South West Service Remembers Vietnam Veterans

A crowd of around 300 gathered at the Boyup Brook War Memorial on August 18 to acknowledge the service of over 60,000 Australians who were involved in the battles fought in Vietnam between 1962 and 1972.

A large contingent of Veterans marched along Abel Street, followed by three classic cars chauffeuring more Veterans, including local RSL Life Member, Fred Doust.

The memorial was guarded by the 515 ACU Bunbury Catafalque Party, before Boyup Brook RSL sub-branch President, Colin Hales, welcomed all to the event, which was attended by members of nine RSL sub-branches from across the South West region, special guests and the general public.

The commemorative speeches were given by two local men who served in Vietnam, Richard Nield and Robert Sexton.

Richard spoke of the role of nurses at the First Field Hospital in Vung Tau, and also of the 8RAR Battalion that was on 24-hour standby to fly from Malaya to Vietnam as reinforcements, of which the late John Chapman was one of these men. He noted that about eleven Boyup Brook men served in South Vietnam, with five of these being members of the Boyup Brook class of 1961: John Chapman, Charlie Hayward, Phil Gifford, Ray Lindsay and himself.

“Today we remember and honour the 501 who lost their lives. We remember and honour over 3,000 who were wounded. We remember and honour all those who returned and took their own lives after their return. We remember, and honour them all,” Richard said.

Robert was thankful for the opportunity to speak stating “we old soldiers are fading away from a conflict that is fast becoming a forgotten war, and our opportunity to be part of these commemorations are diminishing.” He detailed the Battle of Coral, the biggest combined combat operation of the Australian Army had been involved in since World War II, mentioning Boyup Brook soldier, Ray Lindsay who was seriously wounded in action.

Pete Nettleton shared a Poem of Remembrance and an emotive song was performed by the Boyup Brook District High School choir, followed by the laying of wreaths, the Ode, Last Post and anthems.

A well attended lunch was shared at the conclusion of the event.

Water, Water, Everywhere

Well hasn't there been some rain this winter? Dams are full and local waterways have all overflowed, with the Blackwood River rising and engulfing the music park at the beginning of the month.

Residents have submitted the following totals for July to August 15:

206mm Kulikup	217mm Dinninup	217mm Chowerup
224mm North West Boyup Brook	225mm McAlinden	261mm South Boyup Brook
252mm East Boyup Brook	215mm Boyup Brook townsite	243mm North West Boyup Brook

According to the Bureau of Meteorology weather data (www.bom.gov.au), calculated since records began in 1913, the average rainfall for July is 115mm and August is 93mm, which means this year's totals are in excess of these combined monthly averages.

However with the rain, has come damage to many of our roads and plenty of vehicles unsuccessfully driving through paddocks! Do take care when driving, particularly if you are unfamiliar with the road you are travelling on.

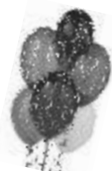

The 32 year old Armadale man was located on the Donnybrook-Boyup Brook Road by a passing motorist after close to 56 hours of being lost in bush land south of McAlinden Road. When I last spoke to him he was resting comfortably and being looked after by staff at the Boyup Brook Soldiers Memorial Hospital.

Due to the busy end to the week (this is the excuse I'm running with), I neglected to submit the Boyup Brook Police News contribution to the Gazette by the deadline. After apologising to the editor, I scrapped the planned contribution and thought this would be timely to give you some insight into what resources are available and deployed to a situation like the one we saw in McAlinden.

After the initial response and preliminary investigation of the missing man, the incident was escalated quite rapidly on the Thursday morning. Police resources were deployed to the man's place last seen. This included Boyup Brook, Collie, Capel and Donnybrook Police. A carefully planned and coordinated search was commenced of the immediate vicinity. Shortly after, we were joined by Bunbury Police Complex drone pilots and Bunbury Detectives.

Although nightfall generally stops any ground searching, Collie Police remained in the area all night, patrolling roads and tracks with their emergency lights flashing in hope the man may see them.

By now the incident is escalating into a large scale land search and the assistance of the State Emergency Service was called upon. By morning, a command post was established at the Noggerup town hall with SES volunteers converging from areas including Margaret River, Busselton and Bridgetown to name just a few. The fact that these incredible people volunteer their time for these critical incidents cannot be understated. Their selfless contribution to the community has literally saves many lives and with the greatest of respect I take my hat off to them.

