Remembering Sandakan

The emotive presentations that featured at the 2021 Sandakan Memorial Service, all included a common theme: it is of utmost importance that we pay tribute to, and remember, the story of the Sandakan death marches.

This event is described as the worst atrocity committed against Australians in war, of which there were only six survivors out of more than 2000 British and Australian soldiers forced to partake in the deadly marches in North Borneo during WWII.

Boyup Brook is home to the very first Sandakan Memorial in WA, and yearly services first commenced in 1991. Former resident and POW, Ted McLaughlin played an integral role in its establishment, due to his desire to remember his best mate who died during the marches.

Rhonda Parker lead the September 14 service which commenced under the watch of the 515 Army Cadet Unit - Bunbury Catafalque Party.

In his opening address, Peter Aspinall, State President of RSLWA, spoke about the grotesque tragedy of the marches, and went on to thank all who donated to the three Sandakan memorials in WA.

The Sandakan Ode, Prayer of Remembrance and two heartfelt songs performed by the Boyup Brook District High School Choir and Ensemble were to follow, before guest speaker and local shire CEO Dale Putland gave his address.

Dale spoke emotionally about how this was to be the first Sandakan Service his late father would miss. His father taught him about the services and how important it is to have a place and a memorial service like this one, to show our respects and to remember.

St Mary's Primary School students were then invited to recite a poem called 'Ranau Road', and a moving presentation by Boyup Brook RSL Sub Branch President Colin Hales followed this.

Each year local high school students compete for the Ted McLaughlin Sandakan Scholarship, which is generously sponsored by the Boyup Brook Lions' Club. This year's winner, Anne Deas (pictured right), was invited to the stage and spoke about the tragedy of the Sandakan story seldom remembered.

Her presentation came complete with a piece of artwork she had created, and a song that she sang beautifully before many guests at the service.

To conclude the day's events, bagpipes accompanied wreath laying, all stood for the Ode and the National Anthem, and the Last Post was played live on a bugle followed by a moments silence and the raising of the flags. All were then invited to the Town Hall for a luncheon.

POLICE NEWS

By the time this edition of the Gazette is published, the Queens Birthday long weekend would have been and gone. Along with it would have been the WA Police state-wide double demerits traffic campaign.

Every available police officer in the south west district was on duty working over the long weekend. Targeting unsafe roaduser behaviour is one of the key priorities for WA Police and plays an essential role in minimising the number of people fatally and seriously injured on our roads.

High visibility patrols will target those Category 'A' offences known to be the major causal factors in fatal and serious crashes:

- Impaired Driving Drugs and Alcohol
- · Reckless/Dangerous/Careless Driving
- Speeding
- No Authority to Drive
- · Use Mobile Phones
- Non-use of Restraints/Helmets

Anti-social behaviour incidents are on the increase and will not be tolerated. A Boyup Brook male was recently charged with Disorderly Behaviour and Unlawful Damage after an incident at the Boyup Brook Hotel. Police are working closely with all our Licensed venues to ensure everyone stays safe.

There is a shared community responsibility to identify and report crime to police. If we don't know something has happened, we can't help prevent it in the future, which leads me to the best way to contact us. As previously mentioned, you can reach police on any of the numbers listed at the end of this article.

Please refrain from contacting officers on their personal mobiles or via social media platforms such as messenger or Facebook. These are not monitored full time and will not elicit the appropriate response.

Since March 2018, Western Australian drivers have be required to slow down to a maximum of 40kmh when passing stationary emergency vehicles with lights activated on the roadside.

The SLOMO laws apply when passing Western Australia Police Force, Department of Fire and Emergency Services, St John Ambulance, roadside assistance, tow trucks and Main Roads Western Australia incident response vehicles that are responding to any roadside emergency across the State.

The instructions for safely passing stationary emergency vehicles are:

1. You see an accident ahead

This could be break-down, RAC Patrol van or emergency services like police, fire crew or ambulance.

2. Slow down

Safely and gradually drop your speed and indicate to prepare to change lanes.

3. Move over

Safely move over in to the lane furthest away from the incident as you pass it.

The penalty for not slowing down is \$300 and three demerit points.

The winner of the competition (held in 2020) was Georgia Walker, her art work is on our schedule cover. Congratulations Georgia.





