to be relevant by the Committee.

The inquiry gives survivors the opportunity to share their lived experiences protected by parliamentary privilege and can lead to legislation reforms to enable adoption survivors to access the same human rights as non-displaced people.

Submissions are invited by those who have been affected and wish to share their experience. Due to the sensitive nature of the subject, they can be kept private by request. Submissions can be made online or in writing by June 16, 2023.

#### **Eulogy: John Watkinson**

Former Boyup Brook resident John Watkinson, passed away earlier this year. The following words were taken from the eulogy written by his daughter Jane Bushby and read at his funeral.



Dad was born on June 3rd, 1940 followed by David and Andrew, to parents Lilla and Fred Watkinson. He grew up on Milnthorpe farm, Bramham in Yorkshire at a 260-acre property where the family milked 30 cows, did some cropping, grew 20 acre potatoes per year and ran 60 sheep.

Dad remembered on his first school trip to the seaside another little boy gazing out to sea in awe shouted, "Eee, there must be 40 acres of water out there!"

Dad left school to work in a butcher's shop, but his dad wanted him home so he went farming and fox hunting and by age 18 he had collected 15 dogs.

Dad met Mum at the Brambam Moor Fox Hound Show in June 1961, both showing terriers. Luckily for us Dad couldn't stop thinking about her and when the chance came to visit the huntsman in Warwickshire he asked the question, "Does anyone know where Jill Morton lives?"

It was a Saturday when he pulled up outside the big house at Longbridge, Sue came running past. He asked, "Is Jill in please?" Sue called out to their mum who was taking a bath, "Ma, there's a boy here looking for Jill." Her mum shouted out of the bathroom window, "Well get rid of him!" Not deterred, Dad went back the next day and the rest is history.

They married on November 24, 1962 and lived with Dad's parents at Milnthorpe, but not for long as a cottage became available. They moved to Wetherby and he travelled back and forth four miles to work on Milnethorpe farm in a Fordson tractor. We lived there from 1962-1969, with all us kids born there.

When his Dad died in 1965, the owners of the estate wouldn't give tenancy to Dad. They came to the funeral on Thursday and gave them notice to move out the week after.

At this time the Australian Government advertised in their local newspaper, painting a bright picture of fishing rods with two fish on each one. We landed in Australia in February 1969, can you imagine a plane full of 10-Pound Poms. We settled at Bunbury and once there, moved six times. The last move was to a caravan park, as the money ran out. A bloke at the caravan park said there was a job going with Frank and June Craig at Dardenup. We were there six months.

Dad's next job was working for the Waite family at Boyup Brook with the occasional stint at the abattoir as a slaughterman. He'd walk to work, or Kirky would pick him up. To make a bit extra, he drove the gut truck to Manjimup five nights a week for \$5 a trip. It was a three-hour round trip. The gut truck was a Chev and carried 20 x 44 gallon drums. One night he dropped a drum of tongues off onto the road, the crows had a lovely time.

Saving their pennies for the great venture into farming. Mum and Dad started off by putting a deposit on Tangara, at Kulikup, 20 miles away. The block was bare and run down with only 300 acres cleared. Our family spent weekends clearing, fencing and just generally making it into a saleable item.

There was always time for horses. Dad would squeeze as many as he could on his little truck, Mum packed up the food and we were set for the weekend. Us kids picked rocks and sticks in the morning.

After lunch we would take off on our ponies with a kangaroo dog and a pack of sheep dogs in search of something to chase.

In 1977, Dad finished working for the Waites and we purchased, Southlands, south of Boyup Brook and this property had a house. We were there ten years. Dad became a mulesing contractor and all of us kids spent time working on the cradle and he endeavoured to make it fun. It was pretty ordinary for the person who sat in the back of the old Ford car as they were surrounded by a roo dog and at least three sheep dogs.

It was common after a big job for Dad to stop at the pub or the Club in Boyup Brook. One particular night Dad, Frankie 'Fox' Chapman and I stayed until stumps. Fox was somewhat worse for wear by then, but he had told us earlier in the evening that he wanted dropping at his new girlfriend's place. Dad reckoned he knew where it was so we pulled up and I helped Fox to the door and rang the bell a couple of times for him.

We'd discuss it might be nice for him to greet her with the phrase, "Hi honey I'm home". It was about 11pm and the house was dark. The lights came on and something warned me that I shouldn't hang around, so I let Fox slip to the ground and high tailed it back to the car. As I opened the car door I heard him slurr, "Hi Honey I'm..." With a warm feeling in my heart, I shut the car door. A few days later we were working together and I asked Fox if everything went ok when we dropped him off. "No", he had said with a pained look on his face, "you dropped me off at the wrong house!" Dad to his credit, did a great job of looking surprised.

