

ANZAC Day Draws Large Crowds

Under a full moon, the largest crowd yet for a Boyup Brook Dawn Service gathered at the War Memorial, as Boyup Brook RSL Sub-Branch President, Colin Hales spoke of the history of the Dawn Service and the relevance of congregating at this particular time.

After a gun-fire breakfast, it wasn't long before the area was again filled with community members and visitors for the Main Service. As the flags blew in the stiff easterly breeze, the parade marched along Abel Street to the Memorial. In his address Mr Hales reflected on the 'ill-conceived campaign' that was the Gallipoli landing and the ANZAC spirit that was born from this event. It was the "courage, determination, humour, mateship and sacrifice that were the achievements that set standards that inspired their countryman for generations to follow." The Service featured all of the traditions of ANZAC Day, plus poetry recitals from Bill Gordon and Keith

⁶Cobber' Lethbridge, and musical performances by Brandy Newton. Following the laying of wreaths, Vietnam Veteran Richard Nield recited the Ode before the Last Post sounded and flags were raised. Moments later, a Pilatus PC-21 Aircraft flew down Abel Street over the Memorial, delighting the crowd.

A group then made their way to the Boyup Brook Soldiers' Memorial Hospital for a brief service, with hospital residents in attendance.

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Flax Mill Signage Unveiled

On Thursday, April 18 members of the Boyup Brook community gathered for the unveiling of the interpretive signage at the Flax Mill Caravan Park. Funded by the Heritage Council of WA and the Shire of Boyup Brook, the five signs are located outside the camp kitchen, facing Jackson Street.

The flax industry was a significant chapter in Boyup Brook's history. Officially opened in 1944, it was the largest of three flax mills in Western Australia. The mill operated under the Department of Defence until 1949, when a Growers Co-op was formed to continue the processing of flax until it ceased operation in 1965 due to failing demand. At its peak, the flax industry employed 400 workers from around the Boyup Brook district.

A replica model of the Flax Mill, donated to the Shire by Robert Jamieson in 2002, can be viewed in the under croft area of the Scutching Shed at the caravan park.

Following the unveiling, Robert signed an agreement to donate other replica models on display at the Caravan Park. These models include: Boyup Brook Railway Station, Boyup Brook Timber Mill, Skeleton Bridge and the Old Roads Board Hut.

Thank you to Robert for his dedication in preserving a vital piece of our Shire's history.

Planned Burns:

Working Together for a Safer Boyup Brook

Planned burns are a crucial fire prevention strategy in Western Australia, relying on collaboration between various organisations. Here in Boyup Brook, the Shire works alongside the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES), the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA), Water Corporation, and other local governments. Each manages planned burns on their respective lands to create a network of reduced fuel areas.

Why We Burn: Planned burns are conducted during cooler months to minimise the amount of fuel available for bushfires during the hot, dry season. This helps to protect lives, property, infrastructure, and the environment from the devastating effects of bushfires. Ideally, these burns are low-intensity, effectively reducing fuel loads without significant impact on the environment or wildlife.

When We Burn: Planned burns on Shire-managed lands undergo thorough planning and consultation before being carried out by experienced and supervised personnel. These burns are typically undertaken between March and November, when weather conditions are most favourable:

Cool temperatures: Milder weather creates safer burning conditions.

- Light to gentle winds: Manageable wind speeds allow for better fire control.
- Adequate vegetation moisture: Moisture helps ensure minimal fire impact and easier control.

Notice of Burns: While we strive to provide advanced notice of planned burns, the decision to proceed ultimately depends on several factors. These include real-time weather conditions, fuel moisture levels, and resource availability. Therefore, the final decision to implement a planned burn is often made on the day itself.

Rates Information



Pensioner Concession Rebates To be eligible for the State Government Rebate for the current financial year you must pay your portion of rates and Emergency Services Levy by 30 June 2024. If your payment is not received by 30 June 2024, you will lose your entitlement to claim the State Government Rebate on your Rates and Emergency Services Levy for this year, and these will be automatically deferred. Deferred rates remain a debt against the property until such time as they are paid. Please note that all Waste charges are not deferrable and are required to be paid each year.

Pensioner Concession Rebate - Information

RevenueWA use a verification system which cross matches VEN, property address and Pensioner information. If you are a RURAL Pensioner, please ensure the address on your pensioner card is the same as the property address listed on your rates notice as many rural ratepayers have more than one assessment. Please ensure that the Shire has been provided with the preferred postal address for all correspondence.