A well nourished volunteer (and Police for that matter) allows the efforts to continue throughout the day. This is made possible by another great organisation of volunteers from the Salvation Army who provided the sustenance.

Apart from the extensive efforts by the various agencies involved in the incident that are seen on the ground, there are also many people involved that are equally important. This includes the WA Police Force State Operations Command Centre in Perth that provide 24 hour technical and intelligence support.

One such example is the SMS message you would have received if you have a mobile telephone and were within a 50 km radius of McAlinden advising of the missing man. Also utilised and/or considered for this incident were specialist units including Dive Squad, Emergency Operations Unit and Police Airwing.

Needless to say, every effort is made to locate a missing or lost person safely. On this occasion it was a great result. Thank you to everyone involved.

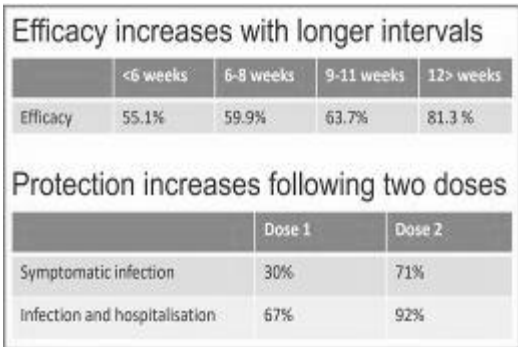
VACCINE UPDATE

Currently in Australia there are two Covid-19 vaccines being used, one made by Pfizer (Comirnaty) and one made by Astra Zeneca (Vaxzevria). Moderna’s vaccine Spikevax, another RNA type vaccine like Comirnaty is planned to be supplied to pharmacies from mid September. The AZ vaccine is recommended for individuals over 60 years of age, but can be given to anyone over 18 years of age with informed consent, who do not have a previous history of cerebral venous thrombosis or heparin – induced thrombocytopenia. The main concern with the AZ vaccine is the very small risk of thrombosis with thrombocytopenia. The Pfizer vaccine is recommended for patients 16-59. Patients with previous history of myocarditis or pericarditis should seek medical advice before getting the Pfizer vaccine as there is a very small risk of this occurring. Two doses of all three vaccines are required. The Astra Zeneca minimum interval between doses is four weeks, with more than twelve ideal. See chart (right) courtesy of the Pharmacy Guild.

The Pfizer interval is a minimum of three weeks, and Moderna a minimum of four weeks. Efficacy = percentage reduction of disease incidence in the vaccinated individuals.

We also can administer the flu vaccine and the diphtheria/tetanus/pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine to eligible patients.

Most days of the week, we place a ‘special order’ for an item for a customer that we don’t have in stock. We have accounts with many different suppliers of health related products, and are more than happy to order special requests. If we place an order with our main suppliers by 12pm, we will have the stock in store by 10am the next morning (Tuesday to Saturday). One of our pharmacists likes to refer the supplier as his pantry, so next time you need that special baby formula, arthritis cream, walking stick, soap, vitamin, sunscreen (when it finally warms up), or any other health related product give us a call and we will do our best to help out.

WEBSTER PACKS

We supply webster packs to many local patients. Webster packs take all of the hard work out of managing your medications. We customise the pack to suit your needs, some patients take medication four times a day, so one webster pack will have enough for one week, other patients only take their medication once a day, so we can change the pack to have a 28 days of medication in it. Other patients are going away for a holiday so we pack enough websters to last their time away. Webster packs reduce the worry of remembering if you have taken your medication, they reduce the visits needed to the pharmacy to pick up different scripts, and we prompt you early to get new prescriptions so you are less likely to run out of medication. We only charge \$5 per pack, so for a small fee your medication is taken care of.

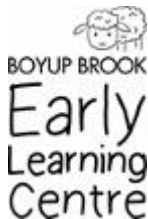

WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE CRC

Thank you to everyone for the positive feedback about the changes in layout in the foyer. There will be a few more tweaks in coming weeks as we transition into providing the community's library service. Unfortunately we still do not have a confirmed date for the commencement of the library, as we are waiting on the delivery of furniture from the Eastern States. It will not be far away and we are getting very excited!

