With a beautiful day of sunshine to enjoy, a fabulous turn out of more than 450 people were welcomed through the gates with free wellness information packs handed out on their way through.

The event was officially opened by Member for Warren-Blackwood, Jane Kelsbie MLA and also included a visit by Yogi (Outback Truckers 7Mate), live music by singer songwriter and mental health advocate Tracey Barnett and from the High School Rock Bands, a visit from Dead Pool and his Variety Club car, the Rhodes Ridley Truck, games, stalls, interactive displays, food, yoga,

Ms Belinda Meehan, CoMHAT Project Officer, said this comes after a \$60,000 funding announcement from Jane Kelsbie MLA, to go towards the Boyup Brook Youth Zone to secure a permanent location and purchase mountain bikes for the youth in the community to encourage them to explore their surrounds, exercise and maintain positive mental health.

Charter of Rylington Park Institute for Agricultural Training and Research



This Charter confirms that the Rylington Park farming property, home of Rylington Park Institute for Agricultural Training and Research, will be held in trust by the Boyup Brook Shire to benefit the Boyup Brook community and for the use of agricultural training and research.

Rylington Park was gifted to the Shire of Boyup Brook by Mr Eric Farleigh in 1985 to be used for agricultural training and research as this will benefit the town and district as a whole. A quote from Mr Farleigh's last will and testament dated 8th June 1988 states:

"Without creating any specific trust it is my wish that my farming property be retained by the Shire of Boyup Brook for the benefit of persons within the Shire and for research purposes and that my farming records and other records are kept with my farming property."

Eric Farleigh 8th June 1988

The transfer of the farm was officially announced on 2nd November 1985 in order to coincide with a visit to Boyup Brook by the Governor of Western Australia.

After gifting the farm to the Shire, Mr Farleigh continued to live on Rylington Park until his death on 11th November 1988.

OBJECTIVES

The objectives for Rylington Park Institute for Agricultural Training and Research are to:

- · Demonstrate good governance and leadership by behaving with integrity and being open and accountable.
- Be recognised as a leader in technology use, training, and sustainable practices.
- · Develop, trial and demonstrate the latest agricultural practices and technologies.
- Develop and demonstrate sustainable farming practices to sustainably manage the farm for future generations.
- · Deliver industry relevant training.
- · Deliver enhanced skills development for the farming community.

ACTIVITIES

To achieve these objectives, the Rylington Park Institute for Agricultural Training and Research will undertake specific activities in the following areas:

- Develop and maintain active partnerships with educational, training and research institutions to conduct training and research in all aspects of agriculture and facilitate these learnings to be shared with the Boyup Brook community.
- Collaborate with local farmers, businesses and organisations to participate in trials and demonstrations.
- · Host industry workshops and training days.
- · Host rehabilitation and regeneration trials for disused gravel pits and other degraded land.
- · Encourage the use of the Rylington Park facilities for broad community participation and involvement.
- Invest in maintenance and ongoing improvements to the farm and facilities to ensure continued use and relevance for future generations.
- Engage the community in annual field days.
- Provide support to the youth of Boyup Brook with agricultural scholarships.
- Provide a financial contribution to community based projects from profits resulting from the operation of the Rylington Park facility.
- Provide regular updates on Rylington Park activities to the Boyup Brook community.

POLICE NEWS

On Saturday, October 2 Police responded to a disturbance at the Boyup Brook Hotel where a large fight had erupted. Boyup Brook Police conducted an investigation resulting in several people being issued with banning notices. These people are no longer permitted to enter the licenced premises and charges will be laid if they attempt to.

Boyup Brook Police have been working closely with the Boyup Brook Hotel to prevent such incidents from happening again and patrons should be advised that anti-social behaviour and violence will not be tolerated.

If you are convicted with an offence relating to a licensed premises you may be issued with a barring notice preventing you from entering any licensed premises (including bottle shops) anywhere in the state. Where possible we will be enforcing these provisions to ensure the enjoyment of the majority of patrons are not ruined by the behaviour of others.

Many people ask us why we conduct random breath tests in the morning and are surprised to see us pulling over cars on their way to work or dropping kids off to school. Be aware that you may still be over the legal limit the following morning after a big night.

Scammers on the rise

It is likely that you or someone you know has been the victim of a scam. Scammers use all sorts of approaches to steal your personal details. Once obtained they can use your identity to commit fraudulent activities such as using your credit card or opening a bank account.