Eligibility to Receive a Concession Rebate

To receive a concession, you must own and occupy the property as your principal place of residence on 1 July of the current financial year and hold a valid concession card.

Holders of the Pensioner Concession Card or State Concession Card

- The rebate is up to 50% for rates, limited to a maximum (capped) amount of \$750.
- The option to defer rates may be available if the required criteria is met.
- Receive a rebate on water usage charges, limited to a maximum (capped) amount.

Holders of the WA Seniors Card and the Commonwealth Seniors Health Card

- The rebate is up to 50% for rates, limited to a maximum (capped) amount of \$750.
- The option to defer rates may be available if the required criteria is met.

Holders of the WA Seniors Card only

- The rebate is up to 25% for rates, limited to a maximum (capped) amount of \$100.
- There is no option to defer rates.

Change of Ownership or Address of Your Property

To ensure prompt receipt of your rate notice, please complete a change of address form. This can be completed by either coming into the office or by downloading, completing and submitting the form from the Shire website to notify us of any change to the ownership or changes of postal address. There is an obligation on property owners to ensure that the Shire has the correct address for service of notices. The Shire accepts no responsibility for mail not received due to an incorrect mailing address or a mail redirection.

Notice must be given in writing to the Shire within 21 days after a rateable property has been sold. Details of land description and name and address of the new owner must be provided. Proof of new ownership will be required prior to the Shire's records being updated.

Climate Declaration Signed

The Warren Blackwood Alliance of Councils (comprising the Shires of Boyup Brook, Bridgetown-Greenbushes, Donnybrook -Balingup, Manjimup and Nannup) has ratified the WA Local Government Association Climate Change Declaration, joining 51 Local Governments across Western Australia in their commitment to real and long-lasting action to reduce emissions and transition to a low carbon future.

The Warren Blackwood Alliance of Councils (WBAC) supports the environmental, social and economic benefits of addressing climate change immediately.

It is an opportunity for Local Government to demonstrate leadership in climate change management at a community level and support the development of equitable and implementable State and Commonwealth strategies for climate change management.

The Declaration endorses the WBAC position on climate change, and outlines its commitments to addressing climate change, which are further expanded upon in its Climate Change Policy and Action Plan.

WBAC Chair, Cr Richard Walker said, "This commitment, one outcome from the Alliance Climate Change Action Plan, is an important step in building the capacity and momentum of the five Shires, and the communities they serve, in meeting the challenges and taking the opportunities that climate change presents to the Warren Blackwood region".

Registering with My Aged Care

If you need some help around the house or need transport to appointments, My Aged Care is here to help.

There are four key steps to accessing Australian Government-funded aged care services.

- Step 1. Learn about different types of care
- Step 2. Get assessed for aged care services
- Step 3. Find a provider in your area that suits your needs
- Step 4. Manage your services

The My Aged Care website is very useful, with videos and stepby-step guides - **www.myagedcare.gov.au** - BUT if you do not have access to the internet, you can call **1800 200 422** and speak to very helpful people who can provide information about the services available, discuss your circumstances, explain the assessment process and sign you up.

The Boyup Brook CRC can also offer support in this area, through the Community Care 'Staying in Place' project. An information session will be held at the CRC on **Thursday, May 23 2024 from 2-3pm** for you to find out more about My Aged Care, and also hear an update on the support that is being provided to local people, by local people.

Not-for-Profit Reporting Changes

From the 2023-24 income year, non-charitable not-for-profits (NFP) with an active ABN will need to lodge an annual return to the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) to notify of its income tax exempt eligibility.

It is designed to enhance transparency and integrity in the system, by ensuring only eligible NFPs access income tax exemption.


NFPs should have recently received a letter explaining the process.

The first NFP self-review return is for the 2023-24 financial year, due by 31 October 2024.

NFPs that need to lodge the annual self-review return can lodge through Online services for business. To access Online services for business, you will need to Set up myGovID and RAM. Once you have set up myGovID and RAM, you will be able to view the annual self-review return in Online services for business from 1 July 2024. If a NFP engages a registered tax agent to lodge the annual self-review return on their behalf, the agent can lodge through Online services for agents.