A beautiful cottage garden surrounds the house which is quite large, with bench seats situated throughout providing resting places to sit and relax and soak in the beauty of the garden and river



Winston Farleigh Memoir

Former local Winston Farleigh passed away in March 2020. On September 12 this year, his family returned him home to Rylington Park by scattering his ashes on his former childhood home and farming property. This memoir was written and read out at his funeral by his son David Farleigh.

My father Winston was born in Claremont, Perth on 9th January 1931, during the Great Depression. Following his birth, life on Rylington Park, Boyup Brook continued as normally as possible during those difficult economic times with the family self sufficient in meat, milk and eggs. Vegetables were grown and fruit planted.

Two years later, Winston was joined by his sister Esma and the two youngsters grew up on the farm while their father Eric continued to develop Rylington Park as best he could during and after the Depression followed a few years later with the onset of WWII.

As I understand it, life was fairly normal for the family. Winston, Esma began their formal schooling on the farm with a governess.

When he was older, Winston was sent to boarding school where he attended Scotch College in Perth. I don't recall Dad talking very much about this period of his life except the joy and pleasure he got from rowing on the Swan River and the long trips back to the farm by train at the end of term – first to Bunbury and then to Hester where he would be met by his parents – the slow journey taking all day.

When dad's formative school years concluded, he returned to the farm and worked alongside his father Eric. Life continued normally in the district. Winston's social life was filled with bush dances, tennis, shooting at the local rifle range, golf and other events in the area. He continued his participation with some of these activities until he retired from the district.



At age 21, Eric gifted a 90 acre paddock to Winston who then began his farming career.

In the mid fifties, (1954 I believe) Winston accompanied his parents on a world farming tour lasting several months. This expanded his horizons having travelled to England, parts of western Europe and the USA.

In January 1957 Winston married his first wife May, my mother and that of my two brothers, Brian and John. May was teaching in the local primary school at Boyup Brook. During the early years of marriage, they lived in a small cottage on Rylington Park.

It was at this time my parents bought the undeveloped half of Rylington Park on the western side of the Cranbrook road from Eric. They named the property "Lyndon" after the plans for the house they built in 1961.

As a young boy I remember the enormous work load both my parents shared as they built and developed Lyndon together. They scrimped and saved every cent they could. My father would spend several months each year shearing in the neighbourhood leaving my mother to rake hay, run the house hold and keep the farm going.

During the early summer months Dad would go contract harvesting, eventually establishing a long term contract with the Jackson family who farmed at McAlinden south of Collie.

It was here that Dad learnt about fine wool growing from Syd Jackson. The Jackson family ran a sheep stud with Peppin blood lines with which they won supreme grand champion prize for their wool entries at the Perth Royal Show over many consecutive years. The Peppin line of merinos were better suited to the high rainfall environment on Lyndon.

Winston bought rams from the Jackson's gradually transitioning his flock from the larger bodied Collinsville sheep to the Peppin blood line, smaller framed animals with soft handling free combing wool immune from the dreaded fleece rot.

This change established the foundation for Winston's flock of heavy wool cutting 19 – 21 micron sheep of which he was very

proud. High yielding fine wool of this type was sort after by wool buyers and in particular, a high fashion Italian suit maker who chased dad's wool clip each season.

My father was a very creative, clever and industrious man, self taught in many ways and willing to tackle almost any challenge or task in need of doing. This "can do" was an ethos he passed onto my brothers and I. He worked alongside a local carpenter, Frank Smith to build the family home on Lyndon. Later working on his own.

Winston built all the sheds, stock yards and other infrastructure on the farm. He erected windmills, built dams and fences, cleared paddocks, blasted out mill stumps, designed and built a reticulation system of tanks and water troughs for stock throughout the property.

He was often engaged by local farmers to build sheds, stock yards erect silos or windmills for them. He built gates, tractor cabs, front end loaders, repaired and modified machinery to improve performance and minimise operating costs.

He pursued agronomy techniques to improve soil fertility and boost the quality and yield of his pastures, maximising the carrying capacity and productivity of his mixed farming enterprise that included beef cattle, wool, prime export shipping wethers and the sale of surplus grain and quality hay as each season permitted.

Dad was an active member of the Mayanup progress association and was a fire control officer for the local ward over several seasons.

These successes weren't without difficulties. Winston suffered several major and crushing set backs during his farming years, the first being the devastating fire January 12 1958, WA's worst to that point in time burning out 27 farms in the district including the Farleigh's.

He suffered from a drought in the 70s. I can remember as a young school boy, a serious on farm accident involving my youngest brother John in 1980 followed soon after by another devastating fire in 1981. With resilience, hard work and skill, Winston recovered from each of these events. Sadly, however, the stresses built over the years and the most recent of these events took their toll and claimed my parent's marriage in 1983.