Scammers are becoming more sophisticated and more believable. More recent ones include pretending to be from ATO, Federal police or government agencies providing information on COVID-19.

If you have lost money to a scam or given your personal details, it is unlikely you will get that money back. Be alert and protect yourself or loved ones from scammers by visiting the ACCC Scamwatch website on www.scamwatch.gov.au.

This website includes ways to report the scam, how to protect yourself from further loss if you have given your details and has plenty of tips on ways to avoid being scammed.





Powering the Towers When it is Most Needed

The tragic fires and the threat of destruction to life and property in Australia and across the world caused by climate change could get worse, due to rising temperatures, according to Climate Scientist predictions.

Federal Minister for Communications Paul Fletcher recently said that during the catastrophic fires of 2019/2020 on the east coast, "150 phone towers were out of action due to lack of power. \$37 million was allocated from the resilience fund to provide backup power, to keep towers operating for 12 hours using solar and diesel".

The south west of our state is just as vulnerable. A fire similar to the recent Woorooloo fires near Perth, could also inflict extensive damage, threatening our homes and lives, destroying natural assets of biodiversity, tourism industry, rural food production and lifestyle. Without a failsafe communications system, community emergency service volunteers lose the ability to operate as a team to keep us all safe.

Having witnessed how bad it can be, we now have the opportunity to build in to our integrated Mobile Tower network, a backup power system for each tower in the South West and Great Southern, that lasts more than just a few hours, when the grid could be down for several days and communities and individuals are isolated when help is most needed.

A study and audit of the network must be done at the earliest opportunity to ascertain the most effective means of providing a

backup energy source for each Mobile Tower for several days, followed by an action plan for funding the infrastructure and implementation throughout our integrated network.

We should not underestimate the economic value of employment the project would generate.

Now is the time to act. All our Government members: Local, State and Federal, need to work together to urgently put in place measures to protect our communications network.

Local Governments and Emergency Services personnel have been concerned about our vulnerability for years. Local Government can be effective activists, because the system providers receive income provided by our residents, businesses, administration and services.

State and Federal Governments as users, and infrastructure network providers have a responsibility to provide the funding and make it happen as soon as possible. After all Telstra and other providers know when the network is down, income is nil.

Everyone knows the need is urgent, so all of us have a responsibility to lobby on behalf of our community so that every decision maker at local, State and Federal level will know what is needed and failure to act quickly could cost lives, property and livelihoods.

Blackwood Biosecurity Workshops

There are two free workshops coming up at the Boyup Brook Town Hall, to be conducted by Blackwood Biosecurity Inc, and supported by Leschenault Biosecurity.

Community members are invited to attend the free workshops. Details include:

Cotton Bush Control Workshop 4:30 – 5:15 pm, Thursday, November 11

Narrow leaf cotton bush (Gomphocarpus fruticosus) is a highly invasive weed and a declared pest in Western Australia. It aggressively out-competes native and agricultural plant species, posing a major threat to our food systems and the natural environment.

If you have cotton bush on your land, it is important to manage infested areas through appropriate treatments to prevent further spread.

We invite community members to join us for information on best practices for controlling cotton bush and the state's current initiative addressing this weed.







Rabbit Control Calicivirus RHDV1-K5 Summer Releases Information Session

5:30 - 6:30 pm, Thursday, November 11

Please come along to this information session if you would like to participate in Calicivirus RHDV1-K5 releases on your property during the 2021-22 summer season. On ground services will be facilitated by neighbouring Leschenault Biosecurity Group. We invite you to come along to learn about the process for this program.

"K5" Release Program Wait Until Summer?

The main breeding season of rabbits in our area extends from

about May to November depending on availability of suitable green feed.

We halt our virus releases at this time, due to the abundance of green plants for rabbits to eat, making them less likely to want our baited oats and more significantly because releasing during breeding season can make the future generations of local rabbits immune to the K5 virus compromising this control method.

Getting to Know Sue White

with Sharon Lampard



Sue White was welcomed into the world at the Boyup Brook Memorial Hospital in April of 1939, the only child born to Allan and Beulah Brown.

Her parents were originally from Tasmania, but had moved to Boyup Brook as Allan was interested in farming and was looking for rich, river flats but they found Dinninup.