We also did a lot of hay carting. Not big squares or round rolls but little squares. Dad and Fox had two trucks, a bale loader and an elevator.

Dad and his mother-in-law, Granny Morton had an interesting relationship. Gran came to live in Australia in her 60's. For a few years she went back and forth to the UK regularly. Once, she asked Mum to look after her parrot. The parrot was a fast learner and in no time at all, Dad and John taught him to swear. Granny did her best to convince herself and her friends the parrot was only telling them to 'PUSH OFF!'

In 1992, Windemere was purchased near Lake Grace. Dad and Mum were now able to escape and pursue their hobbies breeding stockhorses and campdrafting. They travelled the state including the Kimberly region to Katherine in the NT.

In 2003 Mum, Dad and Johnno made the move to Dinninup Downs, Qualeup. They set about whipping the place into shape and like Southlands and Windemere, they built on an open plan large kitchen, dining and lounge room. In this stage of semi-retirement Dad devoted himself to his beloved Bullock team and learning as many bush poems as he could.

By 2009, Dad and Mum rekindled their love of the sport that brought them together- fox hunting. They joined the Brook Hunt and for more than a decade hosted a hunt day on the June long weekend.

Five years ago, Mum lost her battle with cancer. Dad's battle with kidney failure never stopped him going places or farming. Every time I spoke to him he was busy with something and even though it was a shock to lose him, we can be grateful that he died peacefully in his own home.

When I look for words to describe my Dad, what comes to mind is hard working, tireless, determined, and oh so very social. Someone who really *would* give you the shirt off his back.

I worked with John at the abattoir. Noel Smith, whose job it was to bleed the cattle, would occasionally as a joke get a mouth full of blood and spray it over everybody. This particular day, Pommy John dared him to spray someone, the health inspector noticed him get the blood and came over and ended up wearing the blood.

Our friendship with the Watkinson family started in Dardenup in 1969. To us John was a real countryman. Whilst they maintained their English heritage and for John his Yorkshire heritage, they embraced the Aussie lifestyle and the freedom and opportunities that came to them.

He indulged in his love of rural sports. His love of horses, successfully competing at campdrafting and latterly hunting, sheepdog trialling. He also raised ferrets and pheasants and had aperies full of small birds and of course his team of bullocks. So many memories for all of us it was a true country life.

#### **In-Touch Farming**

#### Red Legged Earth Mite (RLEM) - Pasture

RLEM will most likely have been hatching in Boyup Brook by the end of April. RLEM hatch when there have been seven days of temperatures below 20C with adequate rainfall (5mm). Given that most pastures are in their infancy they are very susceptible to RLEM at this stage.

New sown pastures are exceptionally vulnerable, especially germinating rye grass and balansa. Given the money spent on good quality seed mixes to improve pasture quality, to take the extra step of a bare earth insecticide spray makes good economic sense.

RLEM can be directly responsible for reducing pasture palatability, growth rates and seed set of clovers.

#### Clover to consider

Bindoon clover has a label claim as being RLEM resistant and is a variety well suited to Boyup Brook.

#### Sprays to consider

- Existing pastures 120ml Le-Mat plus .2% LI700 will give 21 days' anti-feed when no rain for three days after application.
- New sown pastures Bare earth spray within 24 hours of seeding - 70mls Bifenthrin (300g/L), 500ml Chlorpyrifos plus .2% LI700 will give around sic weeks protection.

#### **RLEM - Canola**

Canola crops can be decimated by RLEM when numbers are high. This is especially so when bringing a long-term pasture paddock into the cropping rotation if pre cropping control of RLEM has been neglected in the year previous.

RLEM will attack canola as it breaks through the soil surface when left untreated. As canola planting is under way, please monitor your paddocks. If you are tempted to forgo the bare earth treatment, please consider the damage RLEM can do.

#### Sprays to consider:

- First knockdown add in 100ml dimethoate and 100ml alpha cypermethrin, this combination will control RLEM as well as other insects.
- Bare earth spray within 24 hours of seeding 70ml bifenthrin (300g/L), 500ml Chlorpyrifos Plus .2% LI700 will give around 6 weeks protection.



For this spider as he walked Had a most unsteady gait Like a very drunken sailor So my fear was very great


I lay in bed and watched him At his clumsy dancing pace If he just put a foot wrong He'd fall right on my face