Winston meet June Upton whom you all knew and they married in the spring of 1985. In 1990 Winston and June purchased a 1 acre block in Gelorup and took their time to build a new house and establish friendly relations with their neighbours.

A few years later, Lyndon was leased to Alex and Richard Forbes – a respected pioneering district family and lifelong neighbours. Dad then retired from farming. Lyndon was eventually sold in 2000.

Winston and June spent their retirement years travelling together and visiting family (both Upton's and Farleigh's) and their friends. For a time, dad involved himself with Riding for the Disabled, looking after horses and the property.

Winston and June were very committed to their church family here in Bunbury. As many of you know, Winston would happily involve himself with music rosters and prison visits. He enthusiastically engaged himself with newspaper collections, delivering many tons to Kemperton raising funds towards building this worship facility.

In 2014 June passed away after a period of illness. In 2016 Winston moved into a retirement villa at Eaton where he lived until January of this year at which time declining physical and mental health necessitated a move into full time residential aged care in Perth close to my brothers and I.

Dad passed away peacefully in his sleep on 11 March 2020.

Dad lived a full and productive life. He is survived by his three son's Brian, John and myself, 3 grandchildren being Daniel, Hannah and Katie and 3 great grandchildren – Evelyn, Amelia and Judah.

Today provides an opportunity for all of you, Dad's church family, friends, neighbours and others to say your goodbyes. Winston left each of us with a lifetime of unique memories and a hope for those of us who know and love Christ of meeting him some day in eternity.

Today is not the end – merely a chance to say a collective goodbye and to reflect and reminisce of a mortal life well lived.

Recipe - Blueberry Banana Bread

Ingredients

- olive or canola oil spray
- 4 ripe bananas, peeled
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup reduced-fat milk
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup self-raising flour
- 1 cup wholemeal self-raising flour
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 cup frozen blueberries



Method

- Preheat oven to 220°C (200°C fan forced). Spray a 20 x 10cm loaf tin with oil; line base and sides with non-stick baking paper.
- 2. Reserve one whole banana for presentation and mash remaining 3 bananas in a large bowl (1½ cups mashed).
- Add sugar, milk and eggs and mix with a fork until well combined.
- Sift flours and cinnamon on top of banana mixture, returning husks from the sieve to the bowl. Mix ingredients together until just combined, taking care not to over-mix, then gently fold through blueberries.
- Spoon mixture into prepared loaf tin and smooth the surface. Slice remaining banana thinly and overlap slices through the centre of the loaf.
- Bake for 35-40 minutes then cover with foil and bake for a further 20 minutes. Centre of loaf will remain moist but not wet when tested with a skewer. Allow to cool in tin for 5 minutes then turn onto a wire rack.
- 7. Cut into 1 cm slices and toast before serving, if desired.





Mental Wellbeing Postcards

Australia Post is helping Australians stay connected by delivering more than 4 million specially designed prepaid postcards to rural and remote households across the country as part of its continued focus on mental health.



Designed in collaboration with Australia Post's mental health partner Beyond Blue, the postcards are divided into two sections with a part to keep, including helpful tips on how to maintain mental health, and a second part to write on and send to friends or loved ones in Australia free of charge.

Australia Post Head of Community Nicky Tracey said the simple idea would have a positive impact on people's mental health, particularly for those who are currently unable to visit friends and family.

"We know that when we connect, we feel better and sometimes a small message can be all it takes to make a big difference to someone you care about," Ms Tracey said.

"These postcards make it really easy to connect with a message of love, hope and support by simply putting a message on the card, addressing it and dropping it in a red post box."

Beyond Blue Chief Executive Officer Georgie Harman said the partnership with Australia Post helps to share important messages about mental health with communities across the country and reach people who continue to grapple with the impacts of bushfires, floods and droughts on top of the pandemic.

"This postcard campaign will help us reach into rural and remote areas, where social and geographic isolation, weather impacts and difficulty accessing services can present mental health challenges," Ms Harman said.

"I really hope people will join in the spirit of this initiative, read the tips and send a card to a loved one. If we keep talking about mental health, we can smash the stigma and remove the barriers that hold people back from seeking support."


Beginners will work on holding the racquet correctly, hand eye co-ordination, hitting the ball over the junior nets, forehands, backhands and volleys with red balls.