Penalties may apply under the ATO's penalty framework if an NFP self-review return is required to be lodged and is not lodged each year.



What can I apply for?

- · Not duplicate an activity already available in the local area.

How are applications approved?

As the funding pool is limited, applications that demonstrate the best value for money will be prioritised, and priority will also be given to applicants who have not previously been funded.


















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Community Grant Success

In Touch Farming

Bare Earth Spray PSPE - In the Dry

With dry seeding of canola, lupins, and pastures well and truly underway, the questions I am often asked is what about the bare earth treatments after seeding?

- 1. Are they still relevant?
- 2. When should they be applied, and how long do I have to apply them after rainfall?

The answer to question one is yes, they are still very much relevant and should not be skipped or forgotten about.

Question two when should they be applied? There are two approaches to be considered. The first is to wait for rainfall, then apply within 3-4 days of rainfall - no later. Applying the bare earth treatment no later than 3-4 days after rainfall is very important, once rainfall comes the seed will germinate very guickly due to high soil temperatures and what we don't want is for insects to be attacking emerging plants in a year where we need to make the most of any early rainfall events in what is looking like an average-late break.

The second approach to consider is to apply the bare earth treatment 24-36 hours prior to forecast rain, this is the best scenario for people that will not be able to cover all seeded ground requiring a bare earth treatment within 3-4 days of rain.

Also remember to wait seven days after any bare earth treatment to apply slug pellets. The Bifenthrin applied in a bare earth treatment stops slugs from moving around the ground as they don't like the Bifenthrin. If you have spread cheaper bait and you receive 25mm of rainfall, (cheaper baits break down quickly after substantial rainfall), that bait will be mostly wasted before the slugs have had any chance to consume it.

The same bare earth PSPE recommendation applies to seeded pasture. RLEM will attack germinating ryegrass and clover, especially Balansa clovers, as the shoot emerges from the seed. Although they may not completely decimate the pasture, they will dramatically thin the pasture, costing valuable pasture density and dollars per hectare.

E-Waste Update

Just a few updates. You can now find us on Facebook. Big thank you to the Boyup Brook Co-op and the Rotary Club of Bridgetown for our successful community grants.

To date as a community we have diverted 7,731kg of mixed metals from landfill, and we have received over 3,300 individual items. This is a great result. There is still more electrical waste in the community that is not working or wanted.


LiveLighter Recipe Over Baked Fish with Sweet Potato Wedges

Ingredients

- 1 kg sweet potato, cut into wedges
- olive or canola oil spray
- 3/4 cup breadcrumbs
- 1 tbs Parmesan cheese, grated
- 1/4 cup basil leaves, chopped
- 1 egg, beaten
- 4 x 120 g firm white boneless fish fillet
- garden salad and lemon wedges, to serve

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 230°C (210°C fan-forced) and line 2 baking trays with non-stick baking paper.
- 2. Spread potatoes in a single layer on a tray, spray liberally with oil and bake for 15 minutes on top shelf of the oven.
- 3. Combine breadcrumbs, cheese and basil in a shallow dish. Fill a separate shallow bowl with beaten egg. Dip fish in egg wash, shake off excess so it is damp but not wet. Add fish to breadcrumb mixture, turning to make sure it is well coated and gently press on crumbs. Spray liberally with oil. Arrange on the second baking tray and place in oven underneath wedges.
- 4. Turn wedges over and bake both for 10 minutes until fish is golden and cooked through and wedges are crisp.
- 5. Divide between plates and serve with salad and lemon on the side.





Endeavour

First published 2023 by The Australian National Maritime Museum

This book is a new reference to our library and I am privileged to be the first to take it on loan.

The book is a very interesting read with the Endeavour being called 'The Ship that changed the World'.

Historical evidence is presented and recent times as well. Between 1988 and 1994 when a replica of the ship was constructed in Fremantle, Western Australia.

Many of the extraordinary voyages since this time are described, and where the ship is now on display at the Australian National Maritime Museum.

Drawings of the ship are presented showing what is inside and out, also how this strange shaped vessel sails so comfortably on the motion of the sea.

One of the original maps of New Holland can be viewed, drawings and specimens of dried plant species are so interesting.

For our First Nations people the Indigenous and Torres Strait Islanders, the Endeavour legacy has had ongoing repercussions and respect is given.

Toward the books end, are more photographs and information on the "Endeavour replica" when it was launched and its first days sailing the high seas.