The month commenced with an upgrade to the CRC's IT network with all cabling replaced and wireless access points installed, creating faster and more reliable network connectivity. This project was supported with a grant from the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development.

The CRC visited Playgroup and the Early Learning Centre to conduct some experiments with the children as part of National Science Week. There was lots of colour, patterns and textures explored (see image). An afterschool activity was also held for school aged children.



Numbers at our monthly Kahoot Quiz were great and it has been wonderful to welcome some new participants to the Seniors Activity and Exercise sessions on a Tuesday morning. If you are over 55, you are more than welcome to join in. All abilities and fitness levels are welcome - including men!

CRC Project Officer, Sharon Lampard has submitted an entry for the Keep Australia Beautiful Tidy Towns Awards. Thank you to the Boyup Brook Lions Club, Boyup Brook DHS, St Mary's Primary School and Boyup Brook Tourism Association for their contributions to the submission. We look forward to welcoming the judges to Boyup Brook on September 7.

For some time now, the CRC has been working with the community, local and regional stakeholders to identify gaps in service provision for seniors. Digital literacy continues to be a concern, as so many services are moving online, including obtaining access to COVID-19 vaccination certificates. The CRC will be holding a session on September 8 (see next page) about how to access this information via MyGov. There is also a need for more staff to be employed by local providers to deliver aged care services. If you know of someone who may like to undertake a Certificate III Individual Support (Aged), please let them know about the training, which we are hoping to conduct locally in Boyup Brook, however there must be a minimum of seven students enrolled.

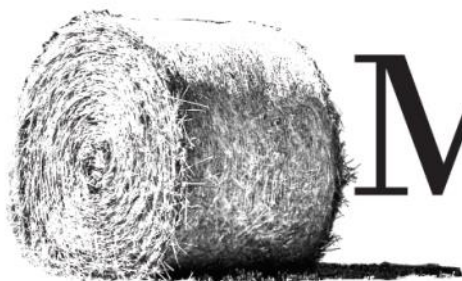
Tammie Barnes has been working in the Unit this year and she would love to have the company of another person to share the training, as well as the joys of Guiding.

Chowerup School Reunion

Memorabilia from the schools will be on display.

Below is an extract from the Western Mail (Perth, WA), Thursday 29 November 1923, page 37 which refers to students at the Chowerup School.

Langi, Chowerup Creek

My dear Aunt Mary,

My teacher asked me to write to you about the eggs that were sent from Chowerup School. Jack, Will, Wallace, and Nellie Connor, Ivy Newton, and myself sent the eggs, and we hope they arrived safely.

Ivy Newton and Georgie Jennings have joined on my card, and I am sending their subscriptions. Ivy is six years of age, and George two years. The other school children are going to be links as soon as they can get the change.

The boys are very interested in the Silver Chain: they reckon it is great. Hasn't it been a long winter this year; it has only just turned spring, the weather was awful, wasn't it.

I hope all the patients are getting well.

Well I will close, as I am very sleepy.

My dear Rubina,

We were more than grateful for the eggs you all so kindly helped us to get, and so sorry that you did not see the list in which they were acknowledged. We can never feel grateful enough to all our friends for their wonderfully kind help.

I was delighted to hear that Ivy and Georgie had joined on your card; thank you for sending their subscriptions. It will be delightful to have more links at your school.

We have indeed had a strangely long winter.

Real Estate Matters

Residential Tenancy Act Review

In 2017 the WA Government committed to a review of the Residential Tenancies Act (RTA). This was mainly driven by tenant advocacy groups. Since then the Dept of Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety (DMIRS) has begun a review of the RTA.

A consultation paper was released in December 2019, which sought to examine all issues affecting the tenancy process, including security of tenure, application procedure, bonds, rents, the premises and termination and dispute resolution.

The real Estate industry is concerned about the impact some of these proposals may have on the WA rental market if introduced in their present form. The immediate consideration is that it may restrict investors entering the market and eventually create a shortage of rental accommodation, which could backfire on tenancy advocacy groups.