Because her father had been a pilot in the Air Force and was recalled as a trainer for the Second World War, Sue spent the first seven years of her life travelling to many places around Australia. This saw her attend her first year of school in Bradfield Park, Sydney, but soon after they moved back to Boyup Brook.

After only one term attending school in the CWA Hall in town, Sue was put on correspondence for the next three years. This meant all of her school work was sent to her to complete and return, and Sue said she then had to wait for corrections to come, "and if you didn't do it right, you had to do it all again."

In 1950, at the age of 10, Sue started boarding school at Presbyterian Ladies College which she really enjoyed. "I loved it, being an only child, it was great to get back up there and see your mates and be involved." Explained Sue.


She describes her mother as a "straight-laced person", and also a community person. Her mother started up the Boyup Brook Girl Guides for one, helped with the Upper Blackwood Agricultural Show as Secretary, and later worked at the local hospital.

After school in 1954, Sue started work in Perth but was soon required at home as her mother became ill. Her duties included helping out on the farm, cooking for shearers and assisting her mother until she recovered from septic tonsils.

Sue was home for the January floods in 1955, where she remembers having to complete a task outside whilst the water kept on rising, up past waist height. Later to warm the house and his family, her father built a fire. Sue said, "he made a fire alright, but he made it so good that it caught the chimney on fire!" So in the middle of January, in the pouring rain, her father was on the top of the roof, hosing down the chimney!

Upon her return to the area, Sue joined the Dinninup Junior Farmers, and played tennis in North Dinninup and Badminton in Dinninup. She also went on various trips away, one to South Australia, and another to Singapore.

In 1959 her parents sold all but 100 acres of their land and moved to the Swanleigh in the city. After attending business college, Sue got a job at Guildford Grammar School as Secretary to the Bursar.

The next few years kept her very busy as she joined the City Junior Farmers Club and in 1960, she won an exchange trip to Queensland, and also visited the Sydney Show. Sue was elected State Girl Vice President of the Junior Farmers movement in 1962.

The following year, Sue set sail via the Suez to the UK for a big adventure abroad.

She remembers arriving at Tilbury Docks to her first snowfall, and watching as some children had fun throwing snowballs.

In England, Sue had various jobs that included: Secretary to the International Secretary for Young Farmers UK; milking cows and looking after cattle for the June Dairy Festival; selling Ardmona Canned Fruit throughout England and Scotland; and working in Victoria House in the Immigration Department.

During her time in the UK, she was lucky enough to attend a garden party at Buckingham Palace and also hired a car with friends and spent three months driving through Europe, covering 13,000 miles.

Sue was back home by the end of 1964 and quickly received word that the University of WA had a job for her, however the good news was short lived with the sad passing of her father.

To help her mother, Sue decided to move back to Dinninup, getting a job at Elders which was then in the Hot Country Music Shop. Not much time went by before Sue met Dick White, whose family had moved to Dinninup in 1960. Sue said they married in 1966, and she "moved 6 miles down the road and faded from Brown to White!"

The White's then started a family with son Wayne born in 1967, and daughter Peta, in 1970.

When the children were little, Sue remembers taking them to a clinic to be weighed in the building that is now the Visitors Centre. Later they went to Kindergarten in the same building and they both enjoyed ballet lessons in the Lesser Hall, which was then the Youth Centre in town.



Her children rode the bus in to school every day, were involved with the Swimming Club and once a month the White's spent a big day out at the Pony Club in Mayanup.

Sue's days were also filled with helping on the farm, feeding the shearers when necessary and they also got involved with Devon Cattle as they had a stud. This led to showing Devons at Perth Royal Shows and becoming involved with the Devon Cattle Society.

Following in her mother's footsteps, Sue started with up with the local Girl Guides, first becoming a Brownie Leader. As time went on, she became the District and then the Division Commissioner, and finally she was the first Regional Commissioner of the Blackwood Region covering an area from Boyup Brook to Busselton and Pemberton.

This saw Sue travelling around to all the different groups, all while juggling home life with her children and farm duties.

In the eighties, Sue had lots of fun promoting the town as a part of her role with the Tourism Association and the Blackwood River Valley Marketing Association. She was also on the Hospital Board for a time before it was disbanded.

In 1995, Sue and Dick moved into town and their son Wayne took over the farm. She then worked for Stagline Woollen Clothing, eventually becoming a partner with several other employees and taking over the business.

"This led to Dick and myself working with Peter Chilwell at the time of the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games," relayed Sue. They each had roles in the Equestrian Centre, living onsite in their caravan.