Finally, the original Endeavours sinking, where it lays today, and the role it played in the American Revolutionary War are presented.

What an amazing read for any young sailor or school project, enjoy our library.

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Getting to Know Dorothy Ricetti

with Sharon Lampard



Dorothy Ricetti was born in Yarloop in September 1940 to parents William and Ethel Craigie. Her early days were spent moving to different places, as her father sought available work opportunities.

This Craigie family, which also included Dorothy's sister, lived in various places such as Banksia Dale, Treesville, Nanga Brook, Harvey, Hamill and Bowelling.

Her schooling began in Cookernup where she recalls her teacher as a former Sergeant Major in the First World War. "So if you needed discipline, you got it," reminisced Dorothy.

Her fondest childhood memories revolved around the extended family Christmas celebrations in Cookernup.

Dorothy also attended school for a short time in East Victoria Park and says it was a huge "culture shock" due to the considerably larger school size. She then moved to school in Bowelling, followed by a couple of years in Darkan, and then did a period of correspondence education.

When her family moved to Wilga in 1955, Dorothy completed her schooling in Boyup Brook, with English being her favourite subject.

Her father worked at the timber mill in Wilga until it burnt down in 1958. He then purchased farmland known as 'Girrahween' just outside the Boyup Brook shire, in Arthur River, and relocated his family there.

Dorothy married Charles Ricetti in November 1961 and moved to his family farm, not too far away in Bulading. Shortly after, a neighbour encouraged Dorothy to join her first Country Women's Association (CWA) branch in Darkan.

At only 21 years old at the time, Dorothy was the youngest member in Darkan. When her three children, William, Stephanie and Andrew came along in the years to follow, she said of her affiliation with the group of women, "My kids were blessed with adoptive grandmothers and aunties."

Coming from a large extended family, Dorothy adapted well to motherhood. However, she found trying to fit everything into one day quite an adjustment.

In her early days with the CWA, Dorothy attended branch meetings, helped with stalls and busy bees, and enjoyed attending functions and divisional meetings at other CWA branches, expanding her network within the association.

She also recalls the group's activism, such as rallying to change the colour of railway vans to make them more visible on country roads, and advocating for increased support for separated or unwed mothers.

During her time in Darkan, Dorothy served as secretary and president at the Infant Health Centre, where she organised events like the yearly Christmas Tree.

She dedicated eight years to the Bulading Hall Committee. Additionally, she obtained her first aid certificate, although she was unable to join Charlie in driving the St Johns Ambulance due to her responsibilities caring for a young family at home.

In the late seventies, Dorothy's parents wanted to retire, so Charlie and Dorothy purchased their property at Girrahween. Being closer to Boyup Brook, Dorothy took no time in transferring over to the Boyup Brook CWA.

She was a part of this branch until 1991 when the couple brought a house in Yabberup, bringing them closer to Donnybrook. Dorothy then switched branches again.

Over the next nine years, Dorothy also participated in CWA community service initiatives, including the Lady Mitchell Housekeeping Scheme and the Social Issues Fact Finding Team. These roles saw her providing assistance to women in need of various forms of aid.

In 1999, the Ricetti's went on their first overseas trip, which was also Charlie's first time traveling by plane. With Dorothy's parents originally from Scotland and Charlie's from Switzerland, they spent six weeks, exploring these places and meeting their relatives.

The following year, the couple moved back to Boyup Brook, and Dorothy resumed her involvement with the local CWA for a second stint.

During her time affiliated with the CWA, Dorothy has held every office position, but she particularly favoured the role of secretary. She even served as the secretary for the Divisional Office from 2008 to 2009.

After battling illness, Dorothy's husband Charlie sadly passed away in 2016, just weeks shy of the couple's 55th wedding anniversary.

These days, Dorothy keeps herself busy with her love of gardening, writing poetry, crafting, and looking into her family history, which she has traced back as far as 1665. Along with a book of her poems that she published in 1981, Dorothy also hopes to compile a family history book.

Last year, the Boyup Brook CWA depleted to as few as two members, with just Dorothy and Betty Knapp holding it together. They were both extremely grateful when Amy Dyer and Bianca Bunnett joined them to help with a membership drive. This saw the group grow to 18 by the end of the year.