Some proposals include: Pets being allowed, modification to premises, Restrictions in relation to termination of tenancies and removal of fixed term tenancy as a tenant choice.

The industry feels that the majority of residential tenancies are working well and there is a good balance between lessors and tenant responsibilities, although there may be room for improvements in certain areas, particularly in premise maintenance by lessors.

REIWA has lodged a submission with DMIRS about issues raised in the review and is advocating for a balanced approach to insure that the rights of both lessors and tenants are protected. The industries main concerns are that any reforms do not impact on supply of rental properties, rents remain affordable, owning rental properties remains attractive to investors and the balance of rights between tenants and lessors is maintained.

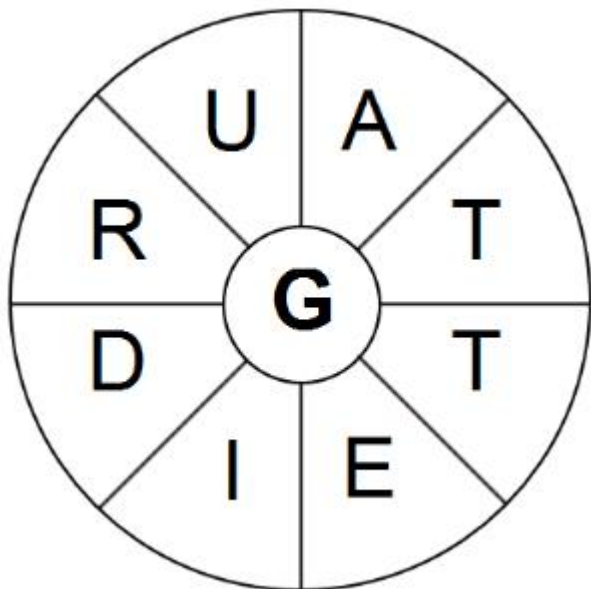

An Olympian's Memoir - Berlin, 1936

There is no 'Getting to Know...' article this month, however it seems appropriate, following the Tokyo Olympics, to acknowledge a former community member, Kath Stukely (Connal), who attended the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin, representing Great Britain.

This is her personal account (written in 1972 as a lead up to the Munich Olympic Games – same country, 36 years on) of her Olympic experience in Berlin 1936 as part of the British Olympic Team.



"The Prelude: London, July 1936

Up, up went the javelin into the light breeze, the tail vibrating with the force of my throw.

As I slowly relaxed, balancing precariously on one foot, eyes fixed on the flying javelin, I felt momentarily like Eros in Piccadilly Circus. Time seemed to stand still and there was a great silence.

The point dipped, then, caught by the stronger breeze from above the high walls of the stadium, it lifted again, floating gently through the air before finally plunging downward to land quivering in the short green turf.

I turned away. Joining the other competitors, I lay on my stomach, chewing a blade of grass to quieten the sick trembling of overstretched nerves. An international got up to take her turn. "Good throw," she said. Suddenly the loudspeakers blared. "In the javelin championship, Miss K. Connal, of Leeds University, has already broken the British record ..." For a moment I lay stunned. Then the other competitors crowded around, congratulating me. In seconds I was surrounded by photographers three deep and was barely rid of them before it was my turn again.

It was the British Women's Amateur Athletic Association championships at White City, London. The date, Saturday, July 18, 1936.

Selection

The XIth Olympic Games were due to open in Berlin on August 1, 1936. Tension ran high among those striving for selection, but I had come for fun and experience. Having a stiff ankle after a messy break in a road accident, I had learned a modified throwing technique while still unable to run, and although holding the inter-university record, I had no experience of open competition. A fellow student, Grethe Whitehead, who earned selection for the 80-metre hurdles, had persuaded me to keep her company.

Still dazed, I was presented with my gold medal and the Challenge Cup. Then I was measured for an Olympic uniform. "Just in case," the officials said.

I was selected as a guinea pig, for I was apparently the first British woman ever to be entered in an Olympic throwing event and the only one that year in the women's team of 11.

There is a great difference between those 1936 Olympics and the 1972 Munich Games – the same country, but 36 years and a world war apart. Training methods, facilities, and attitudes have changed enormously. Australian athletes will have two weeks to acclimatise themselves in Munich, and the teams were selected in March, allowing five month's intensive training.