They've been on many trips with this same caravan and also travelled abroad to visit their daughter Peta in Canada twice, where she was completing her PhD. Peta now lives in Melbourne working at Deakin University, and they regularly keep in contact through Skype.

The White's have been involved in the Upper Blackwood Agricultural Show in Dinninup over the years, with their property right behind the showgrounds. "Dick used to take the water truck, the kids used to ride their horses, we showed cattle, and I used to enter the cooking and preserves," said Sue.

Sue was the President of the committee lobbying for the heated swimming pool in Boyup Brook, which raised over \$100,000 towards the project. She's also a regular at the pool when it is open, and this year will help her team swim to Wagin.

Sue recently retired from Treasurer of the Boyup Brook Tourism Association and was awarded Life Membership for over 40 years of service. Like many who have been so heavily involved in community and voluntary work, Sue thinks it is so important for people in a small town to all do their bit to help local groups. "It is also a great way to be involved, meet people [and] be a part of things," said Sue.

These days, Sue can be found in her beloved sewing room making quilts, gardening and caring for Dick. She thinks her greatest achievement is being married for over 50 years and still enjoying the company of her husband.

Real Estate Sales Growth Set to Continue

Sellers in regional areas of WA continue to share big-time in the spoils of the COVID 19 pandemic driven property market. Many sellers are experiencing multiple offers on sale of their property.

Available listings have declined substantially over the past 12 months with buyers experiencing for the first time in many years the shortage of choice and sellers experiencing a quick turn around in sales. REIWA figures show that the whole WA market listing choice is down about 40% since 2019.

Ex pats coming back and eastern state buyers are also providing a boost to the WA market with figures showing a positive interstate migration of plus 1650 as at March quarter.

As border restrictions ease there will be an increase in interstate migration due to worker shortages in the mining industry and returning Australians from overseas. Greenbushes alone is looking to employ over 600 workers.

This will increase demand for housing, tightening the depleted stock levels even further with the potential of driving up prices. The past 12 months has seen an average price increase of approx. 8% to 10% within the region, which is great news for sellers coming off a very low base pre COVID19.

So, in summary; Yes! We will continue to see reasonable growth in sales in our much sought-after Blackwood region.





On October 9, the Boyup Brook Anglican Church moved three Motions at the Annual Bunbury Synod. The Motions were presented by Dr Don Reid and Adrian Price. All three Motions were approved.

Briefly, the Motions were as follows:

Action for safe air and climate change.

Noting the Federal Governments lack of attention to minimise the pollution of the atmosphere and effects on climate change as well as community health.

Federal Government refugee and asylum seeker Policy.

Recognising an urgent need for a more compassionate attitude towards persons fleeing persecution. Opposing detention of children of refugees and an indefinite detention of refugees or asylum seekers.

Provision of affordable accommodation.

It is estimated that about 20,000 West Australians are classed as homeless, most losing any form of security for themselves or their belongings. After the Wooroloo bush fire earlier this year, Andrew Forrest and family provided 40 transportable homes to those who had lost their homes. This is better than living in a car or a tent.

Be Still and Know..... God

Set free to fulfil your destiny

'He has sent Me to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives.' Luke 4:18

Michelangelo's masterpiece David is in a gallery in Florence, Italy. Thousands of tourists wait for hours every day to get a glimpse. But many of them fail to notice the series of unfinished sculptures that line the corridor on the way to David.

Their forms are identifiable—a body part here, a torso there. The statues were intended to adorn the tomb of Pope Julius II, but they were never finished. It's almost as if these sculptures are trying to break free and become what they were intended to be, but they are stuck in stone. Michelangelo called them 'captives'.

Have you ever felt like a captive? You can't seem to break free from habitual sins that have held you back. You know who you want to be, what you want to do, and where you want to go, but you can't seem to get there. Regardless of how long you've been stuck, God wants to finish what He started in your life.

Jesus said His mission was to set captives free (see Luke 4:18). We tend to think of that statement in judicial terms; salvation is our get-out-of-jail-free card. But it's much more. Maybe we should think of that statement in artistic terms.

Jesus also died to resurrect the person we were destined to be before sin distorted the image of God in us. We are held captive by our imperfections and insecurities; by our guilt and anxieties. Jesus died to set us free from all the above. And He doesn't just set us free from who we were, He sets us free to become who we were meant to be.