Dorothy's fight to keep the Boyup Brook branch afloat and her tireless efforts in supporting various community initiatives were acknowledged this year, through the prestigious Kevin Henderson Memorial Award. This recognition is a testament to her dedication to her community.

Dorothy is proud that her love for the CWA has extended to her daughter, Stephanie, and one of her five grandchildren, Cheyenne, who are currently members of the Perenjori branch.

It is now her hope that CWA member numbers in Boyup Brook continue to grow. She has her eye on having as many as thirty by the branches 100th birthday in six years' time. Dorothy reminds everyone that the CWA caters to all interests and ages and encourages attendance to a branch meeting so you can see what it entails.

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Cancer Council - Find Cancer Early



As we get older, many of us don't often think too much about a change to our body. This can result in us expecting and accepting changes over time as being normal.

But, it is important to not be tempted to put something unusual down to 'getting older' before you've told your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker. Always have a chat and let them know what you've noticed, even if you're not concerned by it. Chances are it is nothing to worry about, but it's better to be on the safe side.

When you decide to make an appointment, lots of different questions and concerns can pass through your mind, such as:

- The doctor is always too busy.
- o It's too hard to get an appointment.
- o When I get to my appointment my mind goes blank.
- o What could happen when I see the doctor?
- o I don't have a doctor.
- o I feel embarrassed or some shame.

Tips when you are visiting your doctor/health professional

- Be clear about your symptoms.
- Calling early in the morning is often the best time to arrange an appointment.
- If your usual health professional isn't available that day, ask for an appointment in a few days time, or ask to see another doctor.

- If you feel you need to speak to a health professional straight away, tell the receptionist it is urgent when you call.
- Write down why you've made the appointment and what you want to tell your health professional.
- Keep a symptom diary of what's been happening, how long for, and how often it occurs you can take this with you.
- Health professionals are there to help you don't be embarrassed to let them know about any unusual changes you've noticed in your body.
- Take someone with you as a second pair of ears to listen & perhaps to take notes for you to clarify what is said during the appointment.

Become familiar with common cancer symptoms

We encourage adults, especially those over 40 years of age, to be aware of some common symptoms of cancers. You can give yourself the best chance to **Find Cancer Early**, by going to see a doctor straight away if you have symptoms, so that treatment is easier, and you can be around longer to do the things you love doing with the people you love.

The Flax Mill was in full production from 1938-1968, with all aspects of the flax industry from paddock to fibre, which was mostly woven into canvas goods, such as fire hoses and webbing, but some was used for linen products such as the shirt on display.

There are several other models including Smith's Timber Mill 1910-1968, and the Skeleton Railway Bridge with goods train. Timber was an important commodity and there were a number of privately owned timber mills which sent their product away for building and railway sleepers.


Posies for Mother's Day will be made by ladies of the church on Saturday, May 11 and people, especially children, will be able to collect a free posy for Mum from the various shops in town.



Be Still and Know..... God

Raising great kids in a troubled world

'Behold, children are a heritage from the Lord,' Psalm 127:3

Let's look at some practical areas where parents are often confused. Guidance versus criticism.

If you have a placid, compliant and agreeable child, who enjoys school, homework and doing household chores, bringing '.... them up in the training and instruction of the Lord will be a joy.' (Ephesians 6:4)

Many of us, however, are given assertive, strong-willed kids with their own agendas. These kids know what they want, and when and how to get it. They also know what they don't want to eat, wear, hear, say and do. And parents or carers of these kids need help in building the kind of relationship that creates trust and allows for mutual discussion and respect in a tug-of-war atmosphere.

In such cases giving guidance can easily become criticism, constantly emphasising the child's faults: "You look ridiculous in that ... You're never on time ... Why can't you be like ..." A much better approach is to point the child to the solution. Even valid guidance offered negatively will damage self-worth, breed resentment, and destroy the possibility of building mutual respect. They need to hear you say, "I'm not on your back - I'm on your team."

When normal conflict arises - and it will - it's tempting to become overbearing or frustrated. When you shout, insult or humiliate the child, you lose sight of your parental goal of guiding and training. This leaves them feeling angry, disempowered, uncertain of themselves and you - an invitation to rebellion.

But if you guide your child as one who is on their team, with patient practical help, links will be forged that will encourage cooperation, trust and mutual respect. It's not easy, but is definitely worth it.






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Junior Hockey Season Begins