In comparison we were not only amateurs but amateurish. But I fancy we contributed as much to international understanding and good fellowship and had as much fun as any other Olympic team before or since. At the time as young athletes, not realising the sinister events that were about to unfold and that the Olympic stage was being used to present a charade by the Nazi party.

How did I train? You may well ask! We had no club trainer and trained "by the light of Nature."

With an inter-university record to my credit, I had received a letter from the WAAA early in 1936 saying I was considered a "possible" for the Olympic team and asking if I needed help with training. Flabbergasted, I hastily replied, "Yes, please"- and still await an answer. So, three times a week I took some painstakingly collected photographs to the track. There, a groundsman, dead keen but ignorant of the event, would shiver in the cold Yorkshire winds, comparing my efforts with the photographs. During University holidays a friend cycled 30 miles to advise, and a masseur walked 20 miles to give me an occasional rubdown. That was all.

Journey to Berlin

On Wednesday, July 29, 1936, Grethe and I started our journey, travelling all day from Leeds to London. Next morning the British Olympic team received a great send-off from Victoria (train) Station. One of the hurdlers was slightly seasick on the cross-Channel boat, and we were jammed like sardines in the train to Brussels. There, to the consternation of our three women officials, the Belgian men's hockey team joined us.

At the German border we missed our connecting train. Instead of getting sleepers at 11pm, we sat face to face, five a side, till 2.45am, then in sleepers at last, we dozed fitfully for a few hours till awakened at 6am. We steamed (steam train) into Berlin at 8am; the Friedrichstrasse Station was smothered in swastika flags and swarming with sightseers. There was also a military band. All to welcome the Belgians. We British girls were unexpected, so were shepherded aside to watch meekly.

After welcoming speeches, the Belgians dipped their standard while the band played the Belgian national anthem, followed by "Deutschland Uber Alles" and the Nazi song, the "Horst Wessel Lied." We were startled and awed as the great crowd stood throughout with right arms raised in the Hitler salute, the dining-car attendants sticking their arms through the train windows in patriotic fervour.

Special buses took us through streets planted with rows and islands of tall flagpoles flying the 53 flags of competing nations. Huge Nazi banners hung from every window, black swastika on a white circle on scarlet. The swastika or the Olympic rings decorated everything, even the railway locomotives.

At the Reichssportfeld, the complex of sports arenas and halls where we were to live, a locked gate separated our quarters from every unauthorised male. Our men were in the Olympic Village, 12 miles away.

Team Luggage Missing

Breakfast was strange, but wonderful. Feeling better, we looked for our baggage. Missing - the lot. There we were, in our ordinary long skirts after 36 hours' travelling, with no uniforms or training gear, the Games to be opened next afternoon - and my event the day after! What now? Our officials knew no German. One had a leg in plaster, so the others searched alone, while we sat apprehensively, or slept, or practised high kicks in the passages in our underwear.

Periodic reports came. Our baggage was in Berlin. In Aachen. Still in London. At 10pm it arrived except our manager's case containing her uniform and identity card.

Next morning, we attempted a little light training. Our manager, noticing my un-orthodox style, developed to balance my damaged leg, spent half an hour of the only training time left to me, trying to show me a new style for next day's competition, while I stood and watched, almost weeping with frustration and weariness.

I was then advised to rest, "as you are competing tomorrow" while the team manager wore my uniform at the opening ceremony. Among 100,000 strangers, in the stands, I watched the others marching and speculated on the morrow

The Olympic Games

Sunday (Day 1) dawned bright and clear. From our team, I alone was to compete. All morning we sat still again in the competitors' stand, watching the first men's events - shot won by Germany, then the African American bombshell runner Jesse Owens.

At 2:45pm a team official led me to my execution. After changing, we descended into the marathon tunnel, closed off from the arena by a locked steel grille. The other competitors already wore numbers. I asked for mine, and the marshal told me in halting English they had been issued days earlier - to the men. Looking down into my horrified face from his great height, he muttered something in German ending with "disqualifiziert" - and vanished. Helplessly I sat as the minutes ticked by. On the stroke of three the loudspeaker summoned us. The marshal returned and patted my shoulder. "Don't worry. You may compete. If your number arrives within two hours your throws will count."

We were marshalled into single file. First a placard saying "Speerwerfen", then a bevy of enormous officials, marching smartly; then 14 nervous girls from ten nations - three Germans, three Americans, and one each from Holland, Belgium, Yugoslavia, Austria, Poland, Finland, Japan, and Great Britain - trailed out behind them into the brilliant sunshine. Dazzled, deafened by the cheers of that 100,000 crowd, we marched like the early Christian martyrs round the edge of the arena to our throwing area in front of Hitler's box. One voice penetrated my numbed brain and raised a smile. "Go it, Britain!"

Allowed a few moments' warm-up time to measure our runs, I was appalled to find the run-up was on cinders, not on grass, as in England. Our officials should have known this, months earlier. The effect of the faster surface on a carefully practised run-up was disastrous. I was feet out.

Surveying my first attempt, a kindly judge remarked, "We will count your throws whether your number comes or not." After my last effort

he said quietly, "You English can run, but we Germans should teach you to throw." How right he was. The men did no good, either.

Hitler arrived halfway through the event. Everything stopped while every German leapt up to give the Nazi salute, yelling "Sieg heil! Sieg heil! Sieg heil!" before bursting into the two anthems.

The Austrian girl, Bauma, wept bitterly because she was only fourth, and I attempted to comfort her. She shrugged away angrily. The judge sat down between us and, smiling at me, turned to her saying, "Weinen nicht. Grossbritannien weint nicht." (Don't cry. Great Britain isn't crying.)

How do those very amateurish experiences of 36 years ago [*now 85*] compare with those of present-day Olympians? How does the high-pressure professionalism affect them? Only they can say. We received nothing except the fun, the thrills, the experience, and some small understanding of international friendship and sportsmanship. Would two Olympic athletes today toss for the silver medal as did the Japanese pole-vaulters? We did it the hard way. No managed nutrition, no professional coaching, no precision-built tracks, no padded landings, or starting blocks. But we all did our utmost and enjoyed every minute. We wept when our national anthem was played, as Olympic athletes do today. We, too, rebelled against our management. We made lifelong friendships, though some of us never met again. We had our depths of despair and our peaks of success. For me - no medals. My proudest moment was to hear the German judge say to the Austrian who wept because she didn't win, "*Weinen nicht. Grossbritannien weint nicht.*"

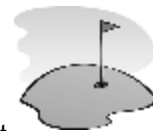

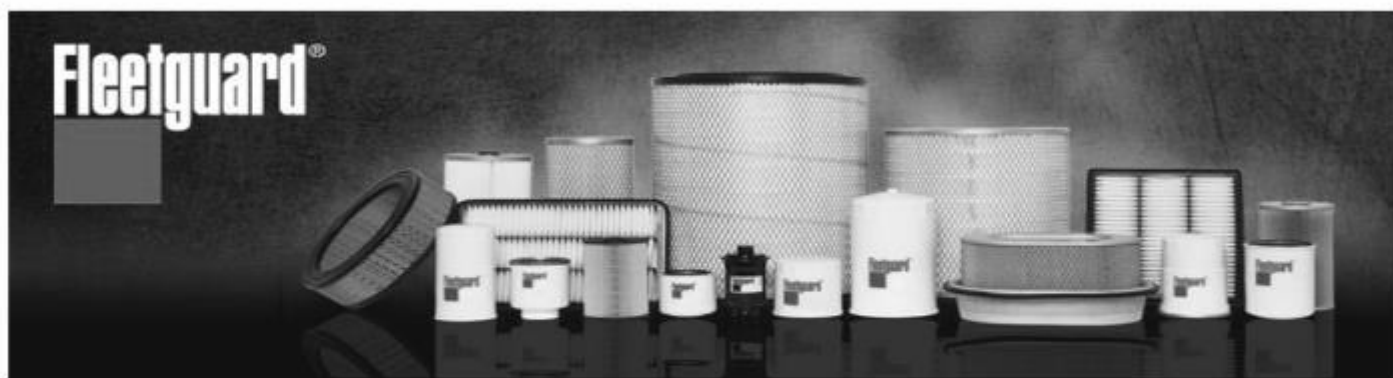
